BANK DEPOSITS in Eastland County reflect a healthy financial picture as the first quarter of the year came to an end. . . Total deposits in the five county banks reached \$20,308,808 as of the April 5 bank call. That's far above the same reporting period last year when the county total amounted to \$17,757,177. . . The current total is just below \$20,477,481 reported at the end of December, 1965 — but economists expect this, and report the first quarter holdings to be the "lowest" of the year, and the December figure to be the highest. . . East of the five banks helped account for the increase with individual gains over a year ago — The First State at Rising Star showed the biggest jump over the '65 total.

The industrialist committee gave their report and announced that there are three industrial prospects for Eastland. Three members, Don Viergever, James Smith, and A. D. Taylor, were selected to study the Chamber of Commerce by-laws and they will make recommendations, if any, for re-vamping the laws.

Hay Barn Burns \$1,000 Damage

A barn northwest of town was completely destroyed by fire Friday afternoon, April 29, at 3:03 p. m., according to the fire department.

The barn, which contained a lot of hay, was the property of H. L. Gibson.

Firemen were at the scene from the time the fire began until about 9 p. m. fighting the flames. They were called back to the scene at about 2:30 a. m. Saturday.

Mr. Gibson estimated the damage at \$1,000. Cause of the fire was not determined.

Rain Total In County Tops 7 Inches

Eastland County residents are generally grateful that their "half-foot" of rain came over a long period of some eight days, and not all at once as has been the case with many area points which have experienced serious flooding as the late April showers turned loose.

The total for this county through Friday afternoon, and including the heavy downpour at 2 p. m., is right at six inches — representing seven days on which rain has fallen.

The "spell" began Friday, April 22, and with the exception of last Wednesday, has dumped rain everyday — with up to two and three heavy showers on some of the days. And it was still raining at presstime.

Lakes and tanks in the county, which had been low during the early month of the year, were reported filled as the rains continued. Grass was getting a head start in yards and fields as mowers and hoes were being protected from rust.

Average rainfall for April is 2.87 and this much rain has not fallen in the county in April since 1957 when 6.33 was recorded.

Ranger reported 2.5 inches for Friday and 1.1 for Thursday.

Wind and hail accompanied most of the showers, and members of an Eastland High School speech class reported seeing what they believed to have been a funnel in the northwesterly cloud that swept across Eastland County Friday afternoon. There were no reports of any having touched the ground however.

Ironically, the City of Eastland reduced water rates this month to encourage the use of water for yards and shrubs. The Eastland rain schedule generally looked like this: Friday (April 22), .74 of an inch; Saturday, .75; Sunday, 1.55; Monday, .14; Tuesday, .88; Wednesday, 0; Thursday, .90; and Friday, 1.00.

Cisco's rainfall figures were reported for April as follows: April 10, .8 with hail; April 16, .9; April 19, .3; April 22, 1.6; April 23, .5; April 24, 1.9; April 25, 1.6; April 28, 1.0; and April 29, 2.0. Total: 10.5.

The Eastland High School Maverick Band did everything perfect Friday and brought Eastland a Sweepstakes Trophy for the local honors shelves.

Director John Foster and his hard-working 50-member Maverick band put the finishing touches to the Sweepstakes win in Brownwood Friday when they earned, under stiff judging, first-place ratings (superior) in concert playing and sight reading.

The band had already won the first phase of the three-phase test when they earned a One in marching last November.

It's the first Sweepstakes honor for the school since the early 1950s, Supt. Wendell Siebert reports.

"Everyone is very proud of the band for all the effort put forth in this 1965-66 school year," Mr. Siebert said in complimenting the team effort.

The band returned to Eastland about 5 p. m. Friday and was met by a caravan of well-wishers at the "Y" and given a heroes' welcome, and the buses and autos paraded the streets to happy, happy local supporters.

The victors were treated to a Coke party following the triumphant home-coming by the Band Boosters Club.

Mr. Bob Perkins, president of the Boosters, was enthusiastic in expressing his and the parents' pleasure with the band's success in Brownwood.

Drum Major Donna Viergever and Director Foster both gave credit to the overall cooperation of all the band members for the Sweepstakes win.

Miss Viergever said: "Everyone worked very hard this year in the band and it seemed as if everyone in the band put out a really special effort at the contest."

This feeling was echoed by Director Foster who summarized the win by saying it represents the result of a lot of hard work on the part of his entire band and staff.

The band has had a successful year all around, with several members earning high honors in individual bases — Miss Viergever earned an alternate chair on the All-State Band, and several others worked themselves through District and up to Regional Honors.

The sweepstakes honor is the ultimate competition goal of all bands because it means that the band excels in each of the three areas in which judging is done. Generally, a band will lead in one or perhaps two of the fields, but when one band wins superior ratings in sight reading, marching and concert playing, it is a real hallmark, deserving of extreme honor, authorities report.

VIET NAM
 "I will always support an unyielding stand against communism, and I feel that there is no other tenable position for us to take in Viet Nam than that which the President has so firmly taken. We cannot be soft toward an ideology that has set out to destroy our own way of life. At all times, of course, I believe we should keep the doors open for possible negotiations that would bring about a peaceful solution to open conflicts such as we have in Viet Nam. FREE ENTERPRISE
 "I am not one of those who apologizes for or takes a defensive attitude toward the free enterprise system. It doesn't need defending. It's the best system ever devised for satisfying the material needs and aspirations of the people. There is room for improvement, of course, but this can be done without altering the basic principles which make it function."

EDUCATION
 "Education is the single most important function of an enlightened society. We must make it as accessible as possible, for as many as possible, without either reducing our scholastic standards or jeopardizing our traditional academic freedom. I will favor legislation that broadens our educational base, insofar as it does so without giving the Federal Government control over our curricula. The selection of textbooks and the teaching of subjects should be left exclusively in the hands of the local schools, without infringement of any kind on the part of the government."

WATER CONSERVATION
 "There is no greater problem facing our District than the need for adequate water, now and in the future. I will support any feasible legislation that promises to create greater water resources for our area. Obviously, such legislation is a must, because we don't have enough water as it is, and to neglect it further would be to compound a tragedy. The problem is of such magnitude that it is going to require great study, imagination and vision to solve it. I, for one, am ready to begin."

AGRICULTURE
 "I believe the present Omnibus Farm Bill places too much authority in the hands of the Agricultural Department and its Secretary. As a case in point, there is the arbitrary policy ruling by the Agricultural Department, that adversely affects the farmer by altering skip-row planting practices. I would favor farm legislation that would take into consideration the different and varying characteristics from one farming region to another. Especially would I work diligently to amend the program to again permit the kind of skip-row planting that the farmer of this district wants and needs."

LABOR LEGISLATION
 "I have always favored the right of labor to organize for the purpose of achieving desirable objectives for its working members. I also support the principle of collective bargaining, as it is the only just way to reach a livable balance between labor and management. I do not believe that either labor or management should be allowed to walk rough-shod over the other. It takes both to produce the goods and manufacture the wealth in which we all share, and both have legitimate viewpoints which must be evaluated and adjudicated equitably in any controversy between them. I do not favor any act or measure that would directly or indirectly compel anyone to become a member of any labor, trade, or business organization on a mandatory basis. This, to me, is a dangerous encroachment on the freedom of the individual."

VETERAN'S AFFAIRS
 "As an overseas veteran of World War II myself, I am a supporter of the broad objectives of the Veterans' Program, and I particularly endorse the educational provisions of the G. I. Bill and the extensions of it to include veterans of recent conflicts. As to future legislation for veterans, I will give due consideration to any measure that will tangibly improve the lot of the veteran without putting an unfair penalty on other segments of the population."

JUDICIAL SYSTEM
 "As a former District Judge and District Attorney, I am extremely proud of the lead the legal profession has traditionally taken in the affairs of our government. Especially do I hold our courts in high esteem. To keep our court system above the criticism and reproach it has occasionally undergone in the past, I would introduce and urge passage of legislation that would prescribe basic qualifications for Judges appointed to the federal judiciary. In addition I think it would be desirable to establish a mandatory retirement age, and a procedure for removing judges when they become unfit for service because of health or other reasons."

NATIONAL DEFENSE
 "I will always be a strong advocate of a national defense force large enough and modern enough to maintain our peace and security anywhere it might be threatened. Such a force should be second to none in the quality of its personnel, its leadership, and its weaponry. 




