On Verge Industrial Growth, C-C Banquet Told

is on the threshold of a breakthrough in industry with some 200 per cent growth in the next few years as they gathered for the annual Eastland Commerce Banquet to honor many of the city's leaders for their accomplishments.

C. E. (Sonny) Bentley, president of Abilene Savings and Loan Association, was principal speaker, and announced as recipients of the chamber's coveted Golden Deeds awards were:

Mrs. Don Russell, Mrs. James Horton, Mrs. Samuel Butler, Mrs. Donald Kinnaird, Sr., Milton Fullen, Jack Frost, Don Viergever, Ben Hamner, Bernard Hanna, Virgil Seaberry Jr., Judge Cecil Collings and James Smith.

Honored for their scholastic standings were these Eastland High School students:

Linda Norris, freshman; Lela Lee, sophomore (two-time winner); Marsha Tread-

well, junior (three-time winner); and Sharon Spradling, senior (four-time winner).

Supt. Wendell Siebert was master of ceremonies and Mayor Frank Deaton gave the invocation. Guests were introduced from Albany, Abilene, Cisco, Ranger, Brownwood, Breckenridge and Fort Worth.

Chamber President Jack Arrington gave the welcome and outlined the progress of the chamber during the past year. He said, "Don't be afraid to invest in Eastland — Eastland is growing," as he pointed out that three major buildings will begin construction soon within the city limits, and three others just outside the limits.

There have been seven new businesses begun in the last year, he said, and there are presently 13 industries in the town. Hollywood Vassarette has 35 new employees, and due to announcements made during the past two weeks, the plant as we now know it, will be doubled.

The industrial foundation and the city council have set aside three tracts of land of some 600 acres for industrial sites, and are busy preparing brochures for prospective locators, he said.

The guest speaker was introduced by Attorney Virgil T. Seaberry Jr.

In a rather slow, deliberate manner, County Native Bentley pointed out that Texas now leads the nation in new plant construction (or planned), and that it is the responsibility of each community to sell itself. "In industrialization," he said, "the tangibles (whether the plant can make a profit) come first, then the intangibles (whether the people are friendly and is it a good place to live) often take over." The need for upgrading higher education was pointed out as important by Bentley, in explaining that the eastern

Hugh Hamilton Hardeman, 74, passed away Monday morning, April 18, at 5 a.m. in the Eastland Memorial Hospital, where he had been admitted at 2 p.m. Sunday, April 17.

Mr. Hardeman was born August 28, 1891 in Killeen, but made his home at 501 South Daugherty in Eastland for the past 22 years.

Mr. Hardeman was a retired machinist from Rice University Electronics and was a member of the Masonic Lodge, the Eastern Star, the Carpenters union and the Methodist church of which he was a member for 63 years.

Mr. Hardeman married Prudie C. Hargus December 9, 1917 here in Eastland, who survives him along with two sons, Hugh Hargus Hardeman of Waco and Major William P. Hardeman of New Braunfels; two daughters, Mrs. N. D. Swope of Killeen, and Mrs. Prudie May Gibson of Eastland; one sister, Mrs. T. H. Minor of Killeen; 13 grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

Funeral services were conducted Tuesday, April 19 at 3 p.m. in the Arrington Hamner Funeral Home with Rev. Lester Davenport, pastor of the First Methodist, officiating.

Burial was in the family plot in the Eastland cemetery. Pallbearers were Henry Van Geem, Cyrus Miller Sr., Ben Drake, Elton Simpson, Geard Wingate, and Winston Boles. Arrangements were made through Arrington Hamner Funeral Home of Eastland.

City Okays Rec Director; Hires Firm; Reduces Rates

The City Commission said "Yes" to an extensive city-wide summer recreation program for Eastland, but "No, No" to an on-the-square recreation hall, during the regular monthly meeting at City Hall Tuesday evening.

Winning approval for the summer recreation program was Coach Shirley Frazier's proposal that the city permit him to set up an extensive program which would involve junior high, high school students and others in a variety of athletic programs.

The commission agreed to allocate \$600 to be used in salary for a period of from June 15 through August 15, date when football drills begin. The public school tin-

gym, the city's swimming pool and other facilities will be used, with other organizations assisting and helping as needed, particularly for special events such as track meets and other activities.

The commission refused permission to locate a recreation club on the east side of the square, in response to a request from R. H. Palmour of Odessa. It was agreed, however, that assistance will be extended for location of such an enterprise somewhere else within the town — following an extensive credit and reference check of the Odessa man.

Mayor Frank Deaton presided, and Commissioners James Reid, Bill B. Hart and

Dr. M. A. Treadwell Jr. were present. The results of the recent election were canvassed and approved.

And the commission reorganized, with Reid retaining the chairmanship of the group, with Reid to continue as mayor protem, and Curtis Koen, who was re-elected, but absent due to illness, continuing as secretary-treasurer. Hart will be assistant treasurer.

Coach Frazier's appearance immediately followed the Odessa man's, and he pointed out that he conducted such municipal programs in other towns where he has coached on three different years.

Hours of the program are expected to be from 9 to 12 a.m. and from 2 p.m. on, he said, with schedules and details to be worked out and announced, so that all youngsters and persons wanting to participate in an organized program may do so. The commission approved the title of City Recreation Director for Frazier, and authorized him to be in charge.

The city fathers opened bids on a new police car, and accepted the low bid of \$900 from Pipkin Motor Co. for a police - pack equipped Rambler. High bid was \$13,000. The police will trade in their present Rambler police car.

Attorney Hart reported that he has learned that Justice of the Peace Wells Dalton can legally be hired by the city to take over responsibilities of the Corporation Court, relieving City Manager Lewis Tiner of that responsibility. It is to be determined if he will be paid on a fee or salary basis.

The commissioners also during the busy session agreed to hire the Odessa firm of Kenneth Engineering and Consulting Co. to survey and evaluate costs and needs of the city as regards to paving, sewerage, airport facilities, etc. Cost is to be \$1,200 for the company's services, and the company has agreed to prepare and submit details on everything the city asks.

On a motion by James Reid, it's okay to water your lawns more now. The group passed his suggestion that the city begin its summer water rate program, beginning immediately — that is the reduced rate will be reflected on bills received about May 15, but will be from about April 15 to that date. The extended dry weather prompted the commissioner's early action this year.

Discussion was also held on Southern TV's micro-wave installation; the old tourist court on East Main St.; a city beautification project; and securing of escrow money now held in Austin.

Senator Creighton Explains Plan Of Re-Apportionment In Talk Here

Causes and effects of re-apportionment were topics for discussion as Sen. Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells was guest speaker for the Rotary Club in Eastland Monday at the luncheon meeting at the White Elephant.

Frank Sayre was program chairman and introduced Sen. Creighton, who was accompanied by his wife Sue and Mr. and Mrs. Bob Hickey, also of Mineral Wells.

Quite a few guests were present for the special Rotary program, presided over by Vice President Roland McFarland. Introduced by Secretary Kenneth Thompson were Kay Jackson, Lloyd London and Leland Willis, all of Cisco; Virgil T. Seaberry Jr., J. E. Carter, Bill Hart, M. H. Perry, Mike Collings, James Reid, Saul Pullman and Mrs. Frank Sayre.

Thompson, assistant scoutmaster for the Rotary Troop 6, also gave a report on a recent scouting event at Camp Billy Gibbons.

An explanation of how District 22, which he has served for some 10 years, was enlarged under the recent re-apportionment plan highlighted Senator Creighton's talk.

"Reapportionment is one of the most misunderstood pieces of legislation," Sen. Creighton pointed out during his talk, explaining that it goes back some 20 months when it was held in a Colorado test case that the upper house of the state legislature must be apportioned according to population and not on geographic or economic basis.

A Texas circuit court later upheld the Colorado decision, which resulted in some metropolitan areas now having

more than one senator. When the Texas legislature convened in January, bills were introduced to set up the upper house based on population. (A first draft would have put Eastland County with a northern district and stretching westward to the New Mexico border, but Sen. Creighton and Sen. Ralph Hall were successful in drafting a new bill which won approval.)

The old 22nd Senatorial District had ten counties with approximately 178,000 people. Under the new bill, a minimum of 345,000 people was needed for equal districting, so eight of the original counties with 119,000 population, were retained (Callahan and Denton Counties were dropped) so the South Part of Tarrant County was added. This section had 201,000 population



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

(Continued from page 1) in the 1960 census, but is estimated to have at least 250,000 now, Sen. Creighton said, explaining that is why he's having to spend so much of his time in that part of the district now.

Predicting what lay ahead when the legislature convenes in January, he foresees some interesting duals on taxes. ("The big town legislators historically are in favor of spending, but are reluctant to take action on the needed taxes to finance their endeavors.") insurance; and city problems.

Houston went from one senator to four under the new districting; Dallas from one to three; and Fort Worth to one and two-thirds — "I'm their two-thirds," the speaker said. In order to continue the state's project of updating education, Sen. Creighton ex-

pects the removal of certain exemptions on the present sales tax. Asked directly how he stands on the proposed state income tax, he answered, "I'm one of its strongest opponents." He helped write the present sales tax law. Last year a total of 175 patients from Eastland County required treatment in a State Mental Hospital. For this reason citizens of Eastland are being invited to Abilene on May 7 to join the battle against mental illness as one of Texas' foremost experts on mental health speaks at a Mental Health Week dinner.

The speaker, Dr. Shervert Frazier of Austin, is the Commissioner of the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation. He was appointed commissioner of the department by the new Texas Board of Mental Health and Mental Retardation on December 1, 1965 after the board was authorized by the last session of the Texas Legislature.

He is former director of the Houston State Psychiatric Institute and chairman of the Department of Psychiatry at Baylor University. Dr. Frazier is a native of Shreveport, La., received his pre-medical education at Baylor, served as a medical officer in the Navy during World War II, and entered private practice in general medicine in Harrisburg, Ill., following the war.

He received training in internal medicine and psychiatry at the May Foundation in Rochester, Minn., at the New York State Psychiatric Institute and the Presbyterian Hospital in New York City. He was on the faculty of the

Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons prior to coming to Houston in 1962.
