

Lions, Medics Post LL Wins

Bubba Hunter and Bobby Cartwright combined talents to hurl 1 hit ball for a 5-2 victory over the Comets Monday night in Little League play and the Medics shoved the Bulldogs a notch lower in the cellar with a 14-11 win.

The Lions - Comet game was perhaps the best tilt of the year in many ways. It featured tight defensive playing by both teams. Neither team managed to score more than one run in any inning, although the Lions scored for five consecutive innings.

A "fluke hit" off the bat of Terry Moore in the second inning off Bubba Hunter gave the losers their only hit. Moore hit a ball to deep short, and the scorekeeper ruled it a hit, although the first baseman was pulled off base by the throw.

Moore got credit for the win. He pitched three innings and gave way to Cartwright at the beginning of the fourth frame. Hunter faced just 12 batters in three innings and Cartwright 13.

Losing pitcher was starter Jerry Moore. He was relieved by R. D. Ables in the top of the fourth. Moore gave up just three hits and three runs, the Lions getting a hit

and a run in each inning. Ables was touched for two runs off five hits in the last three frames. Elijah Govan had a home run for the Lions and Bubba Hunter was credited with a double.

Medics Win
The Medics jumped out from 5-0 in the first inning and pushed their lead to 8-1 at the end of two frames in their victory over the Bulldogs. The Docs couldn't get started until the final inning when they pushed across six runs to narrow the gap.

Winning pitcher was Donnie Wheat, who scattered five hits. Wheat had to get relief from John Garrett in the final inning to help the Dogs' comeback attempt. Losing pitcher was Raymond Lusk. Lusk came into the game in the fourth to relieve Tom Lovelace, who had been touched for eight runs and eight hits. The Medics got their winning runs off him, thanks to the Dogs' final inning rally.

Pat Westbrook knocked two home runs for the Bulldogs, getting their only extra base hits, while John Garrett had a homer for the Medics and Gary Graham got a triple.

Thursday night the Lions play the Bulldogs and the Medics meet the Comets.

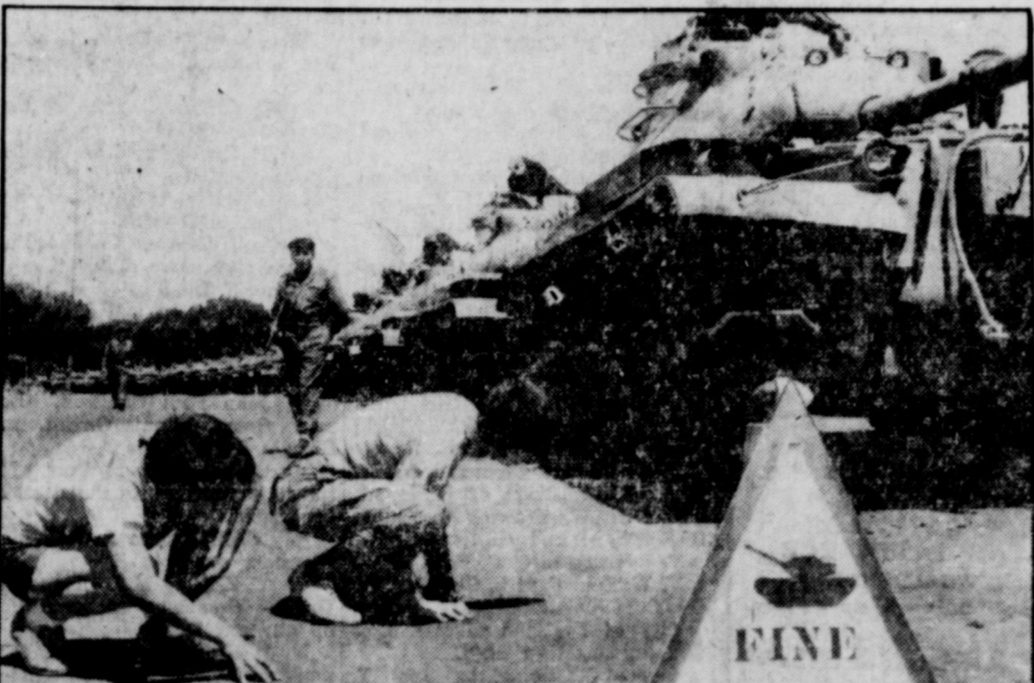

Kralis Praises Cities For Building Lake Without Aid

Eastland and Ranger Citizens were enthusiastically lauded for their big new joint water supply—Lake Leon—by Dan Kralis of Abilene, candidate for Congress, 17th District, who visited here late Saturday afternoon, delivered a brief address, and urged voters "to bring" the government back to us, the people.

Kralis, a former resident of Eastland, declared that "lack of water is a real threat to the 17th Congressional District," composed of Eastland and 11 other counties, and gloomily predicted that "dust bowls are on the way back."

He complimented Eastland and Ranger on their joint Lake Leon water supply, asserting that their accomplishment, without assistance from the Federal government, was "proof that local citizens—communities, counties and individual states—are able to handle their own affairs and to solve their own problems."

Kralis told his listeners, however, that despite the plentiful supply in this immediate vicinity, most of the 12-county area is in serious jeopardy in future years due to an increasingly critical water shortage.

As a solution, Kralis suggested piping sea water from the Gulf of Mexico and transforming the vital fluid into fresh water through processes similar to those which U. S. foreign aid funds are financing overseas.

The Taylor County candidate for the U. S. representative post told a reporter that he regretted that he was unable to make a longer campaign stop here to personally meet and greet every voter here in the surrounding area.

"But that's quite impossible," Kralis grinned, explaining: "If I were to spend 30 minutes with every voter here and over the 17th Congressional District, it would take me four and a half years, day and night without sleeping or eating, to meet all the folks in the 12 counties!"

The 6-foot 225-pound congressional candidate said he was "highly pleased" with public response to his message which has been appearing in the columns of this newspaper and added that he is a staunch defender of freedom of the press.

Kralis, who said he is refusing all expenses of his extensive campaign with his own personal life savings," advocates abolition of the personal income tax, a new farm program embodying full 100 percent parity for the farmer and rancher, increased depletion allowance and a slash in foreign oil imports, increased pensions for the aged of Texas and the nation, complete revision of the nation's costly billions-for-foreign-aid program, and a halt to federal incursion into the fields of local government and the preservation and protection of the rights of the people.

Plaques To Go To Contributors In Near Future

Work on the new Hollywood-Maxwell plant is progressing in a satisfactory manner, the Chamber of Commerce Industrial Committee announced today.

Grady Pipkin, chairman of the committee, said that 60 individuals and establishments have donated money now, and "several more are still expected to give."

Pipkin also announced that 14 plaques will be presented to each contributor in the near future.

J. R. Dawson, vice president of the Hollywood-Maxwell Co., said the company was well pleased with plans as they now stand.

Bill Hyde, who represents the contractor on the job, said that all materials would be purchased locally when possible. The Industrial Committee needed to raise \$12,500 as their part of the cost of constructing the new factory, which has a million and a half dollar payroll annually.

Eastland County students are Dan T. Amis of Eastland and Ralph D. Cooper of Ranger. Amis had a grade point average of 2.42 in the school of business administration and Cooper had an average of 2.67 in the division of engineering. A 3.00 grade average is perfect.

Average for the entire undergraduate student body was 1.34 grade points, or a "C" average. The honor roll includes students in the top five percent of each of Tech's five academic divisions.

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Plowing Under Some Crops Specified

'56 ACREAGE RESERVE PLAN FOR GROWERS IS ANNOUNCED

Requirements for participation in the 1956 Acreage Reserve Program.

Eligible commodities are 1956 crops of cotton, wheat and peanuts. The acreage which may be placed in the acreage reserve may not exceed the allotment for the commodity, and, within such limitation, may not exceed the following:

For wheat, the maximum acreage shall be 50 percent of the allotment, or 50 acres, whichever is larger.

For cotton and peanuts, the maximum acreage shall be 50 percent of the allotment, or 10 acres, whichever is larger.

The minimum acreage for a commodity placed in the acreage reserve shall be the larger of (1) ten percent of the allotment for the commodity, or (2) one acre for peanuts, two acres for cotton, and five acres for wheat, that if the allotment is less than the application number of acres specified under item (2) hereof, the minimum acreage will be the entire allotment. Producers shall not be eligible for participation in the acreage reserve program with respect to allotments for new farms.

Eligibility Requirements. To be eligible for participation in the acreage reserve program, the producer must reduce his acreage of the commodity below his allotment in one or more of the following ways:

(a) Reduction of the acreage may be underplanting the allotment, if the underplanting, in the case of wheat, was due to adverse weather, or, in the case of any of the other commodities, was due to adverse weather or was in an

Absentee voting will not begin until July 8, County Clerk Johnson Smith reminded voters today.

Smith said that his office has received numerous inquiries concerning absentee voting, and he pointed out that his office can do nothing until July 8. Deadline for voting absentee is July 24.

The county clerk explained that anyone wishing to vote absentee can do so by appearing in person at the county clerk's office or by writing for an application blank.

He reminded persons to include their poll tax slip, or if their poll tax has been lost or one is not needed, they must sign an affidavit.

Mr. Baldwin Is Buried Sunday In Ranger

Funeral services for Edward M. Baldwin were held Sunday afternoon in Ranger. Mr. Baldwin, who would have been 102 July 12, is believed to have been the oldest living man in Eastland County.

He was born July 12, 1854 in the Bradford-Drew house in Plymouth, Mass. One of his prize possessions was a fragile piece of paper which certified that the records at Plymouth show his birth on that date.

He told a reporter who interviewed him two years ago that he was a direct descendent of the Pilgrims who landed on the North American shores in 1620. He could give a vivid description of Plymouth Rock, around which he said he played as a youth.

The centurian was perhaps the only man still alive who shook the hand of Abraham Lincoln.

Prior to moving to Ranger Mr. Baldwin had operated cafes in Wickett and Barstow. He first saw Ranger in 1917, but didn't move here until several years later.

He is survived by his wife, Burial was in Evergreen Cemetery under the direction of Killingsworth Funeral Home.

Funeral services for Mrs. Maggie Whitaker, 87, were held Saturday in Cleburne following her death in a Cleburne hospital Friday.

They owned the stores, and in fact, everything."

Movement To Aid Texas Quail Is Outlined

Progress on two fronts were reported by the Assistant Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission who is supervising efforts to aid a Texas quail comeback.

He said rains in East Texas have

"picked up" habitat in the area destined to receive most of the young bobwhites from the state's experimental quail hatchery near Tyler.

At the hatchery, between four and five thousand eggs are in the incubators. Delivery of the young birds is tentatively scheduled for the latter part of June, after they spend four weeks in brooders plus two weeks in the "hardening pens."

The Assistant Executive Secretary said applications for the pen raised quail, which will be issued on a cost basis, indicate that some persons misunderstood a basic requirement. This provides that the game birds will be distributed only where food and cover provisions have been made subject to approval of the local game wardens.

"The Commission has re-emphasized that the primary purpose of this experiment is to create interest in quail habitat," he said. "The reason for this policy is that our quail population crisis developed only because of habitat shrinkage."

The Assistant Executive Secretary said persons interested in helping stock the hatchery quail should write the Commission in Austin.

'56 Acreage—

(Continued From Page One) program, such acreage shall be included as a part of the tract or tracts designated as the acreage reserve.

No crop shall have been harvested from the acreage reserve in 1956 or shall be harvested from the acreage prior to January 1, 1957, and the acreage reserve shall not have been grazed after June 22, 1956 and shall be grazed prior to January 1, 1957. No crop shall be planted on the acreage reserve after the agreement is signed and prior to January 1, 1957, except that (1) crops approved by the county committee for protective cover may be planted on the acreage reserve for harvest during 1957 or later in areas where such crops would normally be planted in the fall of 1956 for such later harvest.

Crops Plowed Under
In the event that, at the time the agreement is executed, there

is growing on the acreage reserve any crop, other than an approved cover crop, such crop must be plowed under or otherwise physically incorporated into soil, or clipped, mowed, or cut to prevent maturing by not later than July without reimbursement under the agreement, control the spread on the acreage reserve of noxious weeds.

No person shall be eligible for compensation under the acreage reserve program with respect to any farm on which (1) the 1956 acreage of cotton exceeds the allotment for the commodity; or (2) the 1956 acreage of wheat exceeds the larger of the allotment for wheat or permitted acres; or (3) the 1956 acreage of the allotment for peanuts or one acre. No acreage should be plowed under, etc. in anticipation of participating in this program until a Soil Bank Acreage Reserve Agreement has been completed and filed with the county committee.

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Arrive Alive — Slow Down and Live Is Good Maxim for Any Motorist

"Arrive Alive — Slow Down and Live!" That's the slogan of the current speed control program which the Texas Safety Association, the Department of Public Safety and the National Safety Council are sponsoring this month in cooperation with the "Slow Down and Live" program of the National Conference of State Safety Coordinators. It's also a pretty good maxim for any motorist to live by.

In commenting on the program, E. C. McFadden of Dallas, Vice-President of Employers Casualty Company and President of the Texas Safety Association, stressed the necessity of impressing average driver with the importance of setting his speed to suit the prevailing conditions.

"Much has been said about the speed demon's role in the traffic accident toll, and rightly so," McFadden said. "But too many people lose sight of the fact that many drivers invite accidents by driving at speeds too fast for conditions, even though these speeds are far below what is thought of as 'burning up the road'."

McFadden said the average driver should check constantly to see that his speed is safe for conditions of weather, traffic, road, the mechanical condition of his car and his own physical and mental condition at the time.

"Much of the dangerous haste that involves ordinary drivers in

traffic accidents comes from the too-prevalent habit of not allowing enough time for the daily schedule," he said. "Trying to make up a few minutes in traffic can be deadly."

He pointed out that the driver who is obsessed with making time will not slow down for heavy traffic, slippery or rough roads, reduced visibility, fatigue or other physical disability. Moreover, his preoccupation with the time element impairs his judgment.

"My advice to drivers is to allow enough time to make the journey without pressure," McFadden said. "If you do happen to get a late start, don't try to make up time on the way. It's better to get there late than not at all!"

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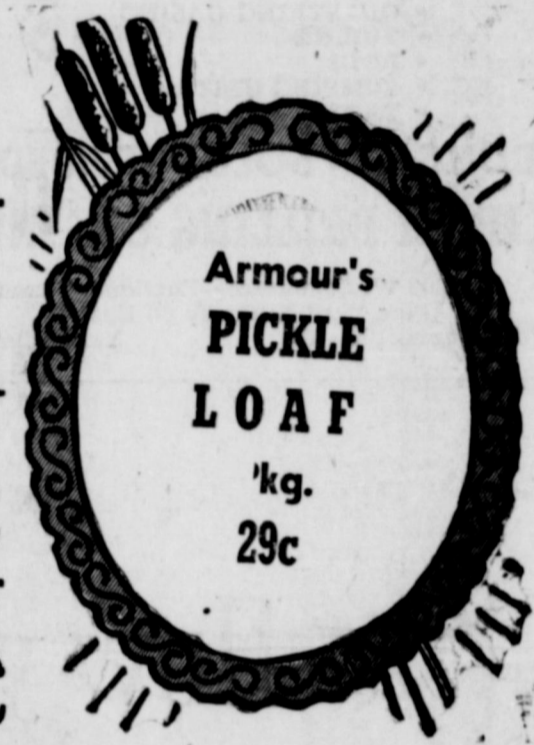
