Local UF Dollars Help In Big Cerebral Palsy Cure Program

The United Cerebral Palsy Association will receive \$150 from the Eastland United Fund and the federal government's budget for neurological research has increased from \$29,403,000 in 1955 to \$87,675,000 in 1964.

The loss of muscular control, known as cerebral palsy, is the result of a brain damage before, during or shortly after birth. This crippling disease sometimes occurs as the result of accidents, head injuries, or even strokes.

One of the main purposes of the United Cerebral Palsy Association is to provide medical and training programs to fit the needs of the effected child or adult.

When a dollar is received for the United Cerebral Palsy, 70 cents of that dollar goes for local patient help; 25 cents goes to the National Organization's administration, research and educational funds.

County Young Farmers' A&M Course Is Set

A short course for young farmers will begin Monday under the sponsorship of the County Young Farmers' Association and the Agricultural Department of the Vocational Division of the Extension Agency and will be held at the County Young Farmers' A&M Center in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in the series of four will be held Oct. 27, 28 and 29. During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Nix will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Gib Copeland.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent of schools, Mr. Hilliard, or the teacher of vocational agriculture, Mr. Copeland of Olden; B. S. Dudley, Jr. of Ranger; or Dub Sims of Eastland. An entry fee of \$2 will be charged. Pasture Short Course Certificates are training sessions. Mr. Nix states that the short course will be adjusted to wishes and interests of farmers enrolled but that he expects to cover such subjects

as adapted grasses and legumes, fertilization, weed control, grazing management and grazing systems. The primary purpose of the course is helping farmers and ranchers to make the most profit from their pastures.

"Short courses in pasture, as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under the new cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M University," stated Bob Jaska, associate professor, Department of Agricultural Education at Texas A&M, who coordinates the program for Texas A&M.

"This cooperative program," stated Jaska, "is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. Such a program will enable teachers of vocational agriculture to provide improved educational services to farm people."

Specialists are now available in the fields of beef production, insect control, farm management, farm electrification, farm arc welding, swine production, tractor maintenance, dairy science, oxy-acetylene welding, and pasture.

Buster belongs to Mrs. Vera Dee Kleiner, Box 743, Eastland; and Mrs. H. L. Steddum, Route 1, Cisco. He is kept at Mrs. Steddum's place three miles west and four miles north of Cisco.

The Steddums work on the Bill Mitcham heretofore ranch, where Buster is used as a working cowhorse. It doesn't bother him to put in 3 or 4 hard hours; for when he's brought back in from a days work, he is always fresher than any of the other horses, his owners say.

"We are going to buy some pony mares in December and January to cross with Buster," Mrs. Kleiner said. "We will start with solid pony mares and raise, buy and trade until we have an all regular herd of P. O. A. mares."

Pony of the Americas is a breed — a miniature western type. The pony sought is a miniature cross with the beauty of the Arab and the durability of the Quarter horse plus the flash, color and characteristics of the Appaloosa.

Mrs. Kleiner said. These ponies are 46 to 54 inches in height, big and strong enough for the late teenager to ride and use, and can be trained by an adult if desired.

These ponies have a very tractable disposition, easily handled by children and they

respond quickly and very naturally to the situation at hand, whether it be roping or riding.

Buster, as with all P. O. A.'s is so gentle Mrs. Steddum's six-year old daughter, Viola is learning how to ride him. In a few years, Viola will be showing the P. O. A.'s along with her mother.

The P. O. A.'s may be shown at halter by anyone, but to be shown in performance they must be ridden by children 17 years old or under.

Rotarians Hear About Scouting

"Reaching the boy in Scouting" was program for the Eastland Rotary Club Monday as local Scout Executive Roland McFarland discussed the many avenues of the Boy Scout program.

The Boy Scouts are one of nine participating agencies of the Eastland United Fund. Guests included Gordon Smith of Brownwood, Morris Newnham of Ranger, I. L. Bradley of Cisco and Eastland High School Senior Jeanie Hanna.

Selected quotes from Scoutman McFarland's talk follow:

"The Boy Scouts of America is composed of three different phases:

"The Cub Scout program, for boys of 8, 9, and 10 years of age.

"The cub program is carried on in the home and in small neighborhood groups, called dens, meeting weekly under the leadership of a woman called a Den Mother, assisted by a Boy Scout called a Den Chief. There is an age - graded program of achievement leading to the ranks of Wolf, Bear and Lion. By encouraging the den and its members to start projects that need parent assistance for completion and by requiring the parent to certify that boys have done their best in meeting each achievement — the program provides opportunities for close parent-boy relationship.

"Boy scouting is a program for boys, age 11 through 17, designed primarily to achieve objectives in character building, citizenship training, and physical fitness.

"It seeks thru a vigorous outdoor program to inculcate in boys concepts of honor, duty to God and country, service to others and self-respect. The fundamental unit for the achievement of these goals is the Patrol — a group of boys numbering four to eight members — who elect their own patrol leader.

"A Troop, made up of one or more patrols, is led by a scoutmaster (with assistants according to need) whose primary role is to train and guide boy leaders to run their own troop. This he does thru a representative body known as the patrol leaders council. In this council patrol leaders report patrol ideas for activity and take council decisions and plans back to their patrols. In this fashion boys experience self-government and democratic living on a level they can understand.

"Exploring is a program for high-school age boys, designed to provide opportunities for them to explore adult-like roles and prompted by the Boy Scouts of America to teach and re-enforce certain broad ethical aims.

"Exploring places emphasis on providing experience in (1) developing social skills (2) learning about a variety of vocations, (3) developing an appreciation of the out-of-doors, (4) encouraging personal fitness, (5) giving service to the community, and (6) enlarging the concept of the responsibilities and benefits of citizenship in a free society.

"As I have stated before, the fundamental aims of the boy scout movement are character development, citizenship training and physical fitness."

A child is born with this dreadful disease every 53 minutes; and out every thousand persons, there are three cerebral palsied.

More information on care of the cerebral palsied has been given to professional people since 1949, by UCP. This organization should be commended on the progress it has made, in its short history, toward serving cerebral palsied.

People who have this disease require special attention throughout their entire lives. There are few communities that are adequately equipped to treat the cerebral palsied.

This is the first year the local UF has benefited the Cerebral Palsy Association.
