Bill Holliday Fund Benefit Games To Be Held In Olden

Two benefit basketball games will be held in the Olden High gym at 7 p. m. Tuesday, April 21st with all proceeds going to the Bill Holliday Fund.

There will be a game between two girls teams from Olden and a game between Olden and the Eastland Jaycees. Admission will be 35c for adults and 25c for children.

Bill, young man from Olden, who was burned over 50 per cent of his body in an automo-

mobile accident about four weeks ago, was transferred Monday night from a Fort Worth hospital, where he has been receiving intensive, expensive care, to the John Sealy Hospital in Galveston.

He is receiving blood at the Galveston hospital and a plea has gone out to any of his friends who would give blood for the young man. Blood may be given at the Hendrick Memorial Hospital at Abilene

and any type may be given. Bill will be given credit at the blood bank for each pint given, with two pints to replace one.

Anyone wishing to give blood may leave their name at the Eastland Telegram office and will be contacted as to what time and when a group could get together to go to Abilene.

Friends of the young man have responded to the need for funds to pay for the expensive care he has been receiving. Over \$800 has been donated in the form of many gifts, some have given small amounts and others more, with contributions still coming in.

Eastland residents will be asked to consider these things as the 1964 Cancer Crusade gets underway this week.

Mrs. Dale Trout, chairman for the Eastland Crusade, has announced that Eastland volunteers will be among 90,000 across the state who will crusade for funds.

Mrs. Trout has asked that all workers meet at the Texas Electric Service Co Conference Room at 5:30 p. m. Thursday, April 23.

The house to house canvass by workers will begin promptly at 6 p. m., she said.

Annual Cleanup Campaign Ready To Begin In Eastland This Week

The Civic League and Garden Club-sponsored "Clean-Up Campaign" gets underway in Eastland Monday, and the week of April 20 to April 25 has been officially proclaimed Clean-Up Week.

The city will offer special pick-up services in the following week in order to encourage more people to take part in the campaign.

Mrs. Dale Trout, Civic League President, said "Only if everyone in the city co-operates, can this campaign be a complete success. Let's all help to make Eastland a more beautiful place to live and work."

The club urges that citizens give special attention to the following points:

Beautification — Check on the need for painting and repairing houses, fences, etc.; planting seed and plants, pruning shrubbery and trees, and removing dead wood. Vacant lots should be cleared of rubbish and weeds.

Safety — Give attention to pruning trees and shrubs that create dangerous blind corners. Remove fire hazards. Remove dangerous objects

which might injure children; especially remove discarded refrigeration and deep freezers that have doors which lock.

Health — Destroy weeds such as ragweed and Johnson grass. Clear out breeding places of flies and mosquitoes.

The special pick up services will begin April 27. All rubbish must be out by that date, it is announced.

One of three are presently being saved.
He also pointed out the need for the greater intensity of research which will be needed to save those for whom there is now no cure available.
"Through collective efforts of volunteers of the American Cancer Society, and broad programs of research, education and service," he said, "significant gains are being made in the fight to bring final victory over cancer. Every such gain immeasurably benefits our families, our economy, and our State."
More than half of the funds contributed during the current Crusade will be spent to cancer research in Texas institutions, and for public education to increase the saving of lives. Additional amounts which will be spent for professional education and for service to cancer patients will help bring the total to be spent in Texas to more than one dollar of the dollar contributed.

The Society is currently supporting research at three University of Texas centers, in Dallas, Houston, Galveston, and at Baylor University centers in Dallas and Houston. Texas grants currently in effect total more than \$738,413. This includes some of the important research in the leukemias field, where the most substantial progress has been made in recent years. Other current research is being financed on lung cancer, breast cancer, and cancers of the uterus, liver, bladder, stomach, thyroid, colon and rectum, prostate, and pancreas. State Attorney General Waggoner field, where the most general Carr, members of the Texas Division Board of Directors and Executive Committee, will head the 1964 Campaign as State Crusade Chairman.

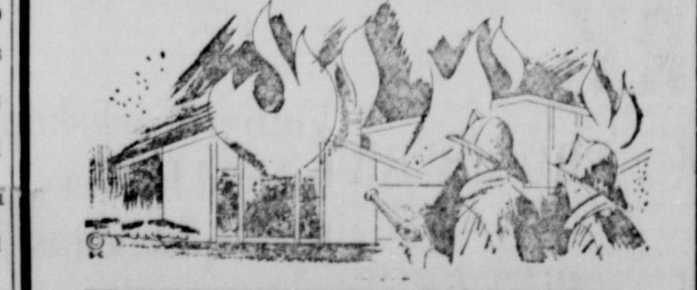

TOTAL OF 4,056 RESIDENTS OF COUNTY GET SS CHECKS

About one out of every five residents of Eastland County is now receiving a monthly social security check according to figures released by R. R. Tuley, Jr., Abilene, social security district manager.

Tuley's report listed the number of Eastland county beneficiaries as 4056 at the end of 1963 an increase of 221 over the corresponding figure at the beginning of 1963. The dollar benefit amounts total more than \$2,775,744 yearly.

Retired workers are the largest single group of social security beneficiaries in the County. There are 2229 in this group and their old-age insurance benefits total \$146,360 monthly.

In releasing the figures, Tuley pointed out that the social security benefits are important to the community as well as to the people who receive them. "It is a fact," he said "that almost every dollar of social security benefits coming into the County is spent each month in local businesses for food, clothing, shelter, and other essentials. In this way, the benefits have a stabilizing effect on the local economy."

Tuley forecast that the number of social security beneficiaries will continue to increase in the future, but at a much slower rate than in the past 10 years. He said that, nationally, the social security benefit rolls increased from about 5 million people in 1954 to more than 19 million at the end of 1963.

This rapid growth in the beneficiary population resulted from major amendments to the Social Security Act from 1950 through 1961. He cited several amendments which extended social security coverage to self-employed business and professional men, farmers and agricultural workers, and other groups.

As a result, several million people whose work was brought under social security are now receiving benefits.

Others qualified through amendments which reduced the amount of work needed to get benefits. One change—lowering the age at which older people can get benefits from 65 to 62—accounts for 1.8 million out of the 19 million people now entitled to benefits. The amendments also introduced a new protection under Social Security—disability benefits—and 1.5 million disabled workers and their dependents now receive benefits under the disability provisions of the law.

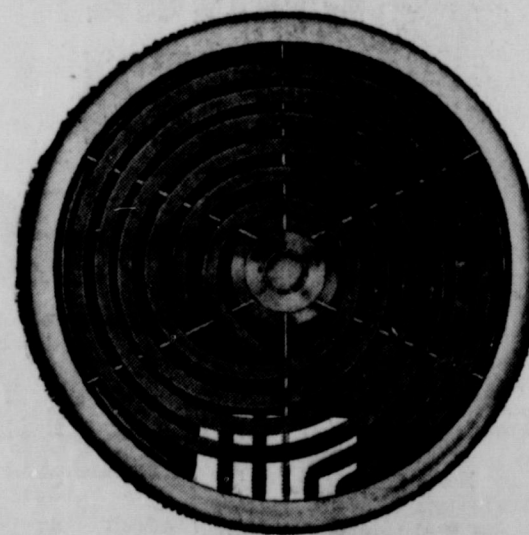

My work with the various county officials has afforded me the experience of county business management. I know that I am adequately qualified to fill the job which I am seeking.

"Having been a tax payer for some 30 years and raising a family of five sons, I am fully aware of the responsibility placed on public officials in the proper handling of public funds."
