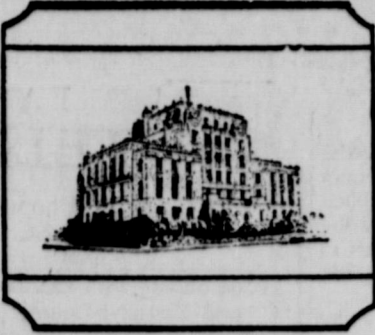

Bank's Resources Up \$1/2 Million

Resources of Eastland National Bank have increased \$500,000 during the past year and are up over a \$100,000 during the last quarter. Deposits at mid-1965 are at record \$5,129,402.59 with a total of \$2,533,214.91. Deposits are up over \$100,000 for second quarter from \$5,032,327 reported on April 30. Loans increased by about same proportion, up from \$2,544,655 as of April 26. Sources increase from year appears to be from single factor but rather

from increases in several categories. Loans are up to \$2,544,655 from 1964's \$2,533,214.91; stock in federal reserve bank and banking house figures remain static at \$7,500 and \$52,802.90, respectively; furniture and fixtures values are down, with \$23,390.27 at June 30, 1965, and \$25,918.30 last year; other real estate is down from \$9,300.02 to \$8,900.06; U.S. government bonds are down from \$1,413,517.75 to \$1,364,468.75; other bonds and warrants totals are up from \$524,424.90 to \$585,703.40; other assets are \$21,887.83 and cash and exchange is up some \$85,000 from \$900,526.40 to \$985,324.64. Liabilities list capital stock unchanged at \$100,000 surplus at \$150,000; deferred income up to \$62,010.95 from \$45,393.12; undivided profits up to \$137,525.97 from \$117,645.14; and tax, interest, etc., reserve down to \$4,253.25 from \$7,735.36.

The June 30, 1965 report is the bank's regular fiscal year end tabulation and is not the state banking called report, which had not been received.

Brother Of Tom Stark Wounded By Youth Sunday

Crosby County Sheriff Fletcher Stark, who was critically wounded Sunday night as he attempted to arrest a 17-year-old youth in Crosbyton, was reported to be in "fair condition" Tuesday morning in the Crosbyton Hospital.

The injured man is a brother of Tom Stark of Cisco, who left for Crosbyton Sunday night upon learning of the incident.

The youth who was involved has been charged with assault to murder and at last reports was still at large.

According to a report the shooting occurred as Sheriff Stark was investigating a disturbance call at a cotton gin used as a gathering place by migrant field workers. The youth ran as the attempt to arrest him was made and then turned and fired, hitting Stark in the left chest. He returned the fire, and it was believed that the youth was hit.

The sheriff's 14-year-old son, who was with him at the time, took him to the hospital after the shooting. He was in surgery for six hours.

925 Carbonites Sign In At First All-School Event

Conservative estimates put the total attendance at the first Carbon all-school reunion and homecoming at well over 1,000 persons — and it was a long day Saturday filled with visiting, talking and recalling the "old days."

A total of 925 persons officially signed in, but reunion officials reported that many did not have an opportunity to register because of prolonged visitations in the hundreds of huddles scattered all over the Carbon school campus.

Cool, shady areas were in great demand all day Saturday as returnees swapped yarns, and made many trips to the water cooler provided by the Nimrod Coon Hunters Association.

Beginning at 6 p.m. the long lines of hungry exes wound their way by the long barbecue tables and found a bench, car fender or a grassy spot to sit and eat. In all 337 persons were fed.

During a brief business session at 7 p.m. the group voted to reconvene every five years, making the next Carbon get-together to be Saturday, July 4, 1970.

New slate of officers elected included Glenn Justice of

Carbon, president; J. E. Jackson, vice president; Mrs. Juannell Brown, secretary; and Mrs. Ardith Bean, treasurer.

Retiring president and man responsible for much of the legwork in preparation for the 1965 event, is Ewell Allison of Carbon.

Registration began at 9 a.m. and Carbonites, old and new, came and went all day long, with more coming and staying, than going.

Ranger Rodeo Opens Tonight

Ranger's action-packed, rip-roaring third annual Jaycee Rodeo opens Thursday afternoon at 5 o'clock with a colorful downtown parade.

Three hours later, out at the big arena out on old U.S. Highway 80 west, there'll be plenty of action with whirling broncs, rugged charging, elusive bulls and calves testing the talents of top amateur rodeo contestants.

The performances begin at 8 p.m. each night — Thursday through Saturday. Finals will be unreeled Saturday night and winners of each event will receive a handsome buckle.

Also a stellar attraction during the last night of action will be the naming of a new "Ranger Rodeo Queen."

Ranger Jaycee leaders are expecting attendance for the coming three-day event to shatter all previous records. Last year over 10,000 persons attended the three nightly performances. The arena's seating capacity is 5,000.

The opening parade late Thursday afternoon will feature colorful mounted groups, commercial floats and displays and music by the U. S. Army Band from Fort Hood. A crowd of 5,000 or more is expected to jam the downtown area to watch the procession.

Trophies will be awarded for the top three float entries in the parade. An outstanding feature of the parade will be Ranger's colorful Lone Ranger Riding Club which has made numer-

ous appearances and won several awards. The Lone Ranger Club participated in the opening parade of the Southwestern Exposition & Fat Stock Show at Fort Worth earlier this year.

Also in the limelight during the procession will be Ranger's current reigning "Rodeo Queen," Miss Jane Ann Bradford. She will be followed by candidates for the new queen title.

The Housh frog was uncovered the other day when workmen were digging out a pile of stone at the motel back of the bus office and where remodeling work is going on. The frog was lifted out of the hole. Witnesses testified that the frog breathed and jumped and died. The fresh air, it was believed, was just too much for him.

This, however, proves a point — that frogs can indeed live long in seclusion. So, let's not put our tongues in check when people start telling again about Old Rip, the Eastland horned frog.

The Housh frog, we understand, is on display at the bus office. Perhaps his story will grow with the years and that his long years of sleep under a rock will not have been in vain.

Adding color to the parade will be a U. S. Army Band and drill team from Fort Hood. Army musicians also will furnish music for the three rodeo performances.

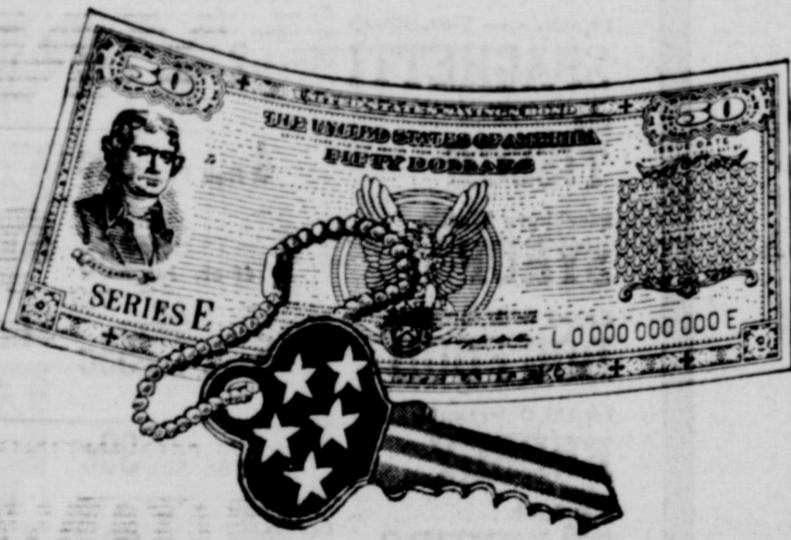

Indian Scout and Confederate
soldier. The following story re-
lates an episode that Smith
lived through:
In December of 1860 Joe
and Rall Smith, "Bad" Reese
and Golston Flanagan left
Flanagan's ranch at what is
now Merriman, to go to
Blair's Fort, in quest of
something with which to
make bread. They were in a
wagon to which was hitched
a yoke of young steers and
started down the road which
at that time followed in a
general way the crest of
where the present Eastland-
Cheaney Road crossed the
River. In doing so it crossed
several draws, less brushy,
and it was at one of these
that they drove into an am-
bush.
Flanagan was mortally
wounded, probably by the
first volley of shots, and fell
back into the wagon, as did
Smith who was struck in the
knee by an arrow. The young
steers stampeded, turned
abruptly around and raced
back up the road for a hun-
dred yards or so, then bolted
for the timber, some distance
away, where they hubbed a
tree and broke the yoke,
which enabled them to con-
tinue their wild flight.
It was here that Joe Smith
leaped from the wagon and
ran into the timber, where
he waited for Golston, think-
ing that he, like himself,
might be in hiding, but fail-
ing to find him, returned to
the ranch, where he reported
the incident to "Bad" Reese
and Rall Smith, who took
horses and went to hunt for
Flanagan, finding him dead
and scalped.
His body was brought to
the ranch and buried on a
little knoll in the field east
of the road, just south of the
bridge across Colony Creek,
at Merriman, where his ashes
still rest.
When the arrow which
struck Joe Smith was jerked
from the wound at the time
he was shot he supposed that
the head came with the shaft,
but some 25 years later he
felt a sharp pain on the under
side of his knee, and was
surprised to find a sharp,
black point sticking through
the skin. In about three
weeks it came out of the
flesh, seemingly not much
the worse for its long lodging
in Mr. Smith's knee. Mr.
Smith thought that he was
shot with a double-headed ar-
row and that one was re-
moved when he was shot. —
Ranger Times, 1955.

It was during the years
from 1857 to 1862 when the
Indians, especially the Com-
anches, were very active

High-Flying 'Hoppers' Have Big Appetites

Grasshoppers get away up in the air when it comes to the subject of food. Various species are strong fliers, and adults sometimes gather in giant swarms moving hundreds of miles and destroying crops and range plants wherever they pause. Individual hoppers have been snared in airplane traps at altitudes around 1,000 feet, but entomological history reveals that hordes in migration have reached heights nearing the one-mile mark.



The most spectacular example of the high fliers in this country occurred in 1874 when migrating swarms of Rocky Mountain Grasshoppers swept the Great Plains causing such a food shortage that it was dubbed as a national disaster. In the last few days in Eastland County many farmers and crop growers have been complaining about the insect grasshopper. According to Assistant County Agent, Bill McCutchen, the hoppers are most destructive in the
