Over 200 Workers Are Moving To This Area For Pipe Line Project

A crew of more than 200 construction workers began moving into this area Thursday. The workers are being housed in trailers and are working on a 10-inch pipe line project. The project is being managed by K. E. Wagner, one of the company's officials for the area. It was understood that the work would begin at the Eastland Gulf Terminal, which is located just off the highway north of Cisco and Eastland on the Breckenridge road. Plans call for taking up a 10-inch line for repairs and for a new line from the Eastland terminal to Midland, according to reports here. A booster pumping station will be added to the terminal set-up, the report said, to send products on toward Midland. The contract will be handled out of Gulf's Houston headquarters, it was understood. Five to seven Gulf men will be here during the same time to serve as inspectors and to represent the company. The Cisco offices will be maintained until work progresses to Abilene, reports said. Officials of the Chamber of Commerce reported that the office was doing everything possible to help the workers find apartments and places to live here.

Work on V. V. Estates Expected to Begin Here This Week: If FHA OKs

Valley View Estates Developer L. E. Jones expects to build as many as 25 new homes in Eastland's newest southwest division and reports that he will begin work this coming week if possible. All that's holding him up now, he says, is a Federal Housing Administration approval of the sub-division, which is expected immediately. A great deal of brush has already been pushed on the tract near the new elementary school in preparation for the project. A native of Brownwood, Jones has been a builder "all his life," and has several developments to his credit, including one he has just finished there which will be shown in a Home Show Sunday. The Eastland homes will be both FHA and GI approved for financing, and three are already sold, he said. Each of the homes will be a minimum of 1,100 square feet, three-bedroom, two-bath homes, restricted to at least 50 per cent brick. Prices will range from \$12,500 to \$17,000, he said. He expects to announce an association soon with an Eastland realtor for the handling of the new homes. Jones can presently be reached at 504 E. Lee St., Brownwood. He will bring his own carpenter crew but will use as much additional local labor as possible he said, and will endeavor to use every local facility possible. Terms of the development call for all streets to be paved, all utilities to be installed and curbing and guttering in place. The Valley View Estates, approved overwhelmingly recently by the city, will open a 45-lot subdivision on property owned by Mrs. B. E. Reid. The 15-acre tract is located immediately south of Sadosa St. and extends southward to Conner St. It is bisected by Ammerman and Dixie Streets, which will be extended into the development. A six-inch water main is almost complete along Sadosa St., being installed by the city to service the area. Mr. Jones has invited interested Eastlanders to visit the showing in Brownwood Sunday of homes he has built to evaluate the style and quality of construction. His model homes are located at 1700 Highland Drive. (Come out Austin Ave. to Coggin, out Coggin, turn left onto Fourth St., go out Fourth to 3600 block, turn right onto Highland.) Minimum lot sizes will be 70 by 150-feet with an average of approximately 10,000 square feet. Surveyor Tommy Magness reported recently to the city commission. Judging Contest Set For Sheep, Goat Field Day

An Angora goat judging contest will be a feature of the annual Sheep and Goat Field Day in Ranger, on July 30, according to Dr. John Foster, chairman of the planning group. Several classes of goats will also be shown. B. S. Dudley, Jr., Ranger Vocational Agricultural Teacher, will be in charge of this event, Foster said. All attending may participate in the judging contest he said. The Ranger Chamber of Commerce and the Eastland County Agricultural Agents are co-sponsors of the affair. McHaney, A&M University, College Station; Dr. W. T. Hardy, Sonora, superintendent of the Ranch Experiment Station; J. G. Meredith, Eastland ASC office manager, and Gaylord Hankins, Rock Springs, president of the Texas Sheep.

of the people of this State." (Art. 817a, P.C. 1925).

Eastland County game warden, Maurice S. Dry, stated that the new program will follow the pattern of the Wildlife Program presently followed by Stephens, Erath, Palo Pinto, Shackelford, and other counties under the Possum Kingdom Game and Wildlife Commission.

County residents who wanted to obtain doe permits until now went to the County Clerk's office. The new law will give each rancher or landowner the number of deer allowed to be bagged on his land and the rancher will issue the permits given him by the Commission.

A principal objective of the regulatory responsibility program is the management of wildlife resources based upon scientific research findings. The program incorporates adaptability and flexibility to meet emergencies such as drought, flood, fire or other causes which may endanger one or more species of wildlife by waste or depletion.

The Commission can act in the interest of ranchmen, owners, and the hunting and fishing public to conserve the threatened wildlife species without waiting for normal Legislative procedure.

The Commission can act also to provide a more lenient cropping of the wildlife resources when research findings indicate an increased harvest is justified in the interest of proper management. Eastland County joins a rapidly growing number of counties in seeking the most efficient way possible to deal with local game regulations.

Residents of Eastland County will be informed of the findings from research conducted by game and fish technicians, game wardens and other resource specialists of the Commission. Before the Parks and Wildlife Commission issues the required proclamations containing information about open seasons, bag limits, and other rules and regulations for harvesting the counties wildlife resources, announced public hearings will be held. These hearings will be advertised at least 10 days prior to the hearing date.

At the public hearing the proposed regulations will be read and explained to those present. Pertinent questions the public may have will be answered. The full proceedings will be recorded and presented to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission when that body meets to prepare regulations for taking game and fish in the affected county.

Although the Legislature granted the Commission at least 90 days after the acts become effective to "... conclude its investigations, hold its hearings, and promulgate its proclamations, rules, regulations, and orders," Eastland County citizens can be assured that Commission technicians are already at work on the program for their areas.

The benefits of participation in the regulatory responsibility program, in addition to the assurance that scientific research is set as the basis for management, are many. Under the program, the numbers of the various species can be adjusted to the carrying capacity of the range, thereby contributing to the health and well being of the individual animals and insuring against range damage or destruction. Sex ratios of some species, such as deer, can through scientific harvesting, be adjusted to the desired buck to doe ratio dictated by good herd management.

The over-all and lasting benefit is that the people of Eastland County have made a progressive step which will help insure the perpetuation and wise use of their wildlife resources for themselves and for future generations.

The law affecting the County becomes effective August 30, 1965. However, general and special laws now in effect will remain so until the issuance of the Commission's rules and regulations in accordance with the terms of the Acts.

Jurisdiction of the enforcement of these rules after they are passed by the Commission will not be changed.

The game warden will have full authority to enforce the Commission's rules and regulations. According to County Judge Scott Bailey all lesser misdemeanors that carry fines with no jail sentences or license forfeiture and which do not exceed \$200 will be taken to the Justice of the Peace Court.

All other misdemeanors with jail sentences and license forfeitures, since the Justice of the Peace does not have the right to revoke licenses, will fall under the jurisdiction of the County Court.

Judge Bailey said that the seriousness of the offense will determine where jurisdiction lies.

9 Offices Up For Election In 1966 Primary

In less than ten months Eastland County citizens will be going to their prospective polls to vote in the county primary election. There are some nine offices which will be up for election.

Offices which will be up for election this coming year will be the county clerks position, district clerks position, the county judges position, the county treasurers position, commissioners from precincts 2 and 4, the five county justices of the peace position, the county school superintendents position, and a two year unexpired term for the district judges position.

Eastland, established in 1856, is the only county in Texas to have a post office in the county seat. The Post Office is located in the Congress building. The county is home to many industries, including fishing, hunting, and tourism. The county is also known for its beautiful scenery and historic landmarks.

The new law specifically addresses the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission with the authority of conducting research on game laws, setting of seasons, bag limits, and taking wildlife in the county. Here, Eastland County has under the Texas General Land Office. This is the change for Eastland in Game Laws since laws passed in Texas regarding wildlife.

49th Division Ready For Annual Summer Training

Thirty-six members of the Eastland County unit of the 49th Armored Division of Texas National Guard will leave Sunday, July 18, for North Fort Hood where they will receive their annual summer training.

The local unit will be accompanied by Captain W. H. Hogan of Clyde and Lt. Bill McCutchen of Eastland. The training will continue through August 1.

Among the high points of the division's field training

will be a demonstration on July 23 by army tanks teamed with Air Force jets using live firepower to shatter "enemy positions." Tactical Air Command jets will be available for the first time to lend realism to the division's training.

Some 400 military and civilian observers will see the two-hour combat demonstration. New rockets and grenades will be fired for the visitors' benefit, including the new M-115 rocket launcher and the 40-mm. grenade launcher.

Governor John Connally has been invited to be present the night of July 23, when the division sweetheart will be crowned. This will be the last of the yearly ceremonies for the 49th, which is due to be reorganized before next summer as part of the National Guard-Army Reserve merger.

Training this summer will be just as rugged as ever before, Brig. Gen. Luther Orlick, division commander, emphasized, with no slackening allowed because of the impending reorganization.

A team of 13 reporters under the direction of Supervisor Everett Martin of the ASCS Office in Eastland are in the process of measuring and charting the some 38,000 acres of peanuts in Eastland County.

Beginning full-time Monday, the visitation and measurement of crops at some 1,300 farms in the county is expected to take about six weeks, ASCS Office Manager Gilbert Meredith reports.

He called Reporter Supervisor Martin one of the best in the business, and cited the 13 reporters as being well qualified men who know the farms and farmers in the county. The 13 are from all over the county, and in every case possible, they are individually sent to the areas each knows best, Meredith said.

In addition to the 38,000 acres of peanut crops, the reporters will also be checking some 10,000 acres of diverted acreage, about the same amount of feed grain acreage, about 1,800 acres of cotton land and about 40 soil-banked farms in the county, he said.

The reporters chain off the crop acreage and record their findings on aerial photographs which are in turn processed in the courthouse office by a staff of highly-trained personnel, to determine the total number of acres, as part of the Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Committee program.
