

WHAT HAPPENED TO GROSS INCOME **OF FARMERS?**

According to an annual estimate of the federal department of agriculture the gross income of farmers declined \$6,775,000,000, or 57 per cent, from 1929 through 1932 to \$5,143,000,000 in the latter year, while their cash income after deducting various production expendiutres declined about \$3,400,000,000 or 72 per cent. More startling than this the 1932 gross income of farmers was the lowest gross income in any year on the records of the agriculture department which go back to 1909. A reminder for the Texas lawmakers that the farmers have a real grievance and when they call for drastic reduction in the cost of government they expect favorable consideration. If civilization begins and ends with the plow then the plow of 1932 was rusty and hard to handle.

COTTON ACREAGE HIKE IN OKLAHOMA

Oklahoma is a cotton producing state. A. E. Kobs of Oklahoma City is the manager of the Oklahoma Cotton Growers' association. He is predicting an increase in cotton acreage of 20 to 30 per cent in the Texas Panhandle and West Oklahoma as a result of wheat acreage abandonment. Hundreds of acres of wheat were ruined by the recent wind and dust storms, and the viewpoint of Manager Kobs is: "The farmer has been forced to plant cotton." Well, another bumper crop of 16,000,000 bales may play havoc with the lean wallet of the cotton growers.

WALKER D. HINES GOES TO FOREIGN LANDS

Walker D. Hines is one of the famous rail lawyers of America. He has been named to head a group of American advisers designated at the request of the Turkish government "to assist restoration of prosperity in that nation." Hines is one of the outstanding rail lawyers and economists of the cuntry. He is well known in Texas. He directed American railroads during the war and in 1925 investigated Rhine and Danube river navigation for the league of nations.





WALTER SPLAWN MAY BE THE RAIL CZAR

Bascom N. Timmons, Washington correspondent, predicts the appointment in the near future of Dr. W. M. cent statement, said: "Seventy-five million barrels of crude oil were produc-

ed in excess of Conservation Commissions' allowables for the 15 months ended March 31, 1933.

"Texas produced nearly 32,000,000 barrels of this in utter disregard of conservation laws and the Railroad commission's orders. Injunctions granted by courts because conservation authorities issued orders in illegal form permitted 21,500,000 barrels to come out at the expense of the law-abiding.

"In Oklahoma 11,230,000 barrels were illegally produced.

"California produced 10,000,000 barrels which however is not classed as illegal oil. Rather, it is unfair oil, of last week. produced by a few operators in excess and out of proper regard for the allowables set by the voluntary curtainment committees fixing allowables for the majority of the industry in California, in an effort to prorate their production to somewhere near the market requirement.

"Activities of this kind are without possible defense. They can be prevented. We predict that they will be prevented and that a stabilized and more creditable condition will exist."

THE BODY of a dry water beetle repels water in the same manner as that of a duck, and the insect is unable to penetrate the sur face. The beetle sometimes makes flights in the air, and in this way becomes thoroughly dried. On landing in the water, however, the momentum is sufficient to carry the dry, glossy body through surface film, and then the beetle can swim and dive without difficulty.






