Use Lots of Water: It's Cheap and Too, Rain May Not Be Near

The lakes, public pools and backyard wadders are presently getting good work out as Eastlanders seek cooling refuge from the torrid dry heat. Thursday will mark the 30th rainless day, and will be marked unquestionably by the continued spinning of lawn sprinklers, soakers and truck patch irrigation as locals do their best to keep lawns, yards and gardens alive. Farmers, too, who were lucky this year with early spring rains that set grass in high gear, are beginning to hurt as the soaring temperatures and dry days bake grazing acreage. City dwellers are taking advantage of the City's Summer Water Rate, which is geared to encourage high usage — the more you use, the cheaper it gets. After the initial 10,000 gallons, the cost per thousand drops from 40 to 30 cents, and most are "leaving the hoses going" to keep yards pretty. No rain has been recorded during the month, according to Official Weather Observer James Smith. Last moisture (Continued on page 4)

Entire County To Benefit From Results Forthcoming Employment Survey Here

The entire Eastland County area will benefit from an employment survey which is being launched to accurately measure the amount and the type of labor available in the area. Statistical data from the survey will, in the words of Mr. Howard Maddox, Texas Electric Service Co. area development specialist, "Be another tool to lure industry to this area." Prospects want to know, not hear guesses, about how many employees are available, he explained during a planning session in Eastland Tuesday evening. Representatives from Ranger, Cisco, Eastland and Gorman were present to help map out details for the survey which will be begun very soon. Jack Arrington of Eastland was named by the group to coordinate the details of the survey. The formal name selected is Eastland County Employment Survey. Emphasis was directed to the fact that the survey is not an application for work, but the tabulated results will be used to determine how many people there are in the county — men and women — who are available for work IF a new employer moves here and wants to hire help. This puts importance to every citizen's consideration of the survey and doing every thing possible to make the results as accurate as possible. Arrington began Wednesday morning checking post offices in the county to determine the number of patrons, both in towns and on rural routes, to find out how many forms are going to be needed. Printing will begin immediately and everyone is being urged to "watch for" the Employment Survey Envelope and be ready to fill it out and return it. Maddox has assisted in five previous such surveys, Sweetwater, Snyder, Midland, Odessa and Colorado City. He called the industry-seeking business the most competitive in the world. There are some 15,000 organizations actively luring industry and we need every tool we can get to insure (Continued on page 2)

City Declares Nuisance, Changes 2-Block Parking, Cracks Down On Speed

City commissioners realigned parking on two blocks, declared a vacant building a nuisance and were generally agreed to a plan to turn the American Legion facilities on Park Hill over to the Volunteer Fire Department, during a regular meeting at City Hall Monday evening. All commissioners were present except Dr. M. A. Treadwell who is vacationing, and guests included Fire Chief Wayne Jackson and several volunteer firemen and Shorty Harper, representing the American Legion Post. The designation of unsafe and dangerous was lodged against a deserted motel on East Main St. about four blocks from the square, and the commission voted on a motion by Commissioner Curtis Koen to declare the site a nuisance under the recently enacted health and sanitation ordinance. Commissioners also held discussion on the sewerage plant and instructed City Manager Lewis Tiner to investigate recommended chemicals for possible use at the plant. 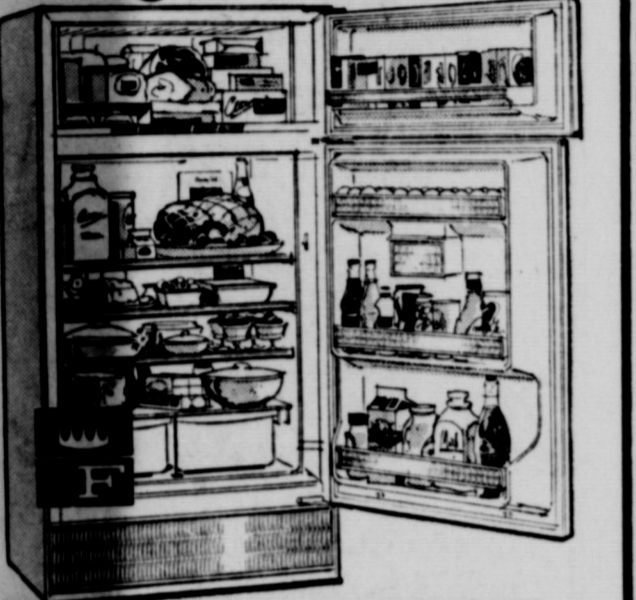

measurable was on the 22nd of June when .14 of an inch fell. Nine days prior to that had been dry with .18 of an inch on the 12th. Almost an inch (.90) fell on the fifth, making up the total of 1.22 inches for June.

The summer water rate and the early spring rains (8.48 inches in May) account for the present good condition of vegetation in the county.

The dry June apparently is responsible for late maturing peaches. One orchardman reports that "July Elbertas" which should have been ripened by the early part of the month, are just now coming off.

The City doesn't especially appreciate the dry weather, but it does welcome the continued use of more water, because naturally, it has to sell more at the reduced rate in order to break even.

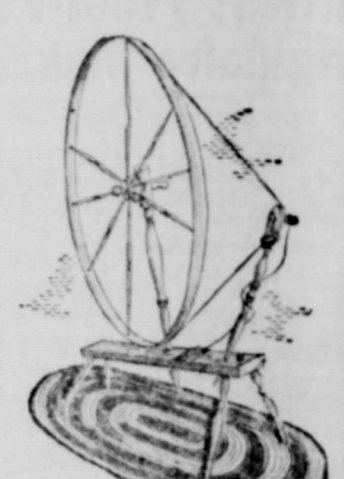

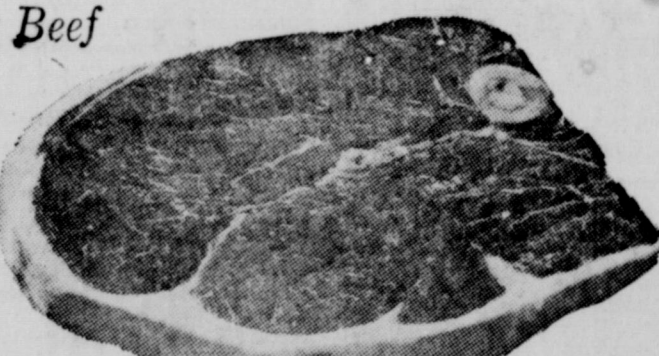
