## Sheriff's Posse To Head Big Parade On Show's Opening Day

Final planning for the annual Eastland County Livestock Show went forward at a meeting of the sponsoring Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association Thursday night at the Texas Electric Service Company conference room.

The schedule was set up as follows:

**Friday, March 30** — All stock must be in place by 11 a.m.  
**Saturday, March 31** — Judging: 8:30 a.m., angora goats; 9 a.m., breeding classes of sheep; 9:30 a.m., fat lambs; 10 a.m., breeding classes of swine; 10:30 a.m., fat barrows; 1 p.m., breeding classes of beef cattle; 2 p.m., fat steers; 3 p.m., dairy cattle.

The sale, formerly held at 2:30 p.m. the Tuesday following the show, henceforth is to be held at 6 p.m., Tuesday following the show — which this year will be April 3 — at Sig Faircloth's Auction Barn. This change was made so that businessmen will have an opportunity to attend.

Numerous entry slips were turned in by vocational agriculture teachers and the county agent's department, for FFA and 4-H; 25 fat calves; 85 fat barrows; 150 fat lambs. There also will be entries in breeding stock from both boys and adults, and sheep, goats and hogs.

The affair will be staged at the Show Barn of the livestock association.

R. S. Higgins, assistant county agent, expects to announce the complete list of judges within the next few days. C. M. McCain will be general superintendent of the show.

The colorful Eastland County Sheriff's Posse, captained by Bill Hoffmann, will head a parade the opening day heralding the annual show.

A new opening hour of 11 a.m. for the Dairy King, starting Tuesday, has been announced by Mr. and Mrs. T. E. Richards and Mr. and Mrs. Otis Coleman, owners of the drive in refreshment and sandwich establishment located at the "Y" on Highway 80 West.

The owners have also announced that a car hop will be on duty during the noon hour, starting Tuesday.

### New Wildcat May Open New Field In Area

A new wildcat oil well that was drilled by Bentley & Pruett seven miles west of Ranger, is producing 180 barrels of oil a day and has possibly opened a new field in this area.

The well is producing through a 24.64 choke with a gas-oil ratio of 1260 to one and no water.

James A. Bentley of New York City and Ronald Pruett of Ranger expect the well to be designated as a new field by the Railroad Commission, but the name has not yet been selected.

It is the L. L. Neil No. 1 and was drilled with rotary.

Bentley said that he and Pruett had been studying the potential in Eastland County and particularly the old field area for four years, and the possibilities of second recovery as well as additional primary recovery.

Only after careful study and leasing of large amounts of land was the first well drilled in this field, Bentley said.

Pruett, a petroleum engineer, will be the operator.

### Paratrooper From Star In Polar Jump

THULE, Greenland — Paratrooper Pfc. N. A. Roady, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. Calvin Roady, Route 2, Rising Star, Tex., was scheduled to jump during Exercise Arctic Night, 931 miles from the North Pole late this week.

At the northernmost post ever reached by a tactical airborne unit, a battalion combat team was due to jump and then move and simulate fighting in the sub-zero weather.

Roady is assigned to Company A of the 2d Airborne Division's 507th Engineer Battalion at Fort Bragg, N.C., as a combat construction specialist.

The 1953 Cross Plains High School graduate entered the Army in January 1955 and completed basic training at Fort Leonard Wood, Mo.

### Opportunities Of Nat'l Guard Are Explained

AUSTIN, March 17 — Texas high school students are invited this week by Major General I. L. Berry, adjutant general, to discuss a very personal problem with the Texas National Guard commander nearest their homes.

The problem is how to advance college and professional careers with a minimum of interference from the military obligation most of America's young men face today.

"We know many of these boys will find their solution through the new Reserve Forces Law which allows them to take six months of basic training under the Department of Army, after which they will complete their military requirements as members of the Texas National Guard," General Berry said.

This program is open only to those between the ages of 17 and 18½. It offers the opportunity of military training in local armories and summer camps for pay and enables the trainees to continue college work or business training without interruption.

"The best counselor in this serious problem facing our Texas young men is the man who knows from experience. Therefore we are inviting boys between the ages of 17 and 18½ and their parents to discuss the Reserve Forces law and its benefits with the National Guard commander nearest their homes," General Berry said. Any youth between these ages may join the Guard and not take any active duty other than two weeks summer camp each year.

However, because the program is so important to the youth who does not want to interrupt his college studies or business training and at the same time serve his obligation to his country, the Adjutant General's Department has adopted a policy of issuing active duty orders only to those volunteering for the six months "active duty for training" in a federal status.

## Pres. Wright, Little League, Tells 'Why' Of New Park Here

The "whys" for a Little League Baseball Park for Eastland were given — "at least the important ones" — today by League President James Wright. Said Mr. Wright:

"Since the beginning of talk about the building of a new Little League Baseball park, there has been the constant question, 'Why do we need a new park? What is wrong with Fireman's Field?'"

Perhaps I might answer just a few of those questions that have arisen:

"1. Eleven teams were trying to play on one field here last year and some of them rarely ever got to play.

"2. Fireman's Field is much too large a field for Little League boys (Little League fields are two thirds the size of a big league field.)

"3. We will continue to use the old field for the three teams we now have in junior and senior teen-age baseball which will play on the field about four nights a week.

"4. We are going to affiliate nationally this year and in order to do this, we must own our own Little League Field and it must be built to National specifications.

"Therefore, we think it necessary to build a new field so that our boys might have the same opportunities that our surrounding towns have. We appreciate the efforts that are being put forth by our managers and other interested parties in making this field possible."

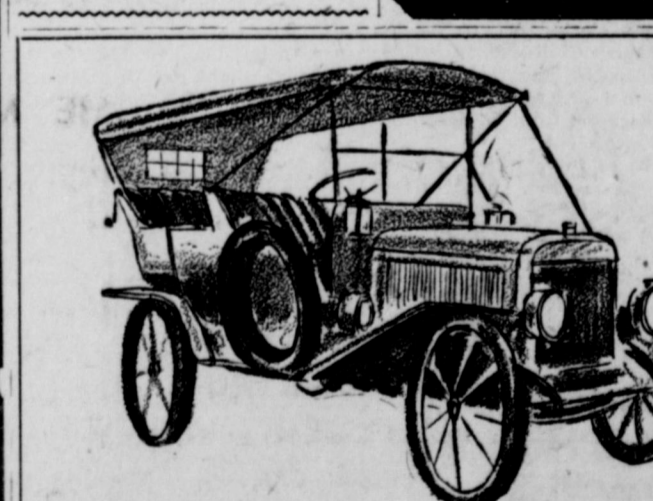

### RESOLUTION

BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF EASTLAND COUNTY WATER SUPPLY DISTRICT, CALLING AN ELECTION FOR THE PURPOSE OF ELECTING (4) DIRECTORS OF SAID DISTRICT:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF EASTLAND COUNTY WATER SUPPLY DISTRICT:

1. That an election be held on April 3rd, 1956, in Eastland County Water Supply District as created by House Bill No. 888, passed by the Fifty-First Legislature, and as amended by House Bill No. 845 by the Fifty-Third Legislature, for the purpose of electing (4) Directors of said District.

2. For the purpose of said election, Eastland County Water Supply District is divided into two election precincts. All of the territory of the District contained in the City of Ranger shall be known as the "Ranger Precinct" and all the territory of the District contained in the city of Eastland shall be known as the "Eastland Precinct".

3. (a) The election in the Ranger Precinct shall be held at the Chamber of Commerce office in the City of Ranger, Texas. Mr. W. W. Paschal is hereby appointed as presiding judge for said election, and he shall appoint as assistants an assistant judge and two (2) clerks to assist him in

holding said election.

3. (b) The election in the Eastland Precinct shall be held at the Justice of the Peace No. 1, County Court House in the City of Eastland, Texas. Mr. H. P. Pentecost is hereby appointed as Presiding Judge for said election and he shall appoint an assistant judge and two (2) clerks to assist him in holding said election.

4. Only qualified voters residing in Eastland County Water Supply District who own taxable property therein, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

5. Mr. C. B. Pruet, Mr. P. M. Kuykendall, Mr. Guy Parker, Mr. L. E. McGraw, have made application to this Board to have their name printed on the Ballot and such applications are hereby granted. The ballot however, shall be large enough to permit the writing in of other names.

6. The ballots for said election shall have printed thereon the following:

### "OFFICIAL BALLOT"

C. B. Pruet DIRECTOR from RANGER

P. M. Kuykendall DIRECTOR from RANGER

Guy Parker DIRECTOR from EASTLAND

L. E. McGraw DIRECTOR from EASTLAND

Each voter shall leave on the ballot the names of the (4) candidates for whom he desires to vote. The four (4) candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall be elected.

7. No person shall be elected a Director unless he resides in and owns taxable property in the District. No member of the governing body of the City of Ranger or the City of Eastland and no employee of either of said Cities shall be elected as Director.

8. Notice of said election shall be given by publishing a copy of this order in the "Ranger Times", and in the "Eastland Telegram", newspapers of general circulation published within said District, on a date herein set for said election, at least ten (10) days before the date herein set for said election.

# Why White House Is So Expensive Puzzle To Cong. Burleson

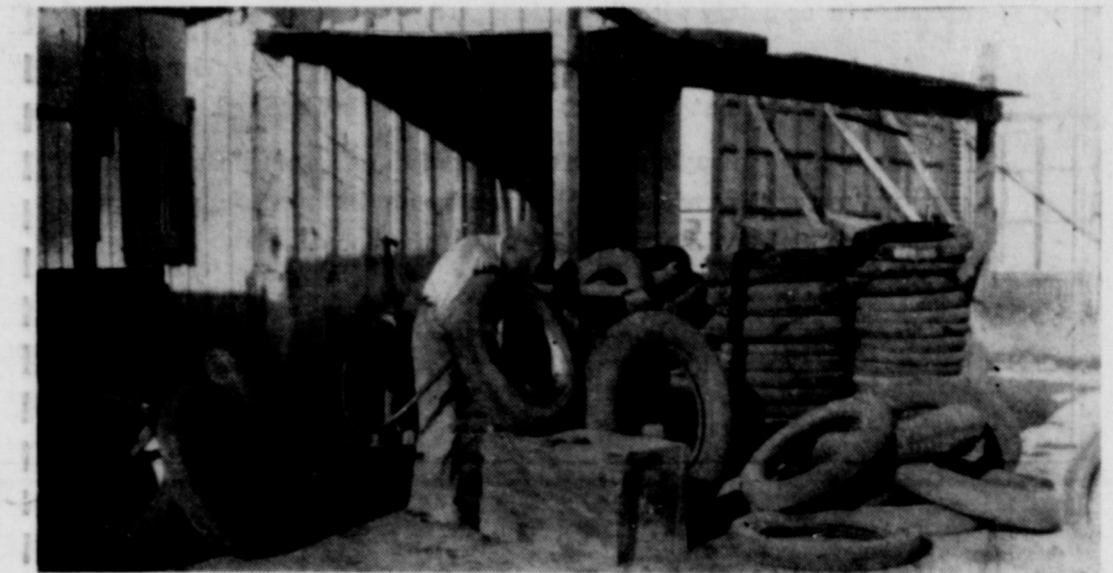

WASHINGTON, D. C. — The House of Representatives . . . approved several of its Appropriations Bills during this last week. It's pretty difficult to look at every item for which money is to be spent. One, however, is interesting to note. The Appropriations Committee approved the sum of \$3,908,775 for operating expenses of the White House for the coming

fiscal year. Bear in mind this is for operating expenses only and has nothing to do with repairs, upkeep, etc. Just why its costs this sum of money to run the White House I do not know, but obviously it is expensive. You May Have Noticed . . . in recent months the Democratic Party has been referred to as the "Democrat Party" by some of the top Republican leaders. An

official of the Republican high command, and a member of Congress, has sent the word out to his colleagues suggesting they use this term in referring to their opposition. Personally I do not care for this sort of label. Those who use it in this respect use it in disrespect. If the last two letters of "Democratic" are to be chopped off, I suppose it would be in order to resort to the "eye for an eye" attitude and chop off the first two letters of "Republican" and leave "Publican." The Bible (Luke 19:VIII) mentions the "Publicans" as wicked politicians who got rich off the poor by making false accusations against their opponents. Personally I had rather stick to the name given the Democratic Party by Jefferson (and his principles too) and let the name of the party of Hamilton remain as it has always been. Everyone

would be happier if everybody just stuck to the issues. Surplus Farm Commodities . . . are always a problem any way we look at it. On the other hand, in the light of certain possibilities, they could be the greatest blessing any people ever had. A recent study reveals that in the event of an atomic war, we might quickly face starvation. Assuming our transportation system could still be operated after an attack, we have on hand just enough corn to last for 3 months; enough wheat and cotton to last 13 months; enough rice and rye for 7 months; and enough butter for 30 days. Oats would last 24 days and soy beans for 29 days. The Treasury Department is preparing for such possibilities by storing money in different locations in case we should suddenly

lose access to our normal currency supply. If it is important to store money in safe places, it would seem equally or more important to insure an available food supply under some protected method of a food stockpile. Testimony of High Military Authorities . . . confirms the report that this Country is lagging behind Soviet Russia in production of long range jet bombers. Our current output of B-52 bombers is only four per month. The Soviets are producing 12 per month. We are supposed to be able to produce 17 B-52's per month after another year and a half. It is expected the Soviets will reach a peak output of 25 per month considerably sooner. It is authoritatively reported that the Soviets are already testing a ballistic missile of 1,500-mile range. No comparable ballistic missile has yet passed the drawing-board stage in this Country. There is little doubt that Russia is ahead of us in the best type of bombers and in fighter planes that must intercept bombers. Defense expenditures have been reduced, but for the domestic side, we have the highest peace-time budget in history. General Nathan Twining says we still retain greater atomic power than the Soviet Union, but he added, "as of now." "As of now" may be all right, but what about two years, three years, or four years from now when it may be too late to catch up, and the Soviet air lead is decisive?

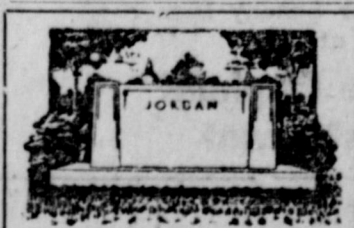
