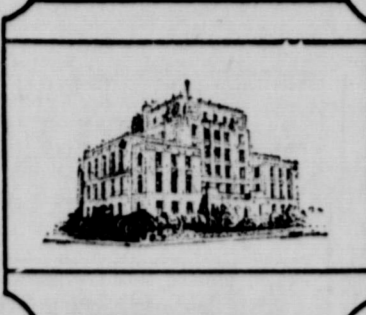

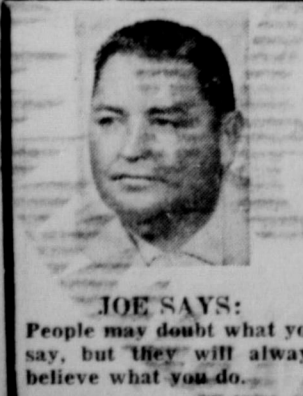

No sooner had the 49th returned home in 1962 than the Cuban crisis caused dark clouds. And in 1963, while the division was at Fort Hood, a flare-up in Korea kept men of the 49th on their toes during training.

This year, the Viet Nam situation has filled the air with uncertainty as the 49th treks to camp.

Crisis or no crisis, the 49th Armored Division and its 100 units will find its training rugged as ever, with no slow-down anticipated during its 15 days of active duty training.

The division will hold its annual mounted review on Saturday, July 24, and will return to its home stations on Aug. 1.

File For Farm Gas Tax Refund

Farmers and ranchers of Eastland County were reminded Friday that claims for the Federal Gas Refund must be submitted before September 30. The claim may be filed only by the owner, tenant, or operator of a farm situated in the United States and operated as a trade or business.

This refund is on the four cent per gallon excise tax paid on gasoline and diesel fuel used by operators on their farm during the period of July 1, 1964 to June 30, 1965. This refund has no connections with the claims for refunds sent to the State Comptroller office.

The gasoline used on an operator's farm by custom contractors is also eligible for the refund, but that used in highway travel is not. The special postcard form, 2240 is the proper one to use to submit fuel claims, and they have been mailed to operators who reported in 1964.

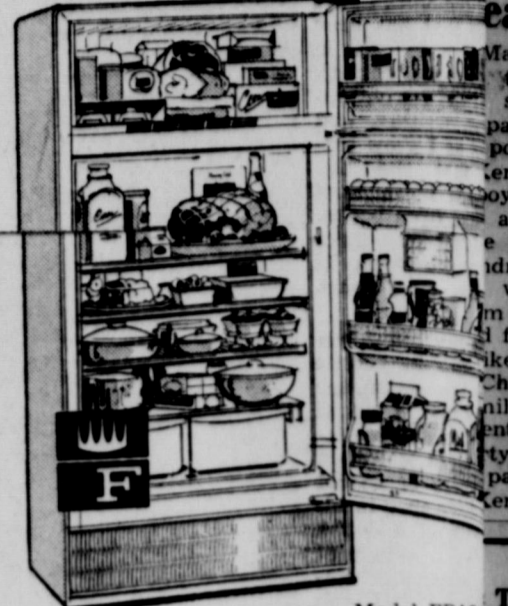

First Federal Distributes Top Dividends
