

HORSE RACING BILL FINALLY PASSED IN SENATE

SENATE VOTES FAVORABLY ON BILL TODAY

House Had Already Voted Favorably On "Rider" To Another Bill.

AUSTIN, May 18.—Betting on horse racing in Texas was given final legislative sanction today, when the senate adopted a conference report on the departmental appropriation bill carrying a "rider" for that purpose.

The vote was 19 to 9, with one pair. The bill now goes to the governor for signature.

AUSTIN, May 18.—The senate voted 18 to 11 today against ordering the "rider" to legalize betting on horse racing in Texas stricken from the conference report on the departmental appropriation bill.

The house adopted the report late yesterday, 80 to 41. The test vote in the senate today indicated its final passage.

The vote came on a motion to table a move by Senator George Purl of Dallas to reject the conference report and appoint a new conference, instructed specifically to strike out the horse racing feature.

Among those who voted to table Purl's motion was Senator Martin of Hillsboro.

Among the senators who voted against tabling were Senators Woodruff of Decatur and Collie of Eastland.

A special train to Chicago Fair Will Serve West Texas

ABILENE, Texas, May 18.—A West Texas section of the special train to leave Dallas June 11 for the Chicago World's fair will be run for the convenience of West Texans wishing to attend the exposition, it was announced here today by L. B. Sandolowski, assistant general manager agent of the Texas & Pacific railway.

The section, which will be concentrated in Abilene, will leave at 9:40 a. m., June 11, as part of the Sunshine Special, crack T. & P. passenger. Arrangements for the section were completed by G. B. Sandolowski, manager of the Simmons University Cowboy band following requests from over West Texas that he supervise a special train from this section.

A record low fare, according to railway officials, will be available. The top fare, for lower berth single, will be \$39.70. This sum provides for all transportation and use of berths to and from Chicago and during the four-night stay there. Rates are scaled downward to as low as \$23.45, which does include sleepers.

The special train is contingent upon 200 persons from West Texas making the trip. All reservations must be made through Sandolowski not later than June 3 as the Pullman company requires a week's notice in which to provide equipment. The section may be boarded at all points between Abilene and Dallas.

The train will leave at 3:20 p. m., Sunday, June 11, arriving Chicago at 3:20 Monday afternoon. The return trip will begin Friday noon. Abilene will be reached at 6:20 Saturday evening.

THIEVES ABANDONED TRUCK PLEASANTON, Kan.—Chicken thieves made a poor business deal when they stopped here to load up their truck with the feathered fowl. Webb was playing on the country golf club course here when he noticed a large bass swimming in the weeds, near the shore of a lake, at the fairway's edge, he said. Using one of his irons for a bludgeon, he killed the fish with a single blow.

But Dr. C. A. Dabneke and Bill Hines, with whom Webb was playing, have a different version of the incident.

They charge that Webb's ball was near the water's edge, he swung at the ball and killed the fish in mid-lake.

SUSPECTS IN TEXAS CRIMES BEING HELD

LOS ANGELES, May 18.—Wanted in Texas as suspects in bank robberies, five men arrested here last week will be given preliminary hearings in Long Beach municipal court next Monday.

The men, Wanda Stewart, 27; George Cecil, 27; Edward Chasels, 29; Bud Fletcher, 30; and Raymond Gregg, 29, have been specifically charged with robbing stores in Glendale and Inglewood. They also assertedly have been identified in connection with robberies at Long Beach and holdups in three other towns.

The quintet has been identified by Dallas police as participants in a packing house robbery in that city last February. Extradition proceedings have been postponed, however, pending outcome of the charges here.

FORT WORTH, May 18.—Texas rangers today awaited trial of five men in California before seeking their return to Texas for questioning in the robbery of the First National bank of Grandview and other outrages.

No charges have been filed by Ranger Captain H. T. Odneal plans to question them in the following robberies:

The Grandview bank, March 6; a bank at Knox City, March 30; the Farmers & Merchants bank at Priddy, March 21, and in the hold-up here of two railway postal clerks, who lost six sacks of registered mail.

Loot obtained in the bank robberies approximated \$38,000. The robbers' methods in each were similar. A gun abandoned by robbers at Priddy was similar to one stolen at Long Beach.

Oil Stabilization Program Planned

TULSA, Okla., May 18.—Development of a definite program for stabilizing the oil industry backed by both independents and major operators was the goal of the country's petroleum leaders today as they attended the opening session of the American Petroleum Institute mid-year meeting.

Warned by the committee on refinery statistics that there would be a 2.5 per cent decrease in the demand for crude oil during the six months ending Sept. 30, the oil men were agreed that the huge flood of crude would have to be curtailed.

Total crude oil demand during that time will be 431,020,000 barrels daily, it was estimated. Production should be held 100,000 barrels under this figure, the committee recommended, to allow for storage withdrawals.

French Honor Builder of Fort

PARIS.—Sebastien Le Prestre de Vauban, "the man who fortified France," was born 300 years ago in Burgundy.

From now until July 23 a number of ceremonies in his memory will be held here, in Burgundy and in other parts of the nation.

Left an orphan at ten, Vauban was brought up by the parish priest of St. Leger until, at seventeen, he heard the call to arms and enlisted with Conde, who was in league with Spain against the King.

METHODIST OF THIS DISTRICT ANNUAL MEET AGAINST CITY OF EASTLAND

The annual district conference for the Methodist churches of the Cisco district met Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock in Rising Star, the session including night services Tuesday and services throughout the day Wednesday. Dr. C. Q. Smith of Cisco, presiding elder of the Cisco district, presided, opening the conference with a devotional service.

Rev. C. M. Morton of Rising Star delivered the welcome address which was responded to by Dr. C. Q. Smith.

The conference was well attended and reports from the various churches showed all organizations making progress. The next meeting will be held in De Leon.

Among those to address the conference were: Dr. S. S. Slaughter, representing the theological department of Southern Methodist university; Mrs. W. E. Barron of Desdemona, a talk on women's work; Rev. S. A. Ashburn, pastor of Mulkey Memorial church in Fort Worth, representing the missionary work of the conference; Dr. J. W. Johnson, pastor of the First Methodist church of Fort Worth; Rev. W. B. Andrews of Fort Worth, representing the superannuated endowment and homes; and B. E. McGlamery of Eastland, district lay leader.

A total of 285 new members have been received in the churches of the district since the last report. There are 38 Sunday schools in the district with a combined membership of 4,561, which is a gain over the same period last year.

Twenty-three Epworth Leagues with a combined membership of 434 are to be found in the district. Teachers' training credits to the number of 107 have been issued in students Sunday school training work since the last report. Also 95 credits have been issued in young peoples training work, the total training credits issued in these two departments being more than 19 per cent gain over the same period last year.

There are 17 missionary societies in the district with a combined membership of 448 and they have raised, since the last report, \$1,951 for their work. Their report also shows a gain in the number of societies as well as an increase in the amount of money raised.

Conference collections so far this year are four times those collected for the same period last year. The total amount of funds raised by all churches to date is \$15,819.

Given Virgil Miller In Auto Theft Case

The jury in the case of Virgil Miller returned a verdict of guilty Wednesday afternoon and assessed his punishment at two years in the state penitentiary, but recommended a suspended sentence which recommendation was accepted by the court.

Miller was charged with having stolen an automobile belonging to Marvin Hood, an employee of the State Highway department, on the afternoon of April 16.

CRAZED MAN KILLED AND A BOMB SEIZED

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 18.—A seemingly crazed man who flourished a powerful bomb and threatened to "make Oklahoma City remember the day for a long time" was killed in a gun battle with police today after he had critically wounded an officer and threatened to discharge his infernal machine.

Officers indicated the bomb carrier was suffering from hysterical pain similar to that of Giuseppe Zanagara, who assassinated Mayor Cermak of Chicago in an attempt on the life of President Roosevelt.

In his pocket book they found diet formulas, lists of food combinations to be avoided and in a pocket was a small packet of pills.

The man was identified as James S. Ferguson of Seminole, Okla., an unemployed carpenter. He was about 45 years old.

The bomb he carried was taken later to a park, where it was exploded with a terrific detonation, the force of its 24 sticks of dynamite tearing leaves from trees and shaking nearby buildings. Experts estimated a dozen persons could have been killed if the machine had been set off down town.

Police Scout J. H. Bensley, whom the bomb carrier shot after he had made three policemen take him to a store to obtain more dynamite, was in a hospital with two bullet wounds. His recovery was doubtful.

Select Boys For Reforestation Work on Friday

Tom Colburn and Archer Slay of Olden and Albert O'Donnell, Reimold Blakeney and Bennie Salters of Ranger were chosen today by the Eastland county relief committee to go from the Eastland and Ranger districts to reforestation camps. They reported to J. E. Spencer of Cisco, who is in charge of this service for Eastland county, Thursday afternoon and will proceed to Fort Worth Friday morning, where they will be given physical examinations and assigned to some camp.

A letter from J. E. Spencer to the local relief committee states that he has information from Lawrence Westbrook, who is in charge of this service for Texas, that the selection and registration of all men for the reforestation service must be complete and in the hands of the county director not later than May 25.

Responding to the request of Mr. Spencer that the Eastland quota of 14 be selected as soon as possible, the Eastland relief committee will hold a meeting Friday evening at which time the questionnaires of the applicants will be studied and the 11 places yet vacant will be filled by those who, in the judgment of the committee, are most worthy. At the same time several alternates will be named so that, in case some of the regulars might be turned back for any purpose, the places could be filled at once.

The quota for Ranger will be 12 more, who are to be selected sometime before June 7.

He has taken an active part in school affairs and is now serving on seven committees, connected with school and student activities.

TEXANS HELD BY BANDITS ARE RELEASED

ALPINE, Texas, May 18.—Protected by Mexican authorities, C. L. Hannold and John Rollins, American ranchers seized by bandits, were en route today from Ocampo to Boquillas, a border town, according to advices received here.

The Americans were captured by C. Baiza, bandit leader, when they rode into Mexico in search of horses stolen from the Hannold ranch in the Big Bend of Texas. The bandit leader delivered the ranchers to Mexican authorities at Ocampo.

Feeling had been running high as the result of the kidnaping. American ranchers had threatened to organize a posse and ride into Mexico in an attempt to release the prisoners if nothing was heard from the captives by tonight.
