The Hickmans were residents of Eastland for many years while he was Chief Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals. They still have many friends in Eastland and

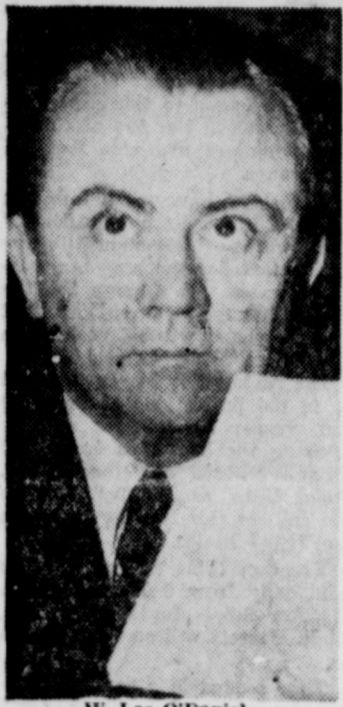

# More Conservation Now Being Applied

Landowners of this area applied more conservation practices on their land during the first six month period than in any like period in spite of continued drought conditions.

This period, report, January 1 through June 30, 1956 shows 146 percent increase in terrace construction, 118 percent increase in diversion terrace construction and 200 percent increase in waterway development along with good increases in the many other applicable conservation practices.

Conservation farmers and ranchers see the needs of their land and have applied conservation measures to hold rainfall where it falls. Terraces, diversion terraces, contour farming and waterways, where needed coupled with a good vegetative program do much to hold water where it falls and in case of heavy rainfall will conduct run-off water to protected outlets in an orderly manner with minimum erosion or soil loss.

Land cover to include cover crops, crop residue utilization and in case of "peanut" sands, a good strip crop program is beyond a doubt the most effective conservation measure in use today by the conservation farmer. Adequate grass cover on range land will control erosion caused by falling rain drops and will greatly reduce sur-

face run off.

Grass litter will also conserve moisture in the soil and improve soil structure with more available moisture and a better soil the result is of course more and better grass for livestock consumption. Many ranchers know the value of grass cover and are resting their ranges to produce more grass litter and in most instances save their desirable native grasses which through continued heavy use would be greatly weakened or even destroyed.

Soil Conservation Service technicians, assisting the District Supervisors of the Upper Leon and Palo Pinto Soil Conservation Districts, have worked with landowners in site determinations, lay out supervision, construction and check out of completed conservation practices. The amounts of these completed practices such as terraces, diversion terraces, waterways and farm ponds are certified to the Eastland County A.S.C. Committee for federal cost share payment.

Twenty-two land owners have constructed terrace systems on their farms for a total of thirty-three miles. Seventeen landowners completed diversion terraces, a total of four miles. Fifteen district cooperators have developed farm waterways to handle terrace water (Continued on Page Two)

and outside water that could not be handled in any other way. A total of forty owners completed farm ponds to insure a source of livestock water and proper distribution of grazing on their range land.

Landowners are reminded of the favorable payment rate available for terrace construction. The Federal cost share is 70 percent of the cost not to exceed three dollars and 50 cents per 100 feet for completed terraces. There is a great need in this area for terraces. Your County A.S.C. Committee district supervisors, agricultural workers and others have recognized this need and provided a very good program to encourage your participation in this and other need conservation practices.

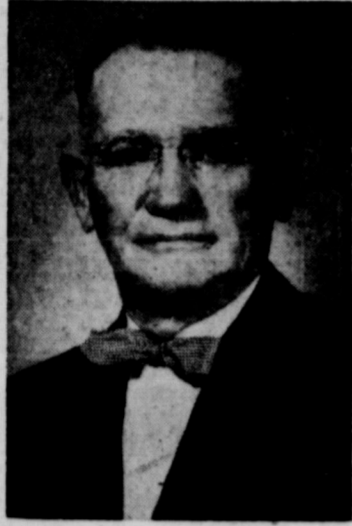

This averaged \$1328.00 per year. These figures are on record in the County Auditor's office, and based on the same fee scale in effect prior to an increase in September, 1955.

According to the Criminal Minutes of the 91st and 88th District Courts, Conner tried an average of 27 cases per year, and Nuessle an average of 33, despite the fact that the county's population decreased approximately 25% between 1940 and 1950, and the number of crimes proportionately. The lower courts show the same picture, particularly the County Court where Conner tried an average of EIGHT (8) cases per year, as shown by the Criminal Minutes, Volume 2, pages 88-166, and Nuessle tried an average of SIXTY-FOUR (64) such cases per year, according to Volume 3, pages 419 to 425, and Volume 4, pages 1 to 281, of the Criminal Minutes.

It should be added that Earl Conner "kept his dockets clean" because according to Volume 2, pages 8 to 15, of the Criminal Minutes of the 91st District Court, Mr. Conner DISMISSED 332 FELONY CASES, then pending on GRAND JURY INDICTMENTS, on December 30, 1946, alone, his last day in office, 258 of which were filed during his 5 terms. Joe Nuessle has dismissed only 46 felony cases that were filed while he has been in office and has only 23 cases pending in the District Court in which arrests have been made and are ready for trial.

This all shows which candidate has really served the people of Eastland County. Let's re-elect the able young veteran of War II, who has led our county back to a position of prominence in law enforcement, where it belongs, by performing an outstanding job.
