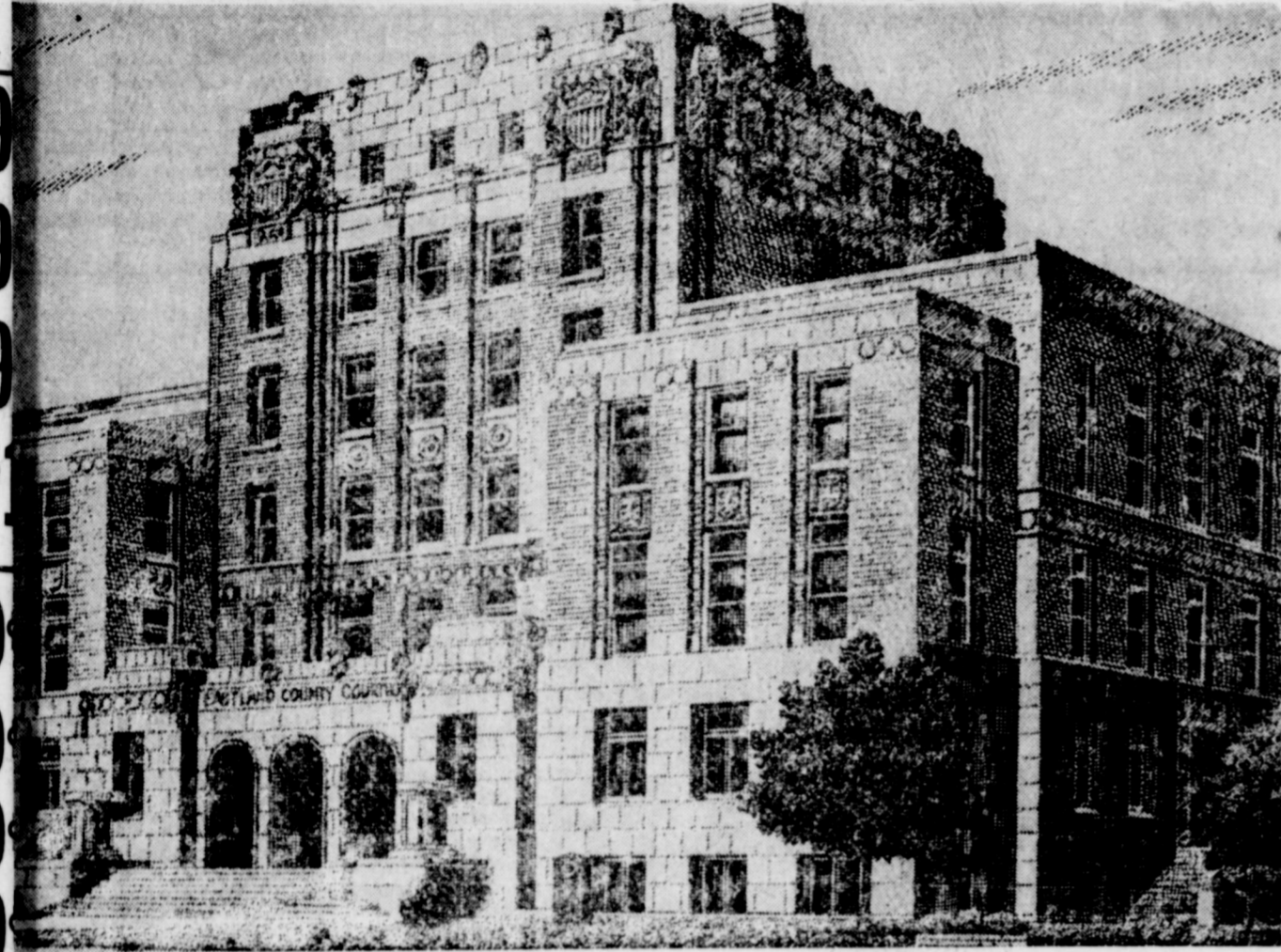

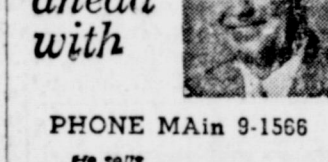



# Voter Registration Gets Underway In County

The 15-day temporary voter registration began on schedule, and slowly, Thursday morning at the courthouse tax office, Tax Assessor-Collector Edgar Altom reported Friday.

At mid-morning Thursday, only two persons had availed themselves of the opportunity to register under the new plan.

There was no evidence of Texas Rangers, FBI agents or other law enforcement officers present for the purpose

of seeing that registration got underway, he said.

Directives and a blank form received by Mr. Altom and news media personnel Thursday morning indicate that the State Attorney General's office has made only one minor revision in announced procedures for registration, and this revision DOES NOT affect Eastland Countians because there are no towns in the county with as much as 10,000 population.

Pertinent data regarding the registration is as follows: Registering is at the Courthouse tax office only.

Time is from March 3 through March 17. Only those persons who were subject to payment of the poll tax levied for the year 1965 (that is, those persons who were between 21 and 60 years of age on Jan. 1, 1965, and were legal residents of the State on that date) may register during this period.

A person subject to the tax has been issued either a paid poll tax receipt or a "Poll tax not paid" (the federal-free receipt) during the regular registration period which ended Jan. 31, need not and should not re-register.

Application forms for conditional voter registration certificates may be secured at many places in the county, even though the actual registration is being done at the

county tax office only.

The application forms may be picked up, filled in and mailed to the tax office, Post Office Box 389, Eastland, not later than midnight, March 17, 1966, he said. Certificates of registration will be returned by mail.

Ranger — School tax office, Commercial State Bank, City Tax Office and L. & J. Supply Co.

Cisco — Chamber of Commerce office.

Rising Star — Jenkins Insurance Office and Rising Star Record.

Gorman — Todd's Variety Store, Gorman Progress and Higginbotham's and Co.

Eastland — At the Tax office and at the Eastland Telegram.

Pat developed an ulcer and was placed on limited service as 1st Lt. and that is his present status as of today. In 1956 Pat was home again and then it happened—A SON was born, Jim Pat, now a senior in Eastland High School.

Twice more, Father Miller was blessed, Jeanie Beth, a 7th grader, and Merrill Sue, a fifth grader.

Now to expose some of the metal of which the man is made—in 1952 Pat and Annette agreed to pamper his childhood dream—he wanted to be a farmer. It was four days after Ranger Auction was robbed (Feb. 18) that three other burglaries took place. Dairy Treat No. 1 in Cisco lost \$45 in cash; Dairy Treat No. 2, Cisco, received about \$40 worth of property damages and lost an undetermined amount of cash; and damages were done at American Legion Hall, Eastland, when it was robbed of \$10 cash.
