She is survived by a sister-in-law, Mrs. R. G. Toone of Wolfe City, and several nieces and nephews.

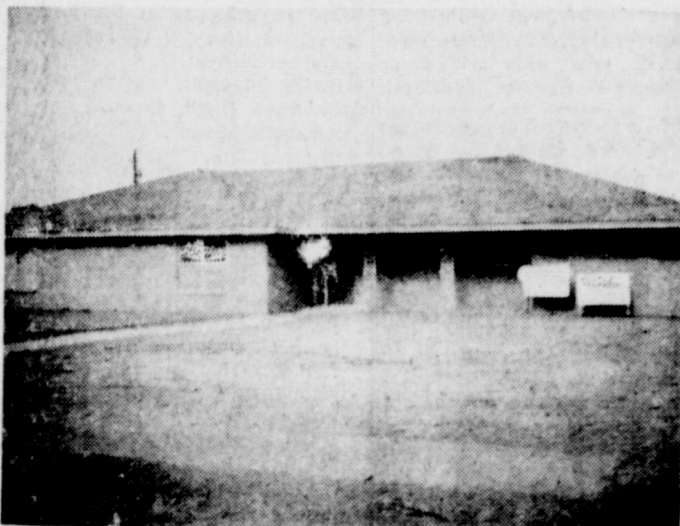

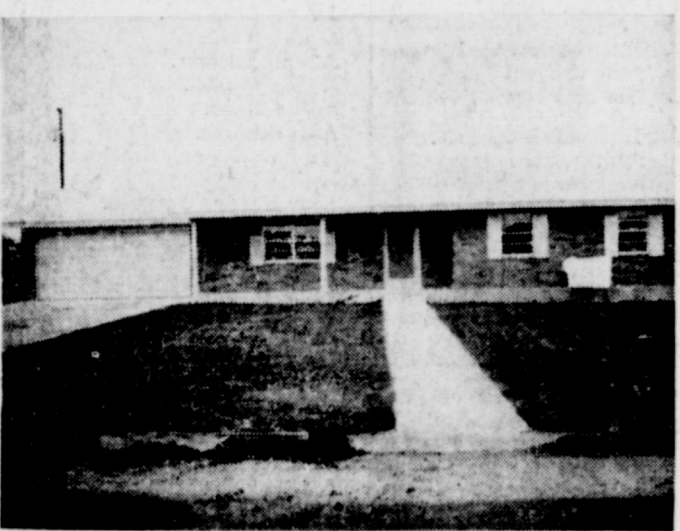

Open House This Weekend At 2 New Eastland Homes

Two of Eastland's many new homes will be open for public inspection Saturday and Sunday, May 21 and May 22, it has been announced here.

The new brick homes to be shown are those built for Mr. and Mrs. Joe Anderson at 1100 S. Seaman St. and Mr. and Mrs. E. O. Moore at 700 S. Dixie St. in the Valley View Estates area.

Both homes are Total Elec-

tric and have been granted the Gold Medallion classification.

Hours for open house are from 1 to 9 p. m. Saturday and from 1 to 6 p. m. Sunday. The homes will again be shown Saturday and Sunday May 28 and 29, it is announced.

L. E. Jones, developer for the Valley View Estates, was builder of the Moore home on

Dixie St. and Phil Phillips of Abilene was builder for the Anderson home.

Both are three bedroom homes and the Moore home is 1,400 square feet in area, and the Anderson home, 1,807 square feet.

The Moore home features a device entirely new to this area and promises to be a "self-cleaning" home. An electronic air-cleaner has been installed and will clean and filter the air throughout, its maker reports. Smith Plumbing Co. here was contractor for plumbing, electric heating air conditioning and installed the air cleaner.

Among the many features of the Anderson home is a cedar closet, twin double closets in the gigantic master bedroom, and carpeting throughout, including the kitchen.

The Moore home is of red brick and the Anderson home of pink brick construction.

Bond Electric, Eastland is electrical contractor for the Moore home and Coats Furniture Co., Eastland, is displaying furnishings throughout the Moore home for the special open house, and is showing selected pieces in the Anderson home.

Goodyear Service Store is displaying General Electric appliances in the Moore home.

The public is being cordially invited to attend the showing of the homes.

Kinnaird Real Estate is representative for the Valley View homes.

The Moore home has antique gold carpeting in the living room, hall, bedrooms and closets. It is equipped with Early American furniture and light fixtures.

The lighting in the living room comes from hanging amber globes and the hanging lights in the den and kitchen are of antique copper with milkglass globes.

In the kitchen the dish washer, range and oven are turquoise. The scalloped cabinets have molding on the doors.

A white folding louvered door opens into the girls bedroom. Such a door is also at the entryway and den.

The hall bathroom has blue fixtures, trimmed with blue, and the master bath has white fixtures with pink tile trimmed in white.

The linen cabinets are white trimmed in gold. In the Anderson home, all area, which are separated by taffey, with the exception of the utility room and foyer.

The living room and dining area, which are separated by a table-top bar have a crystal chandelier, with a green and turquoise drop light also in the dining room. Paneling in fruitwood color accents the dining area.

A built-in dressing area in the master bedroom has antique green coloring (all bedrooms are done in off-white.)

Also done in antique green is the master bath which has ceramic tile and washable vinyl.

The kitchen (carpeted) has a turquoise oven and range. The utility room, containing a white washer-dryer, is done in white and gold.

Antique white with gold is the color of the hall bath. Above the decoratively trimmed paneling in the foyer is wall papering in the gold flock design.

(Continued From Page 1) state, Fisher said. The symposiums bring together students, teachers and outstanding scientists for discussions dealing with basic nuclear science and for educational guidance in this field, it was pointed out.

The foundation is supporting a major research effort aimed at controlling nuclear fusion reactions for peaceful purposes, such as the generation of electric power. The research is being done at the General Atomic laboratory in San Diego and at the University of Texas and the Texas A&M University.

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BROWSING with BEV.....

If teenagers could only be more self-conscious than they are, they would be convinced that good grooming is a passport to poise, much of their agonizing self-consciousness could be avoided. Officials of the American Medical Association have stated that "Many boys and girls of high school age are much more self-conscious than they need to be, simply because they let themselves become careless about their grooming. The very first thing any self-conscious teenager should do is to make it a habit to keep himself perfectly clean at all times."

The AMA further emphasizes that "soap and water are your best friends" in the care of the complexion:

1. A thorough face-washing is needed before bedtime, in the morning after gym or other exercise and always before applying fresh make-up.
2. One bath a day is a minimum.
3. Freshness requires the use of a deodorant or antiperspirant after the bath.
4. Hair should be brushed twice a day and shampooed as often as needed.
5. Nails should be manicured and pedicured at least once a week.

Care of the feet is an often overlooked phase of youthful grooming. But frequent foot-washing and wearing clean socks are of utmost importance in preventing irritation and infection.

Only when cleanliness and neatness are assured can young people forget themselves and be at ease with others.

Good grooming is the total look of a clean body and well cared for clothing.

Retirement can be enjoyed if home accidents don't needlessly mar your health. With planning and a little extra effort, most accidents can be avoided.

Light can help reduce accidents in dark hallways and on stairways. A bedside light and a flashlight in good working order can be other aids for older citizens.

You can prevent many home accidents by learning to use the stair rail to prevent tripping or falling. Never wear loose shoes when going down stairs.

Loose electric cords stretched across the floor are potential causes of home accidents which can result in serious injury. Taps or staples can be used to secure cords away from traffic lanes.

Spilled liquids on the kitchen

or bathroom floor are an open invitation to accidents. Spills should be mopped up as quickly as possible. Give special attention to careful removal of greasy spots, for these are especially dangerous.

Long, loose sleeves or loose cords or ribbons are a safety hazard around the kitchen stove. Loose garments can catch fire quickly, and should never be worn when cooking.

The extra minutes required to turn a saucepan handle away from the stove's edge may prevent a serious burn.

"Accidents don't just happen — they are caused. With care and patience, home accidents can be prevented. So safeguard your retirement years by observing home safety rules."

This month, May, will be observed as Senior Citizens' Month.

Gov. John Connally has issued a proclamation calling attention to Senior Citizens' Month. He has asked people to focus attention on one of the state's most valuable resources — her aging citizens.

This is an opportunity to recognize the continuing contribution which older citizens are making to the communities in which they live. Programs are being planned in many communities to honor them for their achievements and contributions to community life.

Today, in many of our communities, a growing number of older people need our attention and concern. They need health care, housing, recreation, a variety of social services and opportunities to participate in community affairs. This is a good way to focus attention on their special needs.

And we need them! Wisdom and experience belong to the retiring leaders. Energy and developing leadership of today. Youth and age need each other.

During the month, I will be giving ideas for activities involving our county's Senior Citizens during their month, and why not all through the year.

What about a "Friendly Visitors Corps?" Enlist the help of local church groups to assure a friendly visit to all elderly shut-ins during May. Include nursing homes in your visits.

Or, organize a "Transportation Brigade." Simple transportation needs sometimes become very difficult problems for elderly people — we've

found this especially true in our county. A civic club or voluntary organization might set up a transportation corps to assist with grocery shopping, medical visits, a visit to a friend, or perhaps a Sunday drive. This group should consider the possibility of maintaining a permanent corps.

Spring sewing for homemakers is well underway. Many new fabrics are available and some of the more familiar ones are back with new finishes and characteristics.

Bonded fabrics are plentiful in the form of laces, knits, or woven fabrics with a tricot or taffeta type backing. This backing is attached with a heat locking process and makes underlining a garment unnecessary.

Since the backing makes the straightening of the fabric difficult, check the fabric before purchasing it to see that it is not off-grain. It has usually been preshrunk, so shrinking is not necessary.

Choose a pattern with few seams and without intricate details. Lay the pattern on the right side of the fabric, following a lengthwise rib. It is easier to handle if only one layer is cut at a time. To eliminate bulkiness on bodice fronts, bodice backs or jacket fronts, cut facings as part of the main garment, rather than a separate piece.

For ease in sewing, use a thread suitable for the outer fabric, a medium to light tension and pressure, a medium to long stitch and fine to medium needles. Since ripped machine stitching may show, hand baste and fit the garment before permanently stitching the seams. If the fabric is extremely bulky, use a matching lining fabric for facing. Understitch collars, facings and pocket edges where an underseam might show.

Highway Patrol Has Jobs Open For Young Men

Rest Rooms Are Being Built By Highway Agency

AUSTIN — The Texas Highway Department has added considerable zip to its continuing program of driver convenience. The Department has disclosed an initial plan to build rest rooms and unmanned information centers in safety rest areas throughout the State.

The initial plan involves nine rest areas which have been approved by the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads. Eight of the rest areas are in preliminary planning stages while one is ready to be let to contract.

When work is complete on the rest areas, they will be the first in Texas to be equipped with comfort stations and information centers.

The information centers will contain a large bulletin board to provide state-wide and local travel information and dispense maps and other materials. The centers are designed to promote travel and tourism in Texas.

All of the rest areas involved in the plan are located on Interstate Highways. Eventually, virtually all rest areas on Interstate routes will be equipped with comfort stations and information centers.

The work on the nine rest areas in the initial plan will be financed by federal funds under the Highway Beautification Act.
