Town-Wide Spring Clean-Up Goes Into Action With League Sponsor

Community Pick-Up By City Is Arranged For Monday, April 9

A movement has been set into motion for a town-wide clean-up campaign which is expected to make Eastland a spic and span town with spring freshness, under Civic League and Garden Club sponsorship.

The present theme of the project is that of tidying up ahead of a town-wide trash pick-up, set for Monday, April 9.

Spearheading the campaign is the following committee from the Civic League and Garden Club, which is working hand-in-glove with the city in the movement: Mrs. E. E. Freyschlag, chairman, and Mmes. V. T. Seaberry, M. H. Perry, Bill Frost, L. E. McGraw, and Iral Inzer.

"We are very anxious for everyone about the community to start now in this civic improvement, checking about properties and making them tidy in every way," said Mrs. Freyschlag.

"These spring renovations oftentimes are called Clean Up, Paint Up and Fix Up campaigns—and, of course, it is fine to take care of all these things. Of most interest to us, just now, is the clean up phase.

"City Manager Taylor advises us that the city truck will make a one-day run—the 9th—and for which there will be no charge to the citizenry. He does request, however, that people be sure to place their rubbish close to the curb so that it may be picked up readily.

"There is only one exception, for the pickup. The truck being used will not be equipped to handle such big objects as trees. But those who have such material at hand, may take them to the east side of the city dump, where a city employ will be on duty; or they may phone the city and list them for a paid-pick up at a designated date.

"We are having wonderful cooperation from the city authorities, which we deeply appreciate, and feel sure that we may look forward to fine teamwork from the people of the community, in tidying up their places, also."

"That the contributions in the Easter Seal campaign be completed this week-end was being urged today, as the movement reaches its climax at Easter-time.

heaviest artillery piece assigned to the 49th Armored Division.

The 648th was called into active Federal service 25 November 1940 as Hq & Hq Btry, 2 Bn., 131st Field Artillery Regiment, Texas National Guard. In 1942 it was redesignated as a part of the 202d FA Regiment where it remained throughout World War II. In May 1948, after reorganization of the National Guard, it was designated Hq & Hq Btry, 931st FA Battalion and in 1949 was designated the 648th Armored Field Artillery Battalion and assigned to the 49th Armored Division.

The 648th is authorized, for World War II combat service in the European - African - Middle East theatre of operations, stream-

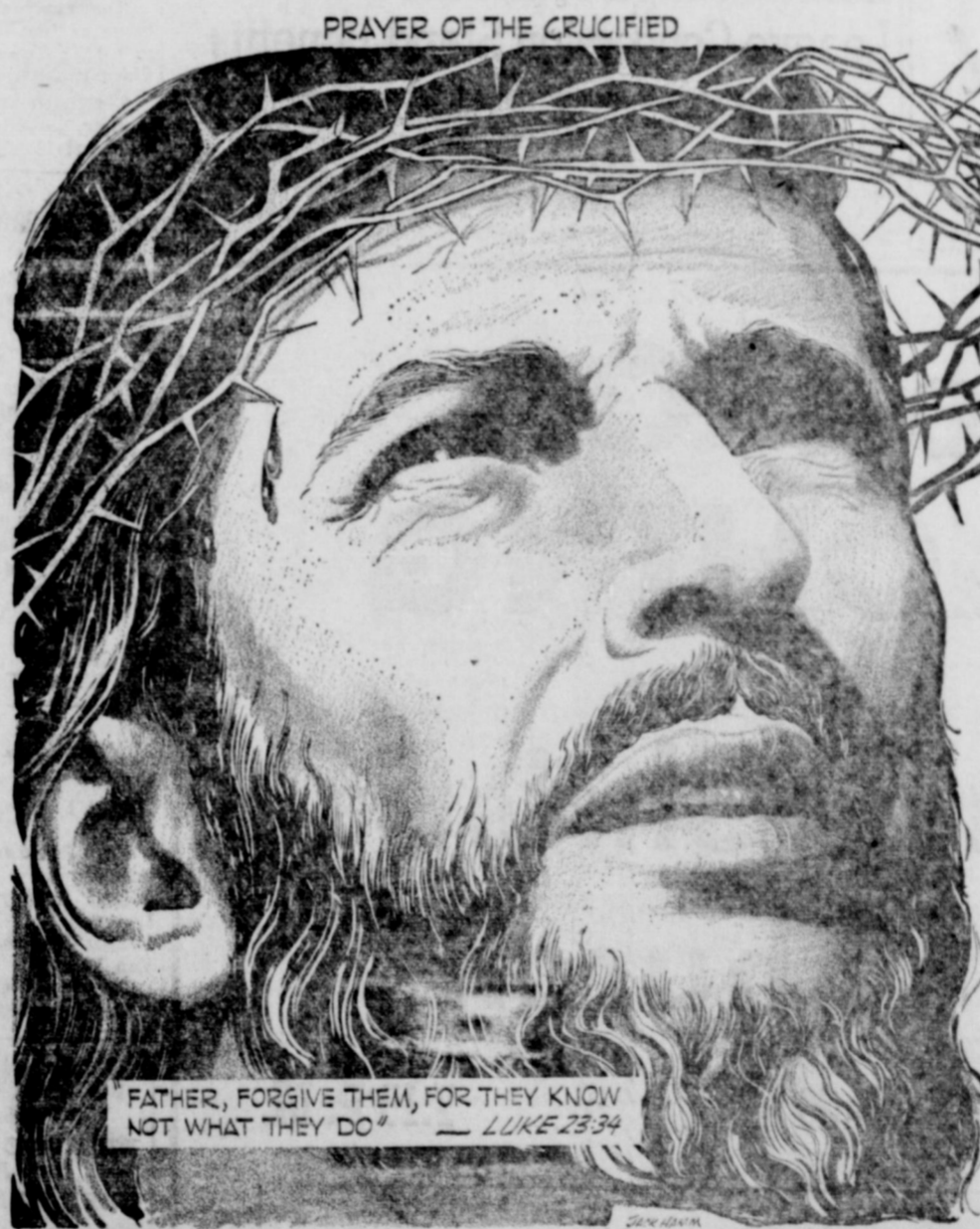

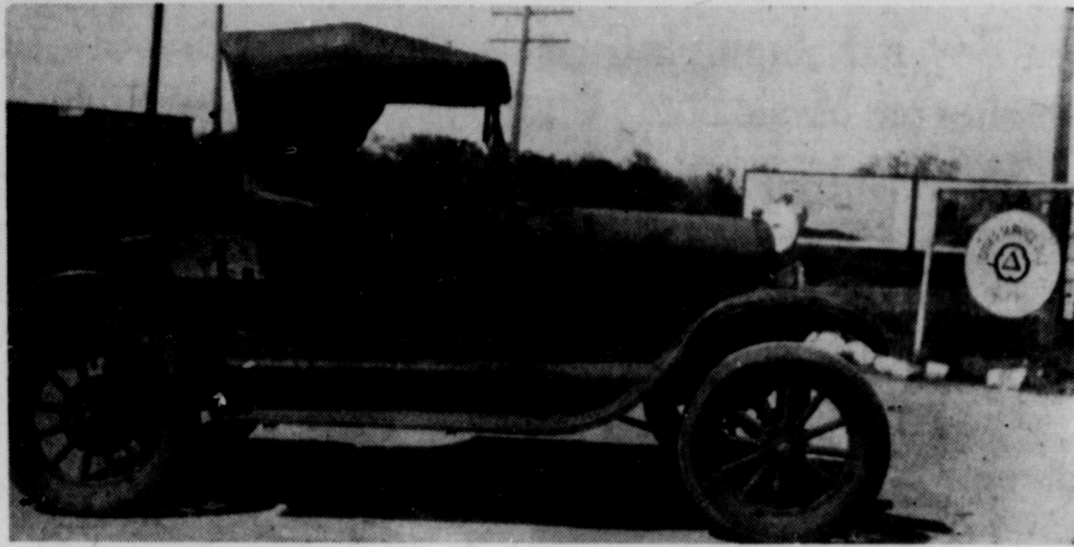

Coffee users may possibly get a break in the price of the brew within a few days as General Foods has announced it will cut the price of its regular ground coffee by three cents a pound, effective immediately. Brands affected by the price cut are Maxwell House, Yuban, Sanka and Kaffee Hag.

The price cut was the first announced since a series of three rises in February increased the price of coffee by a total of nine cents a pound.

As usual, whether the wholesale price goes up or down, it is several days before it is reflected on local retail shelves.

The government started an investigation recently to find out who was getting all the money for high price coffee. It was said the local merchants were certainly not getting it because coffee was almost invariably sold as a "loss leader" in all retail stores.

Following the General Foods price cut, it is expected that other coffee roasters will bring their prices in line.

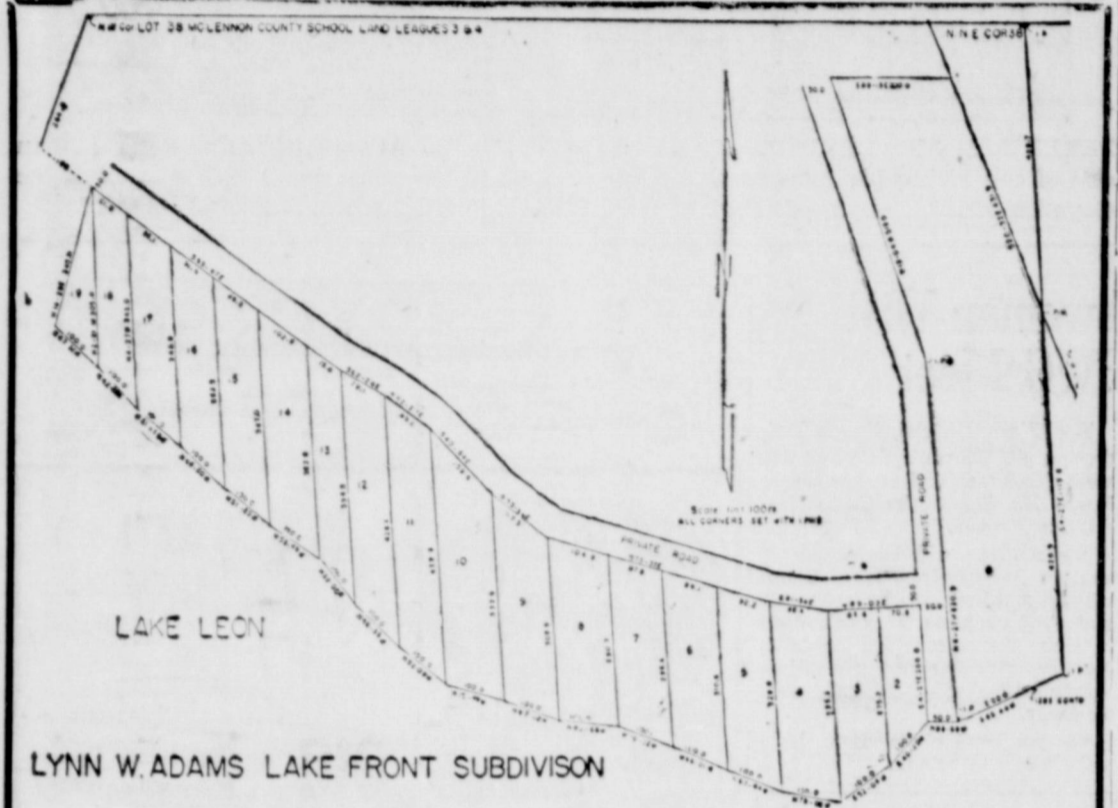
