The American Cancer Society spends 33 per cent of its funds raised on research; \$761,257 went to Texas medical schools and hospitals in 1965 alone.

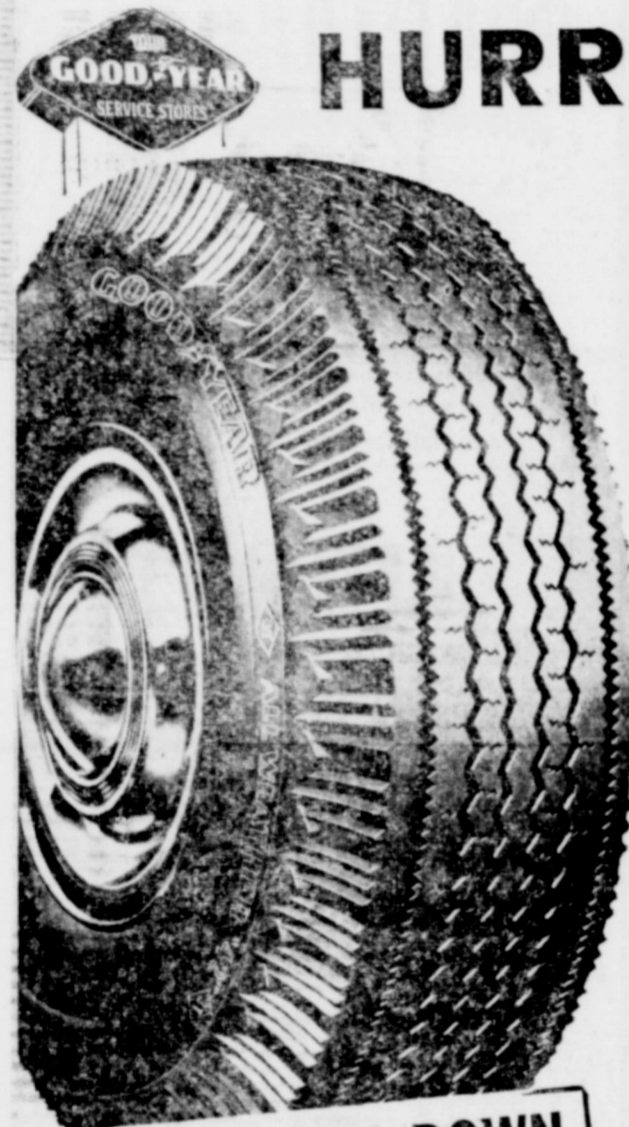

Fee for these stickers is \$1 each and in order to obtain them, the following devices must be in proper working order: headlights must work on both high and low beam, brakes must be in good shape, horn and windshield wipers must work, must have at least one red stop light and one license plate light.
If the automobile is 1948 model or later, it must have a red or amber stop light, two red reflectors on rear and a high beam indicator, Mr. Boustead said.

In Cisco, inspection stickers may be obtained at Booth's Garage, Rawson Motor Co., Graham Motor Co. and Charlie Smith Chevrolet; in Ranger, is Mission Garage and Anderson Chevrolet; Gorman, Smith Brothers Chevrolet; Rising Star, Butler Motor Co.

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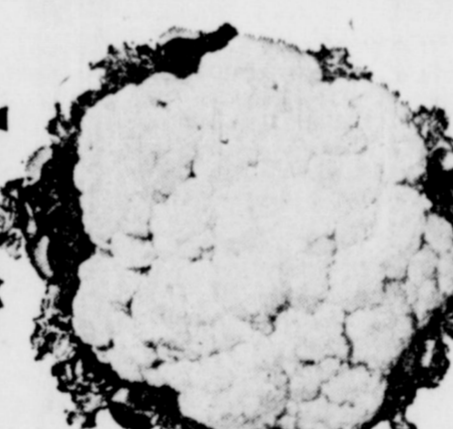
