## Statement Of Policy Is Issued By County

Eastland County Commissioners Court met in regular session Monday and issued a statement of policy regarding the use of County - owned equipment, asked by a group of county citizens who alleged that such equipment was being used on private properties and for private jobs.  
The following statement was passed by Commissioners Court:  
"After lengthy discussion and hearing testimony from interested parties as well as consultation with Eastland County Attorney, the Court herewith expresses its statement of policy concerning the use of County owned property and County employed personnel to-wit: That said property and its use be confined to the stated statutory public purposes and further that all county officials be furnished with a copy of this statement of policy, passed unanimously this the 14th day of March, 1966."

Also hospitalized were Tommy Carr, L. E. Singleton and Joe Ben Koonce.

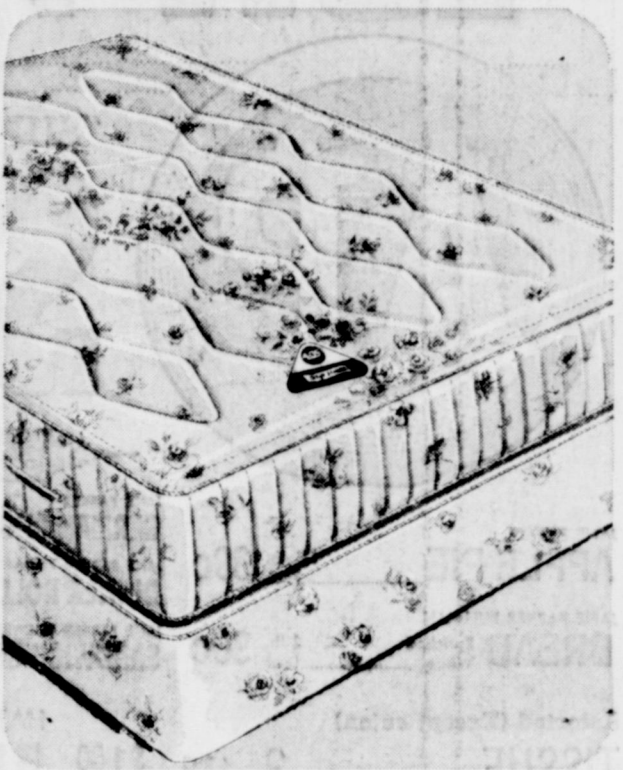
Volunteer firemen from Gorman extinguished the blaze after the blast occurred about 6:30 p.m. on the L. E. Singleton farm near Desdemona.

## Mrs. Horton Writes of World Tour

(By Mrs. Jim (Lillian) Horton)

Mrs. Jim Horton has reported once again of her wonderful - educational and interesting experiences while abroad. She and a granddaughter are on a round - the - world cruise. Her last letter, written on Feb. 13 in Calcutta, read as follows:

Well, we have crossed India in five airplane hops - Karachi to Bombay, north to Delhi, south to Agra, east to Banarases, and today, on the Calcutta.

We have seen mobs of people and each of us in our group has tried to size up the situation of India. Religion is the basis of all their living. They are a good people - walking through narrow dirty streets cars can't get through - we had no fear.

There is very little crime and the faces of most of them show contentment, or maybe resignation. They are mostly dirty. Their tiny shops are old, run down and dirty. There is no problem of obesity here yet we have been impressed that they look well. Sure there are beggars, but we have beggars in the USA.

But, it does something to one to see old men sitting with a stare into space, apparently in prayer, naked men covered with ashes, idols, clanging bells, old dirty temples, yet always people praying. This morning, we visited in Banarases where bodies are cremated and ashes dumped into the Ganges River. We took a boat ride down the crescent of the river. Steps lead to the waters edge in dozens of places. It was early morning and both men and women get into the water and bathe, then drink, then dip a small brass container full for sacred use at home.

The Ganges is wide and deep and the water is about the only clean thing around. Their buildings are old. Some of them have been large and beautiful at one time. There are many boats, all of them are oared by natives. In fact, there are not many tourists. The Taj Mahal at Agra is everything that has been said of it - a beautiful jewel of a building. It is unbelievable that courts, harems and forts were such a part of life 300 years ago. Such beauty and grandeur and the magnitude and size is appalling.

Our hotels are beautiful and most comfortable. As one of our group says, we are insulated. Traffic, you never saw the

like. We've seen over a million bicycles and bicycle rickshaws, cows roaming in the middle, and then the cars. We've watched their speed which is mostly 20 to 30 miles per hour. English driving on the wrong side of the street, but such courtesy we don't have in America. They say there are very few accidents.

Looking at the country side from the plane, there is much land under cultivation. There is much ground in small plots with partitions or walls of mud and we learned that this ground is for rice which will be planted during monsoon season. These rains come July, August and September and there can be only one crop of rice.

The airplanes are good, some jets. Today we came in one made by Kaisey in California. I don't know the name of it.

We are all tired and have spent the afternoon in our rooms. Tomorrow we will see Calcutta which they say is mostly industrial with seven and one half million people. Looking out our window, I believe it.

Another letter from Mrs. James (Lillian) Horton has been received by the Eastland Telegram. Mrs. Horton will arrive in San Francisco, Calif. on March 21. The letter reads as follows:

I think my last letter was from Bangkok. We did enjoy those beautiful Buddha Temples there. The temperature was in the 90s and very humid.

Sunday, we flew here to Hong Kong. It was a beautiful flight in a Thailand jet - right over South Viet Nam. We could look down and see the air strip. It was very close to the China Sea. We were so high though, there was no action or even housing to be seen.

Coming into the Hong Kong strip is a strange experience. Land for this strip has been made out into the sea, so that you think the plane is coming right down into water.

Have had two bus tours of the city and surroundings. I thought I'd know something of the city since we had studied about it in our Woman's Society, but it is beyond description. We are in the Hilton Hotel on Victoria Island which in reality is Hong Kong.

Ferries cross the Mainland every few minutes. This is known as Kowloon. Most of the shops are here in Kowloon as well as the famous Peninsula Hotel. Donna and I walked over this morning. Just a good walk and ferry fare is about four cents American money.

One of our tours was into what is called New Territory. Here are many factories of all kinds and oil refineries; also, beautiful gardens. We were very close and looked over the river into Red China. A high steel fence runs along the bank of the river. Fifty Chinese are allowed through the gates each day. They must pass certain requirements.

### Note Describes Tour

Mrs. Marene Johnson received an interesting card from Mrs. James Horton, who is touring Tokyo, Japan and she would like to share it with you.

"We are being escorted this whole week by a young Japanese, who graduated from Sherman College and also worked for my son, Horace, in Longview, Texas.

Tokyo is a real sight, so large but not hard to get around in.

I hope to be back in Eastland before long."

Mrs. Horton is also accompanied by her granddaughter, Donna.

The housing program is stupendous - mile after mile of well constructed buildings house one family to each room. Clothes hang from balconies and children and babies are more than numerous. Little boys and girls tend the small ones by carrying them on their little backs. But I must say, they do not look unhappy.

We went to the area where the Sampans or river boats are a solid mass across the water way. Here, people live and die in the small space of a boat. They told us the government has tried the housing program for them but they prefer their Sampans. And here again, they do not look unhappy.

Almost everyone has picked up a "bug" and Donna and I were among them. Donna had chills and fever twice so, of course, the doctor. He scared us good as he thought she had appendicitis and took a blood count; however, all was well and we are both fine again.
