The frog was lifted out of the hole. Witnesses testified that the frog breathed and jumped and died. The fresh air, it was believed, was just too much for him.

This, however, proves a point — that frogs can indeed live long in seclusion. So. let's not put our tongues in check when people start telling again about Old Rip, the Eastland horned frog.

The Housh frog, we undertand, is on display at the bus office. Perhaps his story will grow with the years and that nis long years of sleep under a rock will not have been in vain.

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

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The third annual action-packed Ranger Rodeo will be unreeled in the Jaycees' arena, U.S. Highway 80 west, Ranger, next Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

Arrangements for the stellar three-day event have been completed, Kenneth Pendleton, president of the Ranger Junior Chamber of Commerce, said Saturday, Advance ticket sales, he said, indicate that attendance is likely to top the record-setting 1964 rodeo, the second staged here 1955.



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
