BUTTER SURPLUS TO BE TRANSFERRED

An early transfer of millions of pounds of butter "to the tables of those in want" seemed likely, according to the last reports from the capital of the nation. Harry L. Hopkins is the head of the emergency corporation. The purpose of this organization is to close the gap between over-production and want. There is said to be a butter surplus ranging between 50,000,000 and 100,000,000 pounds. Col. Hopkins believes that a one cent a pound tax on butter fat would raise more than enough money to take care of the oversupply or huge surplus. He hopes to get the butter at prices around 15 cents a pound or less. Farm officials believe that it would take only a few weeks to consume 100,000,000 pounds of butter if families on relief rolls were given quantities "proportionate to the quantities the ordinary family would consume."
