Gordon W. Foster, president of came, the front of the Pipkin (Continued on Page Two) Food Mart, said terms of the agreement were expected to be completed in order that his company could take over the Pipkin chain Sept. 1.

Food Mart, now doing an annual volume of \$43 million, anticipates a rise to \$50 million with the consolidation.

Pipkin supermarkets located in Eastland, Ranger, Graham, Cisco and Coleman will in the future be known as Worth Food Markets. All other stores in the chain will carry the Food Mart, Inc., name. The new owners said all personnel of the Pipkin chain would be retained.

The history of the Pipkin chain has been a colorful one. Back in 1919 Grady Pipkin came to Eastland to go into the dry goods business. Due to lack of sufficient capital, he and a brother, Jes who died in 1945, purchased small grocery store, which wa located in the building now occu pied by the Eastland Telegram.

From that modest beginning, Pipkin mushroomed his business into its present status of 13 modern stores in West Texas, the latest being opened only last year in Cisco.

In recent years, Pipkin had started turning over active con-trol of the stores to two of his ons, James and Bruce.

A native Texan, he was born near Ferris in Ellis county, being next to the youngest in a family of six boys and two girls. His father, J. C. Pipkin, operated the town's cotton gin. While still a small boy, Grady moved with his family to Plainview in 1890 where his father opened town's first mercantile store. Since the nearest railroad bringing in supplies - the Santa Fe - was at Canyon at that time, the Pipkins sold the Plainview store and mov- Round-Up. business, which they operated for


