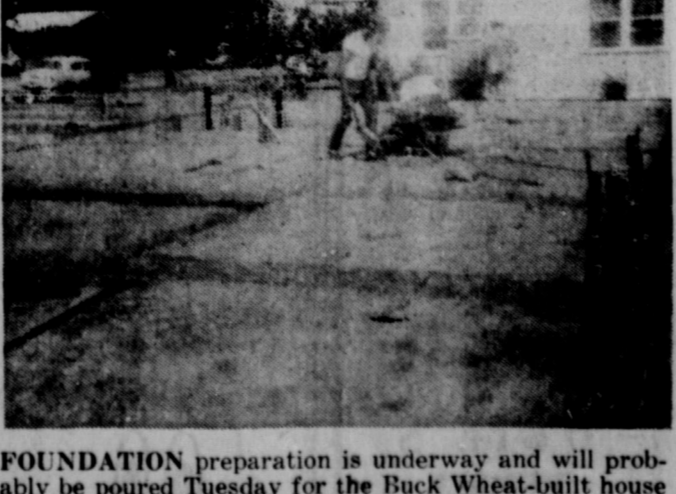

 Curbing is to get underway in the new development early this coming week, and water, sewerage and utilities will be tied in, Builder L. E. Jones said.

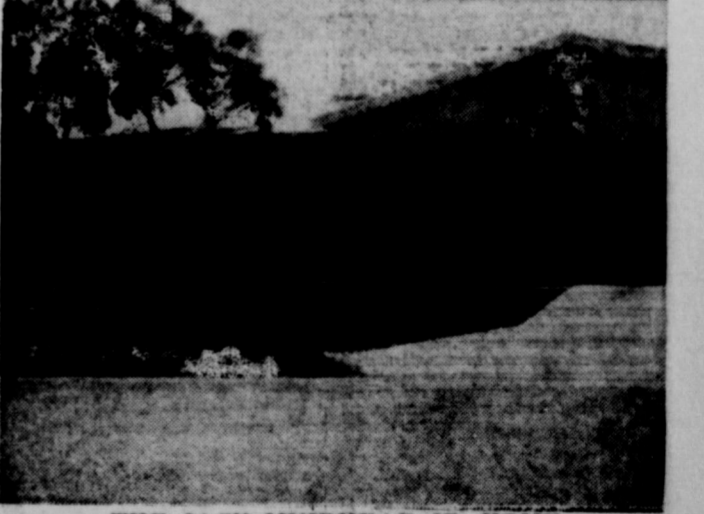

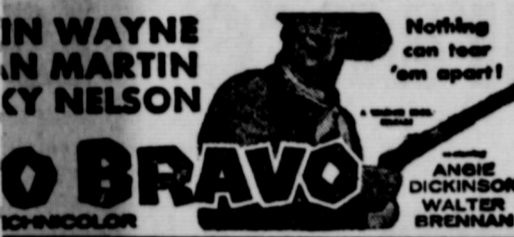

# Automobile Insurance Rates Are Going Up Aug. 1 And Here's Why

Automobile insurance rates are going up beginning Aug. 1, and a lot of Eastland Countyans are asking why?

There are, of course, some very good answers to those "why's".

But more importantly, drivers need to remember, that even with the upcoming increases, Texas automobile insurance, and particularly insurance bought in Eastland County is still one of the best buys in the United States.

Texas automobile insurance rates are made by Texas drivers. The State Board of Insurance sets the rates by using the records made by insured Texas drivers. How do these records look? Not very good.

There were 454,762 traffic accidents in the state last year. That's an increase of 45.3 per cent more accidents than there were in 1960. More accidents mean more insurance losses. More losses demand higher rates — it's simple arithmetic. (Totals for the five years: 1960 — 312,242; 1961 — 324,149; 1962 — 360,206

1963 — 399,917; and 454,762 in 1964.)

Rising hospital costs is another important factor. The average daily cost in Texas hospitals was \$33.68 in 1961. By 1964, the average daily charge had risen to \$39.40. Increased hospital costs push upward the cost of personal injury automobile accidents. Higher accident costs call for higher insurance rates. (The average hospital cost per case was \$189 in 1960; \$205 in 1961; \$217 in 1962; 232 in 1963 and \$254 in 1964.)

Statistics on file with Eastland County Independent Insurance Agents show that bodily injury claims are increasing in both number and cost. The number of claims has risen 42 per cent and the amount paid out in claims of this type is up 37.5 per cent, but the numbers of insured cars increased only 28.5 per cent. This means that the loss producing element (number of claims is increasing more rapidly than the premium producing element (number of cars insured).

The property damage figures are similar. Here a 61 per cent increase in the dollar amount and a 47.5 per cent increase in the number of claims emphasizes the need for increasing auto insurance rates. When claims go up, rates must follow.

The state is divided into 26 rating territories. This means that the drivers in an area pay the insurance rates they make. The more money paid out for claims per 100 insured vehicles in a territory, the higher the rates must be in that territory.

The territory in which this county is located has an exceptionally low property damage claim cost record and a relatively low bodily injury claim cost record, compared to the other 25 territories, meaning that rates will be more favorable here, than say in Houston, or Dallas.

The loss cost per car (the average amount paid out in losses on the average auto) for both 50 and \$100 deductible collision insurance is climbing — \$50 deductible up 26.5 per cent since 1962, and up 30.3 per cent on \$100 deductible since '62 statewide. When loss costs go up, rates must follow, local independent agents will tell you.

Big question: by what per cent are rates going up? Impossible to average, because of the multitude of factors that affect insurance rates: territory, type of vehicle, use of vehicle, age of driver (s), etc.

Best bet, is to talk with your Independent Insurance Agent and let him consider your individual needs and costs.

## Work Is Near Completion On New Highway 206

Work was near completion last week on State Highway 206, the new Coleman-Cisco highway.

Brownwood district engineer for the State Highway Department, E. M. Pritchard, announced that construction on a 13.897-mile segment of the road from near Cisco to FM 369 (one mile north of the Sabanno Church), is expected to be completed in September or October.

The new highway, which runs from U. S. 67 near Coleman through Burkett and Cross Plains to U. S. 80 one mile west of Cisco, will then be complete.

Jake Roberts, district engineer for Highway District No. 8, directed building of a small stretch of the highway, where it crosses the south-eastern corner of Callahan County. The remainder is being built under direction of Mr. Pritchard.

## Three County Firemen Attend A & M Course As Farm Bureau Project

Bill Green of Eastland, James Donham of Cisco and Ray Williams of Gorman have been selected to attend the 36th annual Texas Firemen's Training School, according to an announcement made recently by Jack Cozart, President of the Eastland County Farm Bureau.

Mr. Cozart said that the Eastland County Farm Bureau in cooperation with the Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies and the Texas Farm Bureau is sending these men to this school in the interest of saving lives and property through better trained firemen.

Eastland County Farm Bureau Board of Directors voted to sponsor a fireman from each town in the community; however, the three were the only ones able to attend.

The school is being held on the campus of Texas A & M University, July 25-30, with courses dealing with uses of new equipment, as well as new fighting techniques.

Green, Donham, and William are three of 140 men throughout the state whose attendance at this school is being sponsored by the Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies and the County and State Farm Bureaus.

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# Lack Of Facts Clouds County Schools' Ideas About Fed Programs

Whether schools in Eastland County will participate in the federal government's recently passed aid-to-education program appears to be a matter of continued conjecture, until all the details pertaining to the program are known here.

Representatives of the Texas Education Association were in Eastland this past week to discuss certain portions of the Title I of Public Law 89-10 for a meeting of county school superintendents at the courthouse.

Title I provides, as it is generally understood here, that each district would receive certain funds for "enrichment" programs, based

on the number of students whose parents' income were less than \$2,000 per year, based on the 1960 census.

It isn't known for certain whether all the districts in the county would have to agree to go into the program for any to qualify, but it is believed that it would be necessary.

The 1960 census (taken in 1959) reports that there were 623 such students in the county school district at that time: 214 in Ranger; 76 in Rising Star; 37 in Olden; 11 in Desdemona; 21 in Cross Plains; 19 in Carbon; 103 in Cisco; 43 in Gorman; and 99 in Eastland.

Each of the students would reportedly be worth some \$180 each to the individual district under the program—Rising Star, \$13,580; Olden, \$6,660; Desdemona, \$1,980; Cross Plains, \$3,680; Carbon, \$3,470; Cisco, \$18,540; Gorman, \$7,740; and Eastland, \$17,820.

The funds are to be used, it is said, for additional library books, more teachers, special training programs, etc., which will enrich the education program.

A more detailed meeting is to be held in Mineral Wells Aug. 4, it is reported.

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## 'No Sickness' In This County In 1890, Man Tells Brother

(ED. NOTE: This is a copy of a letter written just before the turn of the century by a then-new Eastland Countian to his brother, a Missouri resident. Arch Byrd, the man to whom the letter was addressed, did come to the county, and was the father of T. A. and M. H. Byrd, both now of Carbon. Copies of the letter have been presented to the Eastland County Historical Survey Committee.)

"Be sure to direct your letters to Ranger, Eastland County, Texas.

Ranger, Eastland County, Tex. Mr. Arch Byrd

"Dear Brother I will write you a few lines. I received your letter a few days back and was glad to hear from you and was sorry to hear that you did not feel well. Hope you will be better when this is in your presents and the contents of the same is examined by you. This leaves me

well at present and still satisfied with the country.

"Now I need not tell you that this is a paradise. But will say that it is far better than Oregon Co., Mo. Why is it better than old Oregon? Because it has richer and smoother land, it is a better farming country, it is a better country for raising stock, and it is healthier for old and young, chills do not stay here, and there are no sickness here I haven't heard of a case of sickness since I came here. There are good well water here. John Justice said it would cost you \$37 to come said you could bring 300 pounds of baggage with you. You can get corn for 65 cents a bushel, flour \$3 a hundred, bacon 8 cents a pound. You can count this all up and it will give you an idea what one year's farming will cost you. Arch, this country just suits you. You could make a living a

raising hogs. Hogs have no disease here. All of them look just like they have got out of the fattening pen. Plenty of acorns here for the hogs. Well I guess that will do that subject I have been harrowing in the wheat today with a disk harrow and four horses. I guess if nothing happens I will make a crop here next year. Well, it is getting late in the night. Rob has already gone to bed and it's about time for me to go. Write just as soon as you get this. When writing always mention my crop and often. I will add no more at present.

## Farm Safety Week Proclaimed In County

County Judge Scott Bailey has officially proclaimed July 25-31, 1965, as FARM SAFETY WEEK in Eastland County, according to Jack Cozart, president of the local county Farm Bureau. The local firm organization is coordinating activities for the special farm safety campaign.

President Johnson and Governor Connally have previously designated that week a period to call attention to worthwhile safety practices that can reduce disabling injuries and death.

The county farm leader said that the accidental death rate for farm residents has increased since 1961. "Your efforts are vital if this trend is to be reversed, and needless suffering and losses substantially reduced" Mr. Cozart continued. He emphasized that farming remains one of the most hazardous occupations in America today.

In his official proclamation, County Judge Bailey said: "All the citizens of Eastland county are deeply concerned about the safety and well-being of farm families from whom we receive our abundance of food and other essential agricultural commodities.

"Farm and ranch accidents reap a grim harvest of lives each year in Texas.

"Thousands more suffer painful disabling injuries, and property damage adds great economic loss to the terrible toll of farm and ranch accidents.

"During this special week, a statewide farm accident prevention education program will be undertaken by the Texas Farm Bureau, the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, 4-H Clubs the Texas Safety Association, Future Farmers and Future Homemakers of America, Young Farmers and Young Homemakers of Texas and the Eastland County Farm Bureau, with the Theme "Safe and Alive in '65".

County Farm Bureau President Jack Cozart said that a different phase of safety would be emphasized each day during the week:

Sunday - reverence for life; Monday - safety begins at home; Tuesday - agricultural chemicals; Wednesday - prevent falls; Thursday - rural highway safety; Friday - farm machinery; Saturday - recreational safety.
