

# File For Farm Gas Tax Refund

Farmers and ranchers of Eastland County were reminded Friday that claims for the Federal Gas Refund must be submitted before September 30th. The claim may be filed only be the owner, tenant, or operator of a farm situated in the United States and operated as a trade or business.

This refund is on the four cent per gallon excise tax paid on gasoline and diesel fuel used by operators on their farm during the period of July 1, 1964 to June 30, 1965. This refund has no connections with the claims for refunds sent to the State entroller office.

The gasoline used on an onerator's farm by custom contractors is also eligible for the refund, but that used in highway travel is not. The snecial postcard form, 2240 is the proper one to use to submit fuel claims, and they have been mailed to operators who reported in 1964.

New farmers and those who have not received the Form 2240 may obtain one from the Farm Bureau office at 208

West Commerce, Eastland. Farm Bureau was instrumental in obtaining both the state and federal tax refund for non-highway-used gasoline, it was reported.
