Funeral for Roy Clifton McClelland, 44-year-old Cisco man who was killed shortly after 10 a.m. Friday in an explosion at a tank factory, will be held at 3 p.m. Sunday at the East Cisco Baptist Church. Officiating will be the Rev. Tex Culp, pastor. Burial will be in Oakwood Cemetery under direction of Hamner Funeral Home.

McClelland was shop foreman at Sandler Manufacturing Co. He lived only 15 minutes after the accident. The explosion occurred while he was testing a completed oilfield tank.

#### Career of Law Enforcement Open In Patrol

Patrolman Lee Strawn of the Highway Patrol announced today the Department of Public Safety is looking for young men between the ages of 21 to 35 who are interested in a career of law enforcement with the Texas Highway Patrol.

Applications are being accepted and examinations will be given in the near future for appointment to the DPS Academy.

Qualifications for men 21 to 35 years of age, not less than 5 feet, 8 inches in bare feet, weigh at least 2 pounds for each inch of height, must pass a rigid physical test, have a high school education, must be a citizen of the United States and a resident of Texas for one year prior to application and of good moral character, with a sound credit rating.

Patrolman Strawn and Alfred White said they will be at the Sheriff's Office in Eastland on March 14 from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. to confer with anyone interested and will answer any questions that applicants may have.

Fair and continued warm today, tonight and Sunday. High temperature both days near 80, low Saturday night near 50.

County Agricultural Agent J. M. Cooper, who went out into the orchards Friday afternoon to make sure what had happened to the peach crop in Wednesday night's freeze, said:

"There was quite a bit of damage, all right, but we'll still make lots of peaches, if we don't get another freeze."

Agent Cooper said that it was impossible to be certain about the effect until Friday.

"It was only Friday afternoon that enough time had elapsed to tell for sure," he said. "Then it was necessary to pinch off the bloom and examine the little peach underneath."

Mr. Cooper said that the apricots were affected similarly to the peaches. He said that he hadn't yet examined the pears and plums, crops that, under favorable conditions, furnish the county considerable fruit each year.

There are several commercial peach orchards in this area, particularly south of here and in the nearby DeLeon section, and many householders grow a few trees. Peaches, apricots, pears and plums have been in bloom.

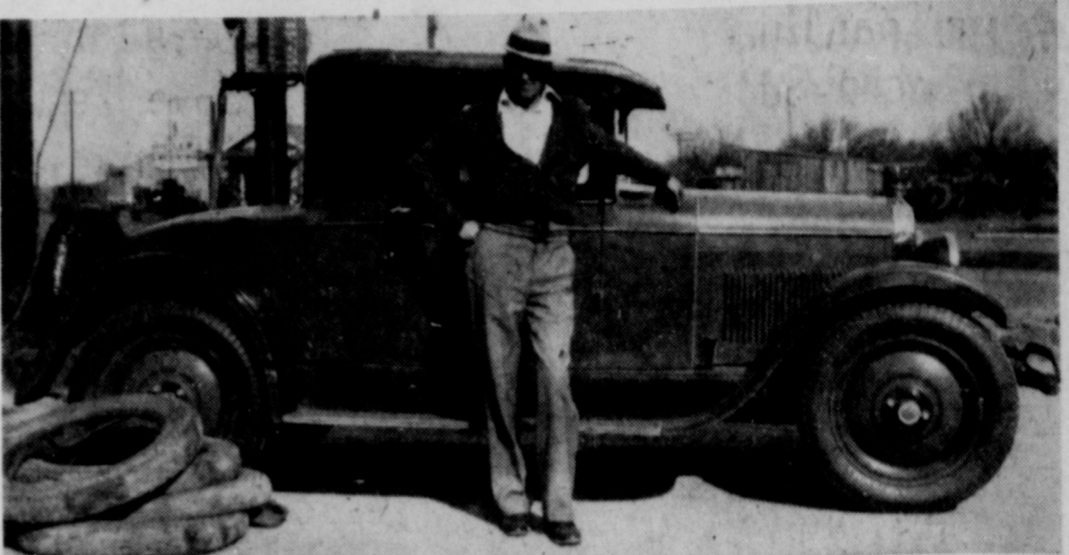
