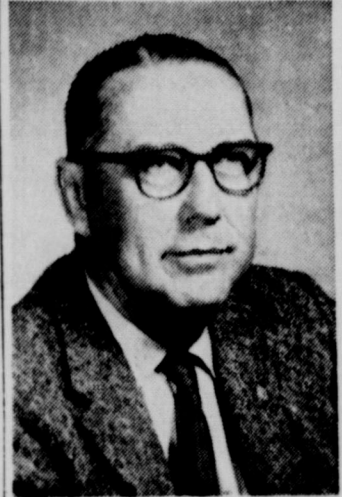

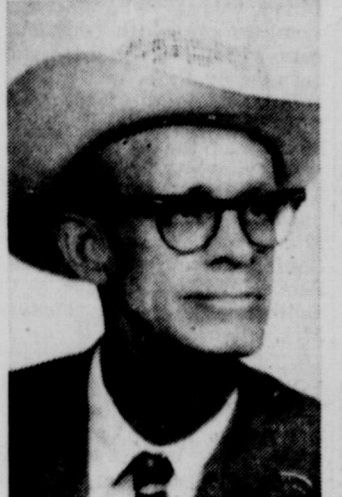

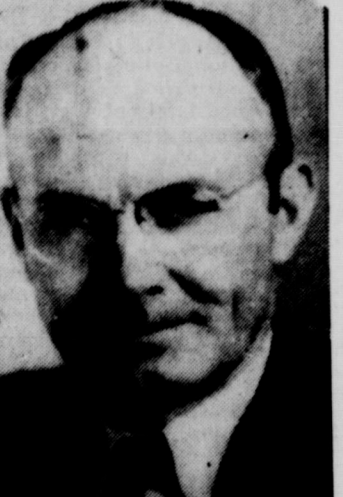

County Brush Control, Seeding Being Wound Up on Farms, Ranches

Eastland County farmers and ranchers are finishing brush control and range seeding operations this month. Among the ranchers and farmers who have done brush control and range seeding are: Bill Gattis, A. W. Harris, Bill Harrison, Ed Harrison, Don Montgomery, W. B. Wright, J. D. Griffin, Johnny Aaron, Ray Williams G. L. Wooley, James Couch, Sam Powers, and O. C. Stewart.

Proper grazing and maintenance of a feed reserve is of prime importance to any livestock operation. Grazing half and leaving half of the annual production is a good rule to follow. Above 50 percent use weakens the grass plants, stopping root growth for a period. Heavy use, 80 to 90 percent can kill a stand of grass.

The control of brush and the seeding to higher type grasses is just the first step. Management of the established grass is necessary to have a continuing operation. "How a pasture is grazed now, will determine if it will be grazable in years to come."

Technical and cost share assistance was provided through the Upper Leon and Palo Pinto Soil Conservation Districts and the Great Plains Conservation Program. These units represent all portions of the county and varied methods were used. The areas treated will be reseeded until about November 1 to give the grass a chance to become established.

Funeral for Lewis Ray Bryant, 17-year-old Cisco High School senior, was held Friday afternoon at Hamner Funeral Home in Eastland.

Mr. Arthur Steele Walker, 81-year-old Cisco man, died of injuries received in a three-vehicle crash between Eastland and Cisco last Saturday.

Joe Flores, 21, Eastland cafe worker, formerly of Cisco, was driver of the car and has been charged with murder without malice in Justice of the Peace Wells Dalton's court. Bond of \$3,000 has been posted for Flores and he was released. Flores received minor injuries.

Young Bryant was born Aug. 4, 1946, in Ranger and he was a member of the Church of Christ.

A student at Cisco High School, Bryant lived in Cisco with his father and stepmother, Mr. and Mrs. Buster L. Bryant. His mother, Mrs. Mary E. Bryant, lives in Sonora.

Survivors in addition to his father, stepmother, and mother are two brothers, Wayne and Jerry, both of Sonora; and his grandparents, Mrs. Ruth Chancellor of Cisco, and

Mrs. Dora Bryant of Olden. Pallbearers were Leon Ingram, Billy Pence, Billy Eudy, Buford Green, Willie Alexander, Mike Joyner, and Jerry Broom, all school classmates.

Young Bryant's death brings to two the number killed as the result of automobile accidents in Eastland County during a brief six-day period — and another man is in critical condition in a Fort Worth hospital as the result of a third vehicle collision.

Brown Upsets Conner In DA Race; Sublett Is Leader For Sheriff

Connally Leads By Wide Margin In Governor Race

Governor John Connally appeared on the way to a smashing victory in his bid for re-election as returns in the Democratic first primary swelled his margin in each report Saturday night. The 10 p. m. totals showed the governor with 176,000 to 65,000 for Don Yarborough.

Senator Ralph Yarborough took an early lead over challenger Gordon McLendon and held on as the returns continued to come in. The 10 o'clock figures showed 133,000 for Yarborough to 106,000 for McLendon.

Preston Smith was scoring a big margin of victory over Albert Fuentes for lieutenant governor with a 185,000 to 38,000 figure. John White had almost as impressive margin over Millard Shivers for agriculture commissioner, and the same was true in the land commissioner race with Jerry Sadler's votes totaling 160,000 to 54,000 for his opponent.

Jim Langdon had 135,000 to Jesse Owens 86,000 in the railroad commissioner's race, and Jack Pope was leading Sears McGee, 140,000 to 72,000 in the associate justice's race.

OMAR BURLESON Holds His Congress Seat

Burleson Victor

Congressman Omar Burleson appeared to have scored an impressive victory over Challenger Max Carriker as incomplete returns from his large district were counted Saturday night.

Eastland County gave Mr. Burleson a 3,456 to 1,453 victory. The biggest turnout — Taylor County with over 13,000 votes, showed Burleson 9,606 and Carriker 3,872 in incomplete returns.

Callahan County returns were, roughly, 1,500 for Burleson and 900 for Carriker. Carriker had a 250-vote margin of victory in Fisher County, but his home town of Roby was reported to have had a small margin of victory for Burleson.

Gibbens Wins

State Rep. Wayne Gibbens won re-election as the 63rd District's member of the House of Representatives by a margin of approximately 2 - to - 1 in the five county area he serves Saturday.

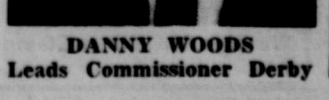

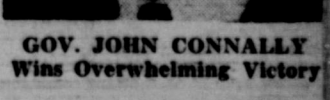

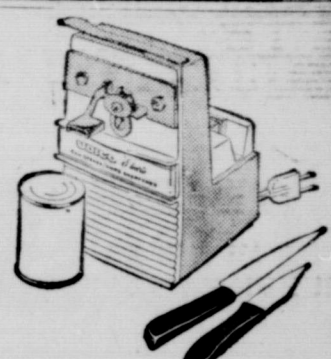

One visitor, Mrs. Dena Wareham was welcomed and the meeting was closed with a season of prayer.

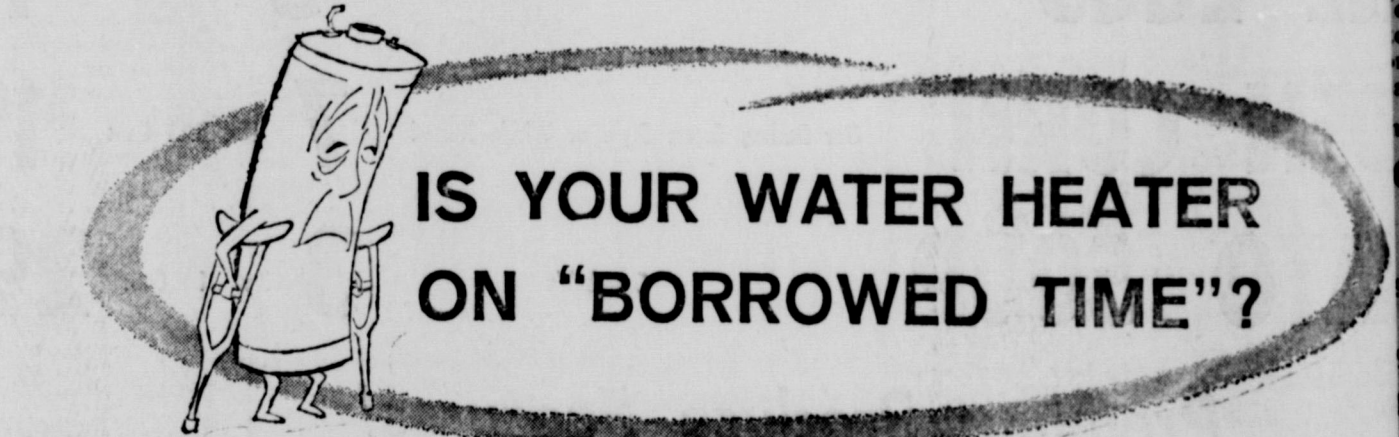

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Baptist Church Dedicated In June 1906

Kokomo is enjoying a new church building which has been dedicated at the present church building in 1959. The tract of land was donated by Mrs. A. H. Money and land was donated by members and friends to help.

\$500 was contributed by the Oldham Little Church Foundation of Houston. The First Missionary Baptist Church of Kokomo was first organized on the church covenant on June 9, 1906 with 13 charter members. The charter members were John Lasater, S. F. Hendricks, A. S. Shugart, S. S. Hopper, R. W. Hopper, T. C. Hopper, R. L. Lasater, A. W. Jones, Lillie McBeth, Hammett and Hendricks, all of which are now deceased. Reverend T. H. B. McAlaster was the first pastor.

In 1908 the church was given the name of Mount Olive. In 1911 it was changed to Mount Olive.

In the history of the church it has had only eight pastors. When Rev. McAlaster resigned in 1908, Rev. J. L. Mayes was called as pastor. Other pastors included Rev. Mason 1909; Rev. B. F. Clement 1912; Rev. Willie Skaggs-1916; Rev. Leslie Tonn-1956; Rev. Jerry Don Heath-1958; and the present pastor Rev. Buel Bryan.

Reverend Willie Skaggs was called as pastor in August 1916 and served faithfully for 40 years until ill health caused his resignation in August, 1956. Rev. Skaggs was from Comanche County and he rode his mule to the services in Kokomo.

The church met in brush arbor, the school building, under the tabernacle, and in the community building before the present building was built in 1959.

The oldest active members of the church are Mr. and Mrs. J. A. McNeely and A. B. Eaves. They united with the church when it was yet a young church.

Reverend Buel Bryan has been pastor of the church for the past two years. Rev. Bryan and his wife and two children live in Gorman. He works for the peanut Association in Gorman.

Mrs. J. N. Jordan is church secretary and Albert Hendricks is song leader. Deacons are Jim Jordan, Wayne White, Otis Rogers, Wayne Eaves and Bud Eaves.

Services are held each Sunday with Sunday School hour at 10 a.m.; morning worship at 11 a.m.; training union at 7 p.m.; and the evening worship at 8 p.m.

Mrs. Claude Fuller is pianist at the church. Glen Jordan is treasurer of the church.

Texas Industry Stock To Be On Stock Exchange

The common stock of Texas Industries, Inc. has been approved for listing on the New York Stock Exchange. Trading is scheduled to begin Monday, June 1, Charles Martin has announced.

In Eastland, Texas Lightweight Aggregate Co. is a division of Texas Industries. Mr. Martin is local manager.

Texas Industries owns a 23-plant complex in seven states producing cement, ready-mix, precast and prestressed elements, masonry units, aggregates and other construction materials.

The company began in 1956 with one aggregate plant, Eastland, total assets of \$356,000, and first year income of \$35,000 on sales of \$217,000. For the nine months ended February 29, 1964, the company reported sales of \$34,854,000 and net income of \$2,472,000 or \$1.54 per share on 1,571,501 common shares outstanding. Total assets at February 29 were \$37,612,000.

Texas Industries is currently paying common stock dividends at the annual rate of 30 cents per share and has declared 4 per cent stock dividends during each of the last three years.

Rainfall Is 2.27 for April 7.21 for Year

Rainfall in Eastland was almost average for the month, but not quite, and rainfall for the first four months was almost average, but again, not quite.

The 2.27 inches that fell in April brought the year's total to 7.21 which is about a half inch below the average through April of 7.75, Official Weather Observer James Smith reported.

Melinda underwent surgery at the Methodist Hospital in Houston April 3th. She returned to her home here April 21st by ambulance. She must remain in bed most of the time and is only able to either stand or lie down. She wears a body cast and will not be able to be in a sitting position for some time.

The curvature of the spine was first noticed by her family doctor when she was taken for examination after a backache had been persistent. He recommended a specialist in Fort Worth, where she went for several months therapy.

Her condition grew worse and she was advised to see an orthopedic surgeon in Houston. Having an S curve, instrumentation and fusion was recommended on her spine. The Houston physician invented the method he uses in the operation for correction of the scoliotic spine.

There were four other girls in the Houston hospital who had also undergone surgery for scoliosis at the time Melinda was there.

Melinda attended Eastland High School until April 3rd. She was a sophomore student.

She plans to continue her studies next fall, although part of the time will have to be at home. She enjoys watching television and likes to have lots of company, according to her mother, Mrs. Urban.

Some PO Service Being Cut Here For Economy

Eastland Post office will have a cut back in parcel post deliveries and Saturday window service, effective May 4, as announced by Postmaster Marene Johnson.

This restrictive service is in keeping with the economy measures requested by President Lyndon B. Johnson to help pay for the recent income tax reduction.

The Postmaster General, Mr. John Gronouski issued a directive calling for the restriction of Parcel Post delivery one day per week, leaving the day selected to the selection of the local Postmasters, and for Saturday curtailment of accepting money order, box rents, meter settings, postal savings and claims and inquiries. Only the General Delivery window service will be available for accepting packages for mailing and sale of stamps, as usual. This office has selected Tuesday, its lightest day for mail.

All foot routes will be affected. If they have mail by foot carriers they will not get packages on Tuesday. Rural Route carriers will not accept money orders on Saturdays.

First day for this new policy to take effect will be Tuesday, May 4th.

We very much regret any inconvenience to our patrons while at the same time we appreciate the privilege of a tax cut for so little sacrifice, Mrs. Johnson said.

No exceptions can be made in the service outlined above, as explained from the directive, she said.

WTRC Needs Help Lions Told At Regular Meet

The West Texas Rehabilitation Center is not receiving enough help from this area, Shelley Smith, executive director, told the Eastland Lions Club Tuesday.

Speaking at the regular luncheon, Mr. Smith pointed out that the Center is treating patients from this area as well as from a far distance, and that the 11-year-old organization now has over 1,000 patients, treating some 180 to 200 daily.

The Center's patient load is 60 per cent adult, he said, disclaiming the common impression that children only are treated. The WTRC received no tax support and wants none as long as it can function without it, he pointed out.

HD Agent To Attend Workshop

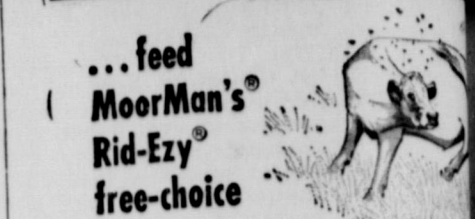

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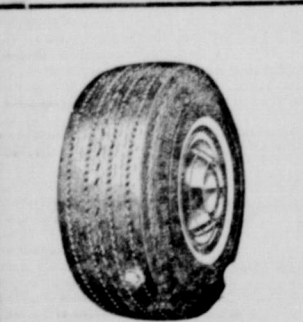
