## Lions See Famous Flag Display Here Tuesday

The history of the United States can be told in many ways, but Burton Coffman, New York City church of Christ minister, probably tells it more colorfully than any person living.

Coffman, Eastland Lions Club speaker Tuesday, presented his "flag program" for members of the club, starting with the Raven flag brought to America by Lief Erickson and ended with the present United States flag.

As he showed each reproduction of a famous flag, he outlined its history and the part it had in making America what it is today. He pointed out the strong British influence on American flags, and the efforts of early Americans to show their resentment through their flags.

The speaker pointed out that many early Americans wanted trees or snakes on their flags, and showed how compromises were made on flags to include both at times. The rattle snake fascinated many early Americans, he said, because it always gave a "warning."

## POLITICIANS END CAMPAIGN

# Democratic Primary Election Is Saturday

Politics hold the spotlight in Eastland County with the Democratic Primary Election set for Saturday.

County and state candidates were this week winding up their campaigns and preparing to view the election results. Reports show that statewide interest is low, but Eastland County interest is running about average.

Twenty-five voting boxes will be available for voters. Eligible voters in Eastland County number around 6,000.

In the governor's race six candidates battle it out. They are Price Daniel of Liberty County, J. Everts Haley of Randall County, J. J. Holmes of Travis County, W. Lee O'Daniel of Dallas County, Reuben Senterfitt of San Saba County, and Ralph Yarborough of Travis County.

In the race for Lieutenant Governor A. M. Aiken, Jr. of Lamar County, C. J. Johnson of Travis County, Ben Ramsey, the incumbent of San Augustine County, and John Lee Smith of Lubbock County oppose each other.

Running for Attorney General are Ross Carlton, Dallas County; Curtis E. Hill, Dallas County; Tom Moore, McLennan County; Will Wilson, Dallas County.

For Associate Justice of Supreme Court: Place No. 1, James R. Norvell of Bexar County and Robert G. Hughes of Tom Green County are running. W. A. Morrison of Milan County and Jesse Owens of Wilbarger County are running for Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals. Mead F. Griffin of Hale County, and Robert W. Calvert of Hill County are opposed for other places on the Supreme Court.

William J. Murray, Jr. of Travis County is unopposed in the race for Railroad Commissioner, and Robert S. Calvert of Travis County is unopposed in the race for Comptroller of Public Accounts.

Warren G. Harding, Dallas County and Jesse James, Travis County battle it out for the office of State Treasurer. For Commissioner of the General Land Office Earl Rudder of McCulloch County and Ned Price of Smith County are running.

Jim Barber of Collin County, Bill Jones of Winkler County, and John C. White of Wichita County are in the race for Commissioner of Agriculture. Martin Dies of Angelina County and Bill Elkins of Dallas County oppose one another for Congressman at Large. Milburn S. Long of Taylor County is unopposed for Associate Justice Court of Civil Appeals, 11th Supreme Judicial District.

Omar Burleson, the incumbent, and Dan Kralis are in the race for Congressman from the 17th Congressional District. Floyd F. Bradshaw and Herman Pitts are running for State Senator from the 22nd District. For State Representative from the 76th District Paul Brashear and Omar Burkett vie for votes.

Mrs. George H. Swinney is unopposed for the State Board of Education as is T. M. Collier for Judge of the 91st Judicial District.

## Lake Leon Water Is Great, Olden Says

OLDEN — Olden residents are getting used to water spurting out of the faucet with pressure now, but it took them a while to remember not to turn the handle all the way around.

For years folks in this city have had wells as their only supply of water. Recently a number of the citizens of the unincorporated township went before the Eastland City Commission to request that they be allowed to tie on to the big line which runs from Lake Leon to Eastland. Finally an agreement was worked out and the group organized the Olden Water Supply Board. Each member pitched in so much and a three inch line was put down. Then 12 tie-ins were made, including the Olden School.

Olden citizens had nothing but praise for the aid given them by the City of Eastland. A spokesman said, "They have helped in every way possible, and we certainly want to thank them."

While the water lines were going in, Olden, in its usual nature, united to do the job done. White collar workers became ditch diggers, and there were enough supervisors around to assure getting an A-1 job done.

How do the new water customers feel about Lake Leon water? "Boy, this stuff is really soft compared to our old well water," one Olden woman said. Another praised the pressure and still another said the fact that "there will be no

more worry about the well caving in or going dry."

"Yes, we like the water," one fellow said smiling, "but we can't tell how much yet. We haven't got our first water bill yet."

## Local Marines Now At Camp Pendleton

CAMP PENDLETON, Calif. — Marine Reservists of the Eastland platoon of the 87th Special Infantry Company flew into Camp Pendleton in three Marine transports for two weeks of annual field training Sunday.

They were greeted at the Camp Pendleton airstrip by Lt. Col. H. L. McPherson, officer in charge, Reserve Liaison and Training Section, representing Major General George F. Good Jr., commanding general of Camp Pendleton. After their first dinner at the Reserve Training Camp, they were assigned quarters and issued the weapons and equipment they will use as citizen-marines during the next two weeks of intense summer training at this 125,000 acre California training base.

Commenting on the trip and the forthcoming training, Major Cleveland Cobb Jr., of Abilene, commanding officer of the unit,

said, "We had a very fine trip. As for the training, we hope to be even more successful than we were last year. We're aiming for 100 percent qualification on the rifle ranges."

Weapons training will be the major theme of the first week which starts early Monday morning on the Camp Pendleton Rifle Range. There, veterans and recruits alike, will review range safety precautions, firing positions, and the finer points of marksmanship before firing in competition with five other Reserve units from cities across the nation on Friday.

In addition to the M-1 rifle — basic weapon of all Marines — the Eastland citizen-marines will fire pistols, automatic rifles, and other crew-served weapons during this first week.

In September  
For Dallas Negro**

The trial of Odell Christian, Dallas negro, is scheduled for the first criminal case week in September in the 91st District Court. He is charged with assault with intent to rob which carries possible imprisonment of not less than two nor more than ten years, and burglary of a private residence at night which carries possible imprisonment of any term of years not less than 5, which could mean as many as 99 years.

Trial was originally set for June 4th but was continued by the judge of the District Court until September on the grounds that the defendant's Dallas lawyer was scheduled for active duty with the Army reserves beginning June 3rd. As is customary court was recessed during the summer months of July and August from contested cases. County Attorney Joe Nuesse has described these cases as among the most vicious he has encountered while in office. Bail bonds totalling \$2,500 were set by Judge T. M. Collie following the return of the indictments.



**WEST TEXAS FAIR SET FOR SEPTEMBER AFTER SHUTDOWN**

The West Texas Fair will be revived in Abilene, Sept. 10-14 after a five year lapse while waiting for a new Exposition Center. It will be held at the recently completed Taylor County Exposition Center and will have a whopping \$18,454.25 premium list. The Fair was de-activated after the 1950 show until more adequate facilities could be built to handle the continually increasing Fair crowds.

In announcing the premium list, Fair President John A. Wright, Abilene, said that the Board of Directors is anxious to once again make the annual event the outstanding success it was for fifty years. Dairy cattle will vie for West Texas honors in both Holstein and Jersey Departments. Premiums of \$1,330 each will be paid in both. Sheep breeders can look forward to prizes of \$1,144 in the Sheep Department and the Swine Show will have a cash total of \$1,016 for the winners.

The Rabbit Show at this 51st West Texas Fair will have premiums of \$169.00 and the Poultry Show will have a total of \$275.

**IT'S THE LAW**  
 in Texas



**NO WILL? STATE LAWS WILL NAME YOUR HEIRS.**

What will happen if you should die without executing a legal and proper will? Who will inherit your property? Your husband, wife, mother, father, children, your wife's relatives? The best way you can say who will have it is to provide a will which will protect your rightful beneficiaries and dispose of your property in accordance with your wishes.

When a deceased has no will, or dies "intestate" as the law calls it, the property of that person is distributed according to a detailed formula fixed by law. In some cases this may be the way

you yourself would divide it — but in many cases it is not.

The provisions of the law concerning the distribution of the property of a person who dies without a will are rather complicated, and all of the possibilities cannot be covered by a general statement.

There are different rules for real estate and for personal property, for community property and for separate property, for homestead property, and for all of the many possible combinations of surviving relatives. Each situation must be carefully studied to determine the correct distribution of the property.

For example, here is a general idea of how the community property which you and your spouse have accumulated will be divided if you do not make a will prior to your death.

If your husband or wife survives and there are no children, the surviving spouse receives all of the property.

If, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of deceased children, they would divide one-half of the property, while the surviving spouse would receive the other one-half.

Of course, grandchildren do not share in the estate unless their parent who would inherit is deceased. And when descendants of previously deceased children do inherit, they receive only the portion that the child would have received, regardless of the number of such descendants.

An odd note, perhaps, is that the surviving spouse already owns one-half of the community estate prior to your death, and the law adds nothing to this share where there are children surviving.

When there are only children and their descendants surviving,

they divide the entire community estate between them.




