



appear on the market. Some of these new fabrics present sewing problems. One of the most popular newer fabrics has been the stretch fabrics.

An early dislike for 'stretch" was developed by everyone, as those who were wearing the garments made from stretch fabric were wearing them "skin-tight." This fabric was not meant to be worn this way, but rather, the stretch in the fabric was intended to provide comfort and extra ease. Keep this in mind when buying stretch fabric or garments - buy your regular size garment or pattern.

There are three types of stretch fabric:

1. Crosswise stretch (sometimes called Filling Stretch)

2. Lengthwise stretch (sometimes called Warp Stretch) This is good for long pants; however they will need a stirrup under the foot. 3. Two-way stretch. This fabric stretches in both lengthwise and crosswise direction and is primarily used in undergarments and swim-






