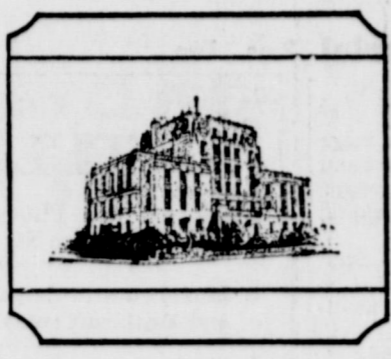

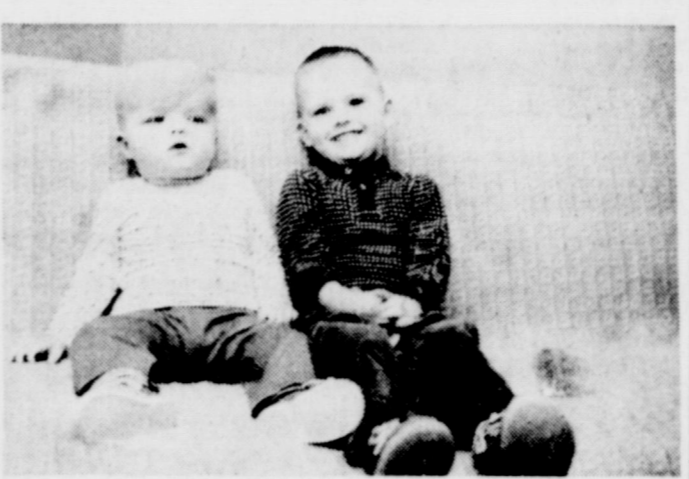

For one 15-month-old youngster, it and earlier such drives certainly means a lot. As young as he is, he may not be fully aware of all that March of Dimes means, but as he grows and as he learns, MOD will mean much.

Maybe unknowingly, but young Haden Lee Johnson and MOD are kinda, well, buddies. March of Dimes, through its annual drives, is attempting to find the answer to birth defects. Polio was given the big KO by MOD, and now there are other giants to conquer.

Through no fault of his, his parents or anyone else, little Haden is one of the many, who at birth, was not as fortunate as some who are healthy and well. The technical name for Haden's condition is long and to the non-physician, confusing. It's commonly known as water-head. Through MOD research, the condition is treatable, and also through MOD financial help, the hospitalization costs are not as staggering as they might be.

Haden's mother, Mrs. James Johnson tells it well: "What is the money from the March of Dimes used for now? Some of you may be like I was. I just didn't give

it much thought until November of 1964. Then we found out that our six-weeks old baby, Haden Lee, was going to have surgery.

"We learned that we were eligible for the National Foundation help. Since that first time, Haden has had two other surgeries. One in June, the other in November of 1965. Each time the hospital has been paid by the National Foundation.

## VOTING IN 66 DEPENDS ON POLL TAX RECEIPT

Local school and city elections will be in April and the big Democratic primary, May 7.

Test cases are expected against the State of Texas questioning the legality of the Poll Tax — but until these are decided, the poll tax is the qualifying factor in local elections.

In order to be eligible for local voting, Eastland County residents are being reminded that the deadline for paying poll taxes is Jan. 31.

To date, some 500 taxes have been sold at the Courthouse, Eastland, according to Tax Collector Edgar Altom. Last year, 2,915 taxes were sold.

Poll taxes may be paid at the Tax Collector's Office, County Courthouse, Eastland; or at the following sub-stations: Cisco, Chamber of Commerce; Gorman, Todd's Variety Store; and Rising Star, Jenkin's Insurance Agency.

In the fast moving field of agriculture, keeping up with the latest trends and information is a big problem, according to Gilbert Copeland, the agriculture teacher at Olden.

In the Olden F. F. A. Chapter, latest information and progress reports from the Texas Experiment Stations are received shortly after publication and are passed on to students.

Periodic trips are made to nearby experiment stations and school work is tied in as closely as possible with the work of other recognized authorities in the field of agriculture.

Olden F. F. A. Chapter received a number of copies of most farm magazines which are read and studied by the students. Frequently, students are assigned reports which must be obtained from such publications. In this manner, they are able to keep up to date with the latest happenings in the field of agriculture.

## Does The Sabanno Have Possibilities?

A flood control program for the Sabanno River in Eastland County which could provide irrigation waters for increased farm production?

As far out as the immediate idea might seem, it's being thought about by many here, including specialists who visualize the possibility for an enormous potential in production and farm income.

Recognizing that the southern half of the county, through which the Sabanno winds, is among the best farm land in the county, the specialist envision a series of small dams to contain the flowing waters and prevent the occasional flooding by the ordinarily peaceful little river.

With peanut farmers' thoughts turning more and more toward irrigation to "help control" the amount of moisture their crops get, the idea of surface water appears tempting indeed. Right now there is a tremendous surge in water-well drilling in the county and the results are expected to be good. Drilling may have its drawbacks, but when a good well "hits," it can mean better production for the raiser. One progressive Kokomo - area farmer has put down five holes and one of these proved a good irrigation source.

The water table is varied in the county — high in spots, low in others, deep here, shallow there. Surface water would solve the problem of lowering water tables through heavy pumping which is causing concern in other sections of the nation.

The Sabanno comes into the county just south of Scranton on the Western boundary, goes by Nimrod, between Pleasant Hill and Romney, meanders southward just north of Okra and goes out of the county just south of Gorman. Heavy rains have on occasion swelled the little river and caused flooding. Such an industrious project

would undoubtedly involve Corps of Engineers surveys, petitions, applications, financial assistance and multitude of other details, it is guessed by the specialists.

A recent U. S. News and World Report article on California's state - wide aqueduct system now under construction, and its anticipated irrigation significance, is of particular interest to those concerned with farming and water usage:

"California is keeping pace with its water needs in spite of vast demands for irrigation to make the arid countryside produce food the State's millions. In addition, California supplies 25 per cent of all U. S. table foods.

"Under irrigation in California are 8 million acres, one fourth of all the irrigated land in the U. S. This requires 87 per cent of the state's total water consumption.

"California growers prefer irrigation to rain, which often comes at the wrong time. Says a grower in the San Joaquin Valley "We grow most of our crops in California by betting it won't rain."

"In most years, the growers win their bets. For 108 of the past 115 years, no damaging summer rains have fallen in the Valley.

"With an optimum mix of soil, climate, water and know-how, California growers out-produce all other areas of the U. S. Virtually every crop that is grown commercially in America is found on California's irrigated farms.

"California leads all other states in cash income from farming. The nation's three richest farm counties — Fresno, Kern and Tulare — are located in the San Joaquin Valley.

"Much of the irrigation water comes from underground, drawn by wells that cost as much as \$80,000 each. One big grower has paid more than a million dollars a year for electricity to run his pumps.

"The drain on underground supplies has been great in recent years, causing the water table to drop.

"Now thanks to the State Water Project, water is on the way to replace that drawn from dwindling underground supplies."

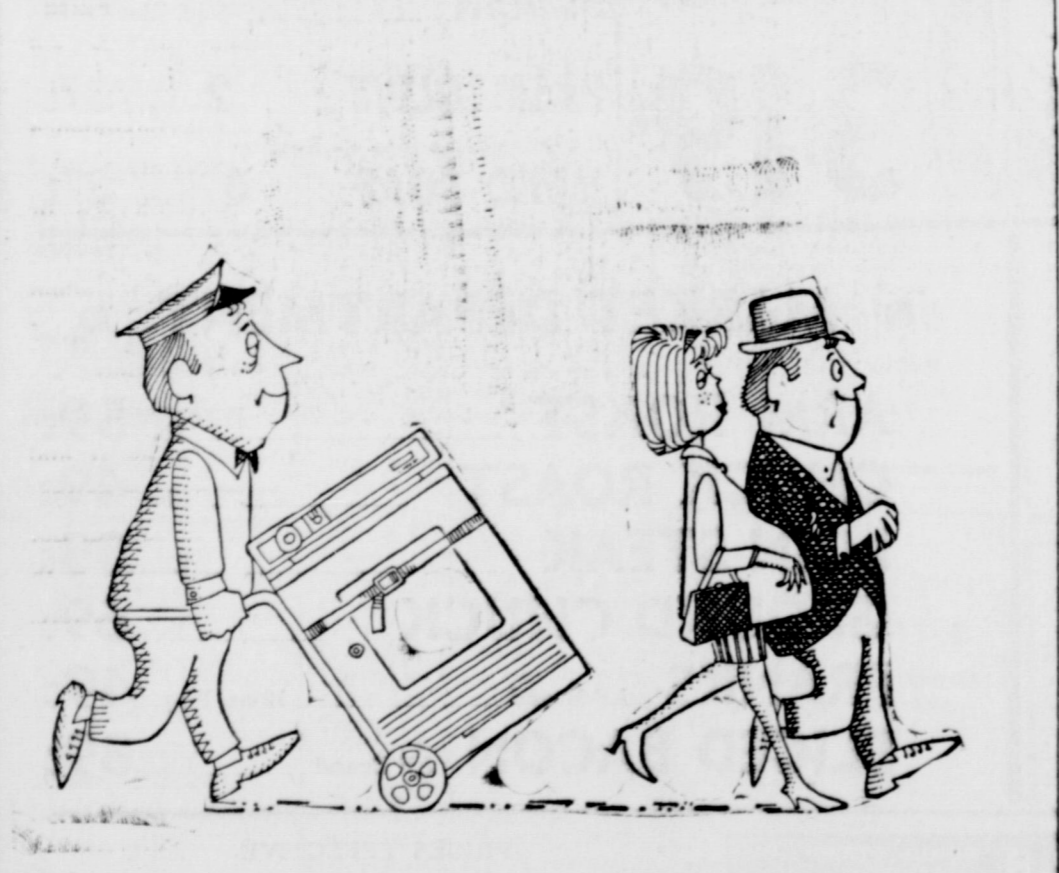

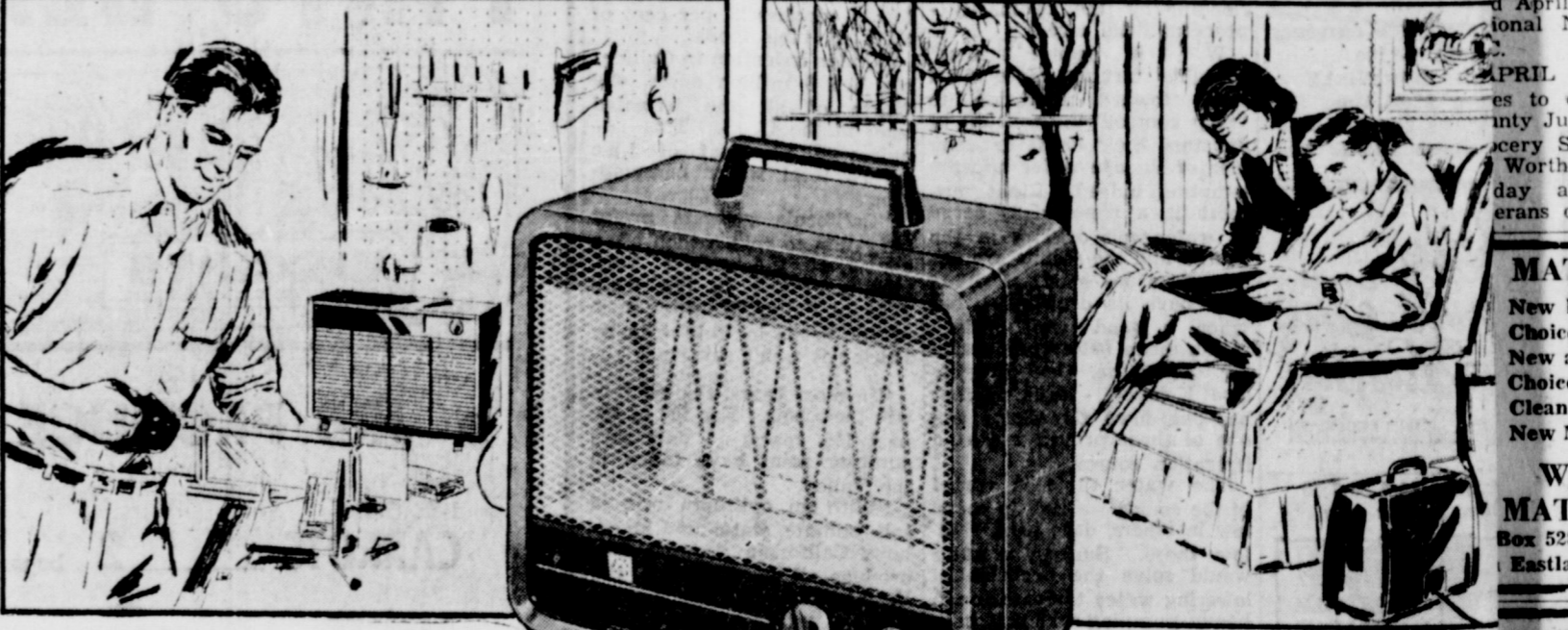

Vets Warned To Return Annual Income Reports

James Wright, County Veterans Service Officer, announced Saturday that all persons receiving Veterans Administration disability or death pension benefits must complete and return the annual income questionnaire and prior to January 31, 1966.

Veterans Administration stated that all such persons received the annual income questionnaire card with their pension checks on or about December 1, 1965. On these cards, the claimants should report to the Veterans Administration, their total annual income for the calendar year of 1965 and the total income they expect to receive during the calendar year of 1966. From the information shown on these cards, the Veterans Administration determines the amount of pension benefits a person is entitled to receive. If the reports are not returned by January 31, 1966, it will be necessary for the Veterans Administration to de-

mand the return of all benefits paid to the person during 1965. Anyone desiring assistance in completing the annual income report may contact the Veterans Service Officer at Modern Dry Cleaners in Eastland. The County Service Officer also announced Saturday that beginning in January, 1966, the Veterans Administration began using ZIP Codes on all mail. Veterans and their dependents who correspond with the Veterans Administration should be sure that their own ZIP Code is shown in their return mailing address. The use of ZIP Codes will help both the Veterans Administration and the Post Office in handling all mail to and from veterans.
