Tully Fires 71 To Win LCC Tourney

Fred Winstead blew a nine stroke lead Sunday while Darrel Tully fired the only sub-par round of the Lakeside Country Club's Sixth Annual Invitation Golf Tournament to wrap up championship honors.

Tully shot a 71 in the final 18 holes of the tourney to ice down top honors, while Winstead's 82 dropped him to third place behind Guinn Ferguson of Breckenridge. The champion had a 301 in the 72 hole match, Ferguson carded a 302 and Winstead finished with a 305.

A 320 won First Flight honors for Bill Jenkins of Cisco, who was four strokes ahead of second place Charles Collins of Eastland. John Dickey of Weatherford beat Ranger's Henry Martin 1-up to win Second Flight honors. H. L. Strawn of Big Lake downed J. R. Gilkey 4-2 for Third Flight honors and Lee Griggs of Eastland defeated L. C. Hausel of Rising Star 2-1 to win the Fourth Flight.

Gene Finley of Laird beat Jim Harkrider of Fort Worth 2-1 to win Second Flight consolation honors; Cecil Byrd of Eastland defeated Lamesa's Walker Hart 2-1 for Third Flight consolation awards; and Norman Guess of Eastland downed Jim Smith of Eastland 3-2 for Fourth Flight consolation honors.

Tully didn't realize he had won the tournament until after Winstead came in with his surprising 82. The ex-Eastland High School star, holder of the course record for nine holes with a seven under par 28, didn't think he had a chance Sunday morning, when he trailed by nine strokes.

Winstead had a seven stroke lead over Tully going into the final 18 holes. But the Galveston High football coach put together a 35-36 while Winstead fell to a 59-43. Ferguson was making his bid all the time, shooting a 37-37 to finish in front of the Weatherford golfer.

Chairmen Named To Number Homes

Drive Expected To Be Ready To Roll July 26

Area chairmen for the house numbering drive were named today.

Jim Isbell will be in charge of getting correct numbers for the district east of Seaman and south of Main. The district north of Main and east of Seaman will be worked by Bob King, Jim Golden is in charge of the area west of Seaman and north of Main, W. Q. Yerner will work the area west of Ostrum, including Hillcrest, and Dr. Fehman Lund will be in charge of the area south of Main, east of Ostrum and west of Seaman.

Mrs. James Horton, general chairman of the drive, predicted that only about a third of the residential homes are not numbered correctly. She said Tuesday that about two-thirds of the homes will keep the number they now have.

The men will work the area they have been given and will turn in the corrected lists by July 26. Then the women volunteers will call on each home.

The overall plan is to get all houses correctly numbered and street markers placed at each intersection. About \$1 per water meter will be needed.

Earl Conner, Jr. of Eastland issued a formal statement Monday in behalf of his candidacy for county attorney.

He released the following statement to the press:

"In announcing my candidacy for the office of County Attorney I desire to express my appreciation to the citizens of Eastland County for having been permitted to serve you in this capacity before. During the greater part of this time I served two District Courts, representing the county and State in a large number of contested jury trials, and I obtained a high percentage of convictions. I also represented the State in the County Court which then had jurisdiction to try criminal cases, as well as in the Justice Courts of the county. My entire time was devoted to the discharge of the duties of this office, and my working in close harmony with the various City Police Departments, Special State Boards and Officers, and all duly elected law enforcement officers, a good record was made.

"If elected to serve as your County Attorney it will be my sole purpose to continue to work with all officials and officers whenever called upon to render assistance, whether day or night, to the end that our laws may be enforced in a fair and impartial manner.

"I am a native of Eastland County. My family consists of a wife and two boys. Having been practicing law with my father, Earl Conner, Sr., for more than (Continued on Page Two)

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

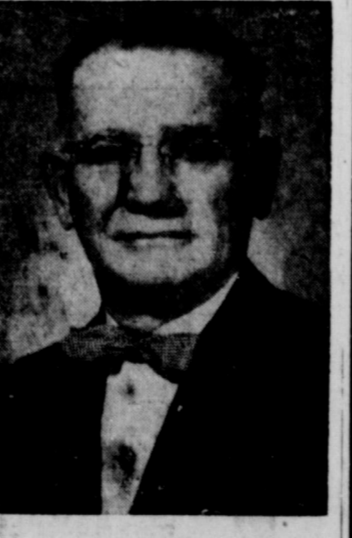
