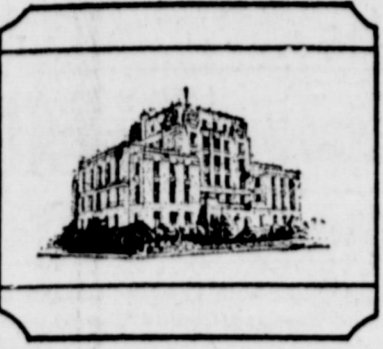

Area's Farm And Ranch Outlook Improved By Good General Rain

The farm and ranch outlook appeared considerably brighter this week after rainfall measuring 3.5 to 5.8 inches fell during the past few days throughout Eastland County and this region. The heaviest measurable rain was reported in Cisco where a 2-inch deluge late Monday brought the period's total to 5.8 inches. Measurements were reported elsewhere as follows: Eastland 3.30 inches, Ranger 3.85 inches, Rising Star 3.7 inches, Carbon 3.9 inches, Gorman 3.85 inches, Scranton 5.5 inches, Moran 5 inches, and Morton Valley 4.5 inches. Although the rain came too late to materially benefit the small grain crops of the area, it left fields and pastures soaked. Bill McCutchin, assistant county agent, reported that the grain harvest would be spotted in this region. Many of the fields have been opened to livestock for grazing, he added.

John Truesdell Funeral Rites Held Wednesday

GUS ORMAN GETS FIVE YEARS ON MARIJUANA POSSESSION CHARGE

Gus Orman of Cisco was sentenced Monday to a five-year term in the state penitentiary after pleading guilty to a charge of possession of marijuana. Orman's trial was held in 91st District Court with Judge Frank Sparks presiding. No appeal will be made by Orman's attorneys, Earl Conner Jr. of Eastland and Jim Robinson of Abilene.

It has not been announced when Orman will be taken to Huntsville to start his term. He was arrested 10 miles north of Cisco on Highway 380 in February by two Liquor Control Board inspectors. The arresting officers confiscated 23 ounces of refined marijuana from Orman, who was also carrying whiskey and beer. In the past, Orman was freed on three bootlegging counts.

Orman was the target of a shotgun blast at his home earlier this month. Orman will have a period of ten days in which to appeal the trial. He will not be in custody until this time is up. James Lee Campbell of Eastland was tried for the sale of whiskey. No verdict was reached however, the trial resulted in a hung jury. Lane reported.

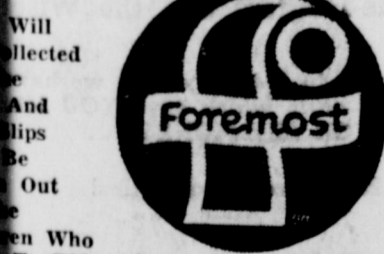

**Postal Savings
To Be Withdrawn
Postmaster Says**

Depositors with postal savings certificates are being urged by the local postmaster to withdraw their accounts from Post Offices as soon as possible or as soon as the anniversary dates on their cer-

The Postal Savings System was abolished March 27, 1966, with the signing of Public Law 89-377 by President Lyndon Johnson.
"As of April 28, no deposits can be accepted and no new accounts can be opened," the postmaster said. "Interest will end on the anniversary date of each certificate."

For convenience all certificates held by a depositor may be cashed at the same time and interest will be paid for each full month they have been outstanding beyond three months from the interest date, the postmaster said.
The Postal Savings System was established Jan. 1, 1911, to get money out of hiding and to attract savings of a

large number of immigrants who were accustomed to saving at Post Offices in their own country; also, it served as a safe depository for people who had lost confidence in private banks.
Unpaid deposits remaining in the Post Office beyond June 30, 1967, will be transferred to the Treasury Department in a trust fund and will be available for payment without time limitation whenever proper claims are received, the postmaster said.

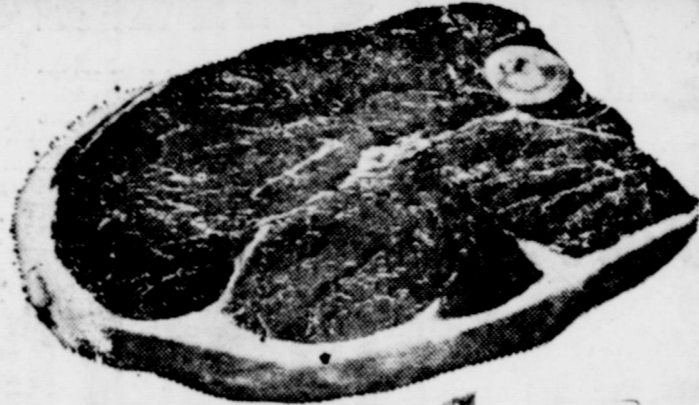

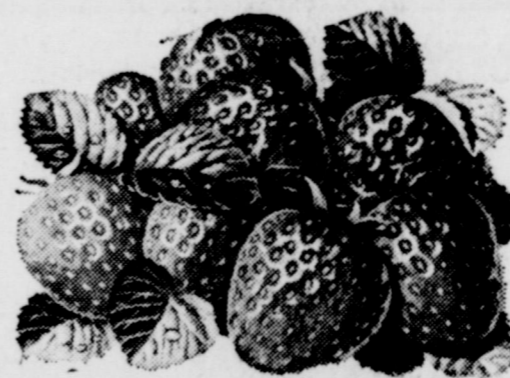
