## PECAN GRAFTING TO BE STUDIED MONDAY

A one-day pecan grafting school for area men and women will begin at 9 a.m. Monday, April 18, at the Cisco Junior College cafeteria. The lessons, sponsored by the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association and the Cisco Chamber of Commerce, will be free of charge.

George Madden, horticulturist from the U.S. Pecan Field Station in Brownwood, will be in charge of lectures during the morning session. Lectures and demonstrations will be given on cutting and storing graftwood, the conditioning of graftwood, when and how to graft, types of grafting, when to remove wrappings and coverings from grafts and care of the grafts. Mr. Madden will show slides of techniques used at the U.S. Pecan Field Station.

Supplies that will be on hand will be a limited amount of grafting wood and budwood of

Jesus was portrayed by Bill Kendrick. Directing the performance were Phil Kendrick and Mrs. Bill Mitcham of Cisco. Mrs. Mitcham said, "We were delighted with the large attendance." The cast rehearsed twice a week for six or seven weeks. Lighting was handled by Bill Mitcham and Roy Westfall.

A manhunt ended for Cisco and Eastland County officers at 10 a.m. Wednesday with the arrest of Robert W. (Bob) Beauchamp, 24, near the Cisco Clay Pottery on Highway 80, two miles east of Cisco. The man was charged with car theft and breaking into a grocery store.

## 8 Schools Get \$245,000 in Federal Funds

Some \$245,000 in funds have come to the eight high schools of Eastland County during the current school year through federal programs that the county superintendent's office has administered, according to R. B. Golemon in a talk Wednesday at the weekly Cisco Lions Club luncheon.

In addition, the sum of \$45,000 has been approved for the summer. Most of this goes to students in pay for work under the student employment program. Some 160 students earn some \$15 per week in jobs created by the schools for equipment maintenance and improvements, Mr. Golemon said.

The county superintendent's office handles the paper work for all eight of the high schools. In these programs, the government puts up 90 percent of the money and the district the balance. In addition to the student work program, other projects benefit the school libraries and help with equipment purchases and installation.

This program for the public schools is in addition to benefit received by Cisco and Ranger Junior Colleges, Mr. Golemon said.

Mr. Golemon reported that application has been made for participation in a new program — the head start project — that benefits five and six years old children. This program will be available only in Cisco and it is expected that three classes will be set up. In addition to pre-school orientation, the youngsters will receive physical examinations and immunization shots. An announcement concerning this program is expected to be made in the near future, Mr. Golemon added.

Owner Forrest Boone, who was sleeping in a back room, heard the glass break. He got his 12 gauge shotgun and went forward to meet the burglar.

Mr. Boone said he commanded the man to raise his hands and to face the wall. When he obeyed, Mr. Boone picked up the telephone and called police in Rising Star. While he was talking, the man broke and ran. Two blasts from Mr. Boone's shotgun hit him as he entered the car.

The man sped away and Rising Star police, who had heard the gunfire, alerted officers in Cisco. Night Police- man Ray Sue took a Cisco patrol car to set up a road block on Highway 183 just south of Cisco. Officers from Baird, Brownwood and Ranger came to Cisco to help, along with highway patrolmen from Eastland.

Around 6 a.m., the stolen Chevy sped through the road block that Policeman Sue had set up, and Mr. Sue gave chase. Five blocks away, the old Chevy struck a parked car near the Buford Green residence at 1906 Avenue C in Cisco. Beauchamp jumped out and ran.

Officers found blood in the car, indicating that Beauchamp had been hit by pellets from the Boone shotgun. Beauchamp's bag of clothing also was in the car with letters that identified him.

## Engineering Firm Discusses City Planning With Locals

City officials, members of the Mayor's special study committees and others met with representatives of an engineering firm Tuesday evening in another of several long-range planning get-togethers for the city's future. Here from the Kenneth Consulting Engineers and Associ-

ates firm of Odessa were Wade Howell and Ken Edmond, who met with the Eastlanders at the White Elephant Restaurant.

Mayor Frank Deaton presided and the group heard the Odessans explain what their firm can do for Eastland in planning and mapping details

for the city's future. To be considered are paying, sewerage, airport, disposal plants and others.

Present at the meeting were Mayor Deaton, Tom Wilson, T. M. Fullen, Virgil T. Seaberry Jr., Truman Brown, R. P. Haun, M. H. Perry, James Reid, Bill Hart, Don Veirgever, Jack Arrington, Jay Staggs and Lewis Tiner.

The commission meets next Tuesday evening and Mayor Deaton reports that consideration of employing the consulting firm will be discussed.

The representatives met recently with the study committee on streets, headed by Tom Wilson, and it was learned then that the firm can handle planning on all the city's projects, except the charter revision.

The city is not presently obliged to the firm in any way and is not being charged for the planning meetings, and won't be until such time as a contract is entered into, the mayor said.

The firm has done extensive work in West Texas and has an excellent reputation for municipal planning, it is reported.

Mayor Deaton and Mayor Pro Tem James Reid have, with the blessing of the rest of the City Commission, appointed study groups for a long range look into the needs of the City of Eastland through paving streets, bringing the City Charter up to date, modernizing the airport and improving the sewer system.

Eastland is going to be free of bonded indebtedness in the next two years and will have this money to spend for a better Eastland.

With police searching the area, Beauchamp next showed up at the home of Mrs. Emma Ingram at 1003 Avenue A. He was acquainted with some members of the family, but disappeared out the back door when police approached the front. Dixie Sellers, who is a granddaughter of Mrs. Ingram, went to the Cisco police station to report seeing Beauchamp.

The search soon turned to the wooded area east and south of the old Humble company camp. Finally, at about 10 a.m., Beauchamp walked out of the brush to the highway and gave himself up to Cisco Chief S. E. Parkinson. He was taken to the Justice of the Peace office.

Police had alerted area doctors to be on the lookout for Beauchamp. His wounds were treated by a doctor at the Eastland County jail.

Cisco police had a record of handling Beauchamp last fall. The file gave Dec. 7, 1942, as his birthday. It showed that he has lived in Eastland and in Aspermont. He told officers he went to school at Aspermont and that he was the son of Mrs. Louise Gaurey of Clairmont.

Police said he had been to the penitentiary on a forgery charge.

Constable Kornegay said the Boone shotgun blast left a hole about four inches in diameter in the store screen door. Six pellets were lodged in the crown of Beauchamp's head.

Constable Bud Dawson of Cisco also assisted in the manhunt.

thrives in hot, humid weather. High moisture mold spores, which are present in the air, find a favorable environment for growth on things, furniture and protection against

mildew is its prevention. To remove dampness, the use of air conditioners, dehumidifiers, heat and chemicals is recommended. Air conditioners are good dehumidifiers because cool air contains less moisture than

warm air. You can also fight off dampness by heating the house for a short time. Then open the doors and windows to let the moist air out. An exhaust fan will help force it

To dry the air in closets and other small areas, keep a small electric light burning. The heat from the lamp will be enough to prevent mildew if the space is not too large. Or you can place a small electric heater in a large closet. Use with extreme care and be sure that the heater is a sufficient distance from anything that will burn.

A much safer way to keep a closet dry is with silica gel or activated alumina. These chemicals will absorb the moisture in the air. Hang them in a cloth bag from the closet rod, or put them on a shelf or floor. The chemicals can be used repeatedly. Simply dry them in a vented oven at 300 degrees F. for several hours.







Then to the pyramids. Real-ly, the people are more in-teresting than the sights. They are mostly dirty with long dirty robes and wrappings around their heads, either leading a camel to be ridden by the tourist or holding a handful of silver bracelets and trinkets to sell.  
Then the citadel or mosque way on top of a hill overlooking the city, built several cen-turies ago. It is much like the Spanish mission as it was a small city with fort for pro-tection and very large place of worship. The walls and huge pillars are of Egyptian alabaster floors, competely covered with red oriental rugs. Canvas shoes were tied over our shoes before we en-tered. It is very sacred to them. Cairo has four million people, large buildings, though I think the Nile-Hilton Hotel is perhaps the tallest. We lunched and dined here.

One side of the hotel faces the river, the other side faces the very large city plaza and the city itself. The pyramids are only about five to six miles from the heart of Cairo. Cairo is not a beautiful city so little rain and so much desert to blow sand over everything. They make an at-tempt at beauty with flowers and trees along and between the city streets, but even the leaves were dusty. It made me think of some seasons in West Texas.  
As we drove from Port Said into Cairo, I had many thoughts and memories of Bible Times. The country is desert. Even surrounding Cairo is the great Sahara Desert, everywhere except that land that is irrigated.  
The road is paved, poorly and narrow. But long ago, Moses must have fol-lowed or crossed that road as he lead the children of Israel from their slavery. Joseph brought Mary and the Baby Jesus over this desert and Jacob's sons made the trip so many times to get food when their brother Joseph was there. It is an old, old coun-try and Cairo is an old, old city. No wonder they look old.

# Is Eastland's Shasta In the National Race?

Ask anybody: "What's the national flower?"  
The correct answer is: "There isn't one."  
Then, should there be? and if so, could Eastland help pick it? (The women of the Garden Club might have some pertinent thoughts on the mat-ter.)

Picking a national flower is not as easy as it may seem for there are many things to consider. For example for a flower to be seriously consid-ered, it would seem that it must have commercial value. Otherwise, no one would both-er to rally behind it, and gen-erally no Congressman would take up its cause. "Rose raisers are voters, but dan-delion growers are just people without a green thumb."

But there is one notable ex-ception. In 1959, a fourth-grade class in San Francisco, was studying Luther Burbank and the 3,000 plant flower va-rieties he created. The teach-

er, Mrs. Louise Lytken, ex-plaind how the naturalist crossed three different daisies and came up with a Shasta daisy, a hardy breed with slight commercial use.

"Is there a national flow-er?" one youngster asked. "No," Mrs. Lytken replied. "How about the Shasta daisy?" he asked. And the Shasta daisy campaign was born.

Some may ask "Well what is the Shasta daisy?" It's a small daisy with slim, white petals ringing a gold center; it is easy to grow and can be raised safe from insect pests and plant diseases, and it needs little care and is a perennial, meaning it doesn't have to be replanted year after year.

If that sounds familiar to you, then you probably re-member seeing them planted all around the Eastland Post Office. They have decorated the Post Office lawn almost

all year round, including dur-ing the Christmas season.  
The Post Office has given away thousands of these plants to flower lovers, Post-master Marene Johnson re-ports.  
Does the Shasta Daisy, or some other flower, get your vote?
