## Large Crowd Expected for Flag Day Ceremonies Here

### T&P Official Explains Removal Of Two Trains

Diversion of mail from train to trucks by the Post Office Department and declining passenger usage has made the operation of the last two remaining passenger trains through Eastland County a losing proposition which will cost the Texas & Pacific Railroad some \$300,000 this year, a rail official told county men in Eastland Monday.

The railroad will make application soon to the Texas Railway Railroad Commission to discontinue Trains 27 and 26 (Fort Worth - El Paso), E. Earl Spencer, passenger traffic manager for Missouri Pacific Railroad Co. and the Texas and Pacific Railway Co. (Mo-Pac owns T&P).

First diversion of mail from trains 26-27 was in Dec. 1964 when the Monahans-El Paso Railway Post Office car was discontinued. Then in March, 1965, the Fort Worth-El Paso Local Mail was put on trucks and in February this year, the Fort Worth - Monahans RPO car was discontinued. Spencer said, resulting in a total of \$31,728 loss in revenue to the railroad. The actual loss sustained in 1965 was \$125,000, he said.

Present at the informal discussion in the county commissioners court room were County Judge Scott Bailey, Eastland Mayor Frank Deaton and Cisco Mayor W. W. Sawyer.

When Mr. Sawyer mentioned declining passenger usage of the trains in question, Mayor Deaton was quick to ask if in fact the railroad fail to maintain passenger accommodations satisfactory to encourage usage.

"The trains are cold in the winter and hot in the summer," Mr. Deaton said, adding that the people in Odessa complained "loud and long" when earlier service was taken off there.

Mr. Spencer explained that everything possible is done to make the cars comfortable. The railroad official is talking (Continued on page 6)

Born March 28, 1898 in Stephens County, he was a member of the Primitive Baptist Church. He was a retired farmer, having lived on farms in Bedias community and in Eastland at 303 E. Plummer for about a year. He married Albertina Swinson March 15, 1964 in Eastland.

## 2,238 Countians Vote in Runoff; Majority for Musgrove, Crawford

Eastland County voters numbered 2,238 at Saturday's runoff election polls. Out of that number, 1,142 were cast for Burke Musgrove of Breckenridge, winner of the Democratic nomination for state representative from District 63. His opponent, John Musselman of Albany, received 1,096 of Eastland County's vote.

In the Attorney General Democratic nomination race, Eastland County gave a majority support to winner Crawford Martin with 1,679 votes. His opponent, Franklin Spears, tallied 548 in this county.

Out of 12 precincts in the county, Musgrove carried all but two, Cisco and Rising Star. All precincts gave a majority vote for Crawford.

Three out of the five counties in the 63rd District supported Musgrove, while Callahan and Shackelford went for Musselman. In Eastland County's absentee vote, Musgrove also led.

The 2,238 countians voting was little more than half of the 4,472 who voted in the May 7, Primary. Eligible voters in this county total approximately 6,000.

The Breckenridge American quoted Musgrove as saying after his win, "I accept this vote of the people with humility, and I pledge to do my very best to serve this district in the House of Representatives in a way which will prove that the voters of this district have made the correct decision."

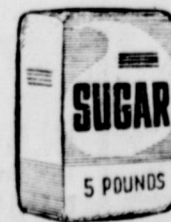

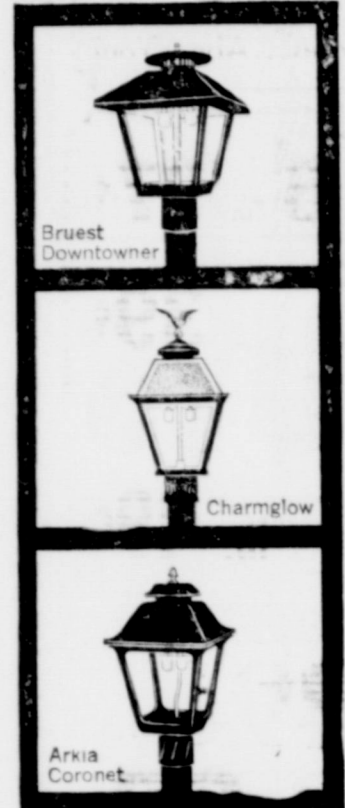

### Browsing with Bev...

Are you planning to sew with the sheer fabrics, such as voiles and dotted swiss? They are popular this season, but their transparency calls for special treatment of the seams.

There are three different ways to make seams in sheer fabrics. The first method is to stitch a plain 5/8 inch seam with the right sides of the fabric together. Make another row of stitching within the seam allowance, 1/8 inch from the first seam. Then trim the seam close to the second stitching line.

Another method is to make a French seam by placing the wrong sides of the fabric together. Stitch a plain 3/4-inch seam, and trim the seam allowance to 1/8 inch. Then turn the garment with the right sides together and press the garment flat along the seam line. Baste and stitch along the regular 3/4-inch seam line so that the finished seam will be 1/2-inch wide.

A third method of seaming sheer fabrics is a mock French seam. Stitch the right sides of the fabric together along the 3/4-inch seam line. Next turn the raw edges in 1/4-inch toward the seamline and sew together by hand or machine to make a 3/8-inch seam.

Best results are usually obtained by using the French seam on straight seams and the mock French seam on curved seams where fitting is necessary.

When you are choosing a pattern for a sheer fabric, check to see that sheers are recommended. The garment will look better if few seams are in

(Continued from Page 1.) ing with people in towns all along the route, prior to filing the formal application with the RCC for removal of the trains. Public hearings will probably be set in Fort Worth, Big Spring and El Paso by the commission.

Spencer left volumes of data with the local people about mail losses, passenger service decline, etc.

City officials from Cisco, Ranger, Eastland and Strawn had been invited to the Monday meeting in Eastland, and the following data was given by the railroad about passenger service in these towns, as follows:

**CISCO**  
Although Cisco is not a scheduled stop for train 27, special stops were made about once a month for a passenger who went to Big Spring or some point west thereof, and one who came from Fort Worth.

In the opposite direction, an average of one passenger every 4 1/2 days boarded train 26 at Cisco, occasionally to Eastland and Ranger, but principally to Fort Worth or some point east. One passenger every 3 1/2 days got off train 26 at Cisco — one every 6 days from Big Spring or some point west thereof — one every 50 days from Sweetwater and Baird, and one every two weeks from Abilene.

**EASTLAND**  
At Eastland — also not a stop for train 27 — a special stop was made once every 25 days for the convenience of a passenger who went to Big Spring or beyond — and one every 33 days who came from Fort Worth or some point east.

One passenger every 3 days boarded train 26 — one every 50 days went to Ranger and one every 3 1/2 days to Fort Worth or beyond. One passenger every 4 days detrained from train 26 at Eastland, principally from Big Spring or some point west thereof — one every 100 days from Colorado City, Sweetwater, Abilene and Baird, and one every 50 days from Cisco.

**RANGER**  
Ranger also is not a stop for train 27; however, a special stop was made on an average of once every 100 days for a passenger going to Big Spring or beyond, and once every 25 days for a passenger from Fort Worth or some point east who was destined Ranger.

One passenger every 3 1/2 days boarded train 26 at Ranger for Fort Worth or east of Fort Worth. One passenger every 5 1/4 days got off train 26 at Ranger — one every 11 days from Big Spring or some point west — one every 100 days from Sweetwater — and one every 50 days from Abilene, Cisco and Eastland.

## County's School Aid Program May Expand

Two additional counties are expected to be added for the 1966-67 school year, bringing to five the number of counties served by the Eastland County School Superintendent's office in the administration of the various federal aid to education programs now in progress.

This fact was reported by Coordinator Bruce Golemon of Cisco in a talk before the Eastland Lions Club Tuesday afternoon.

The three counties presently served include Eastland, Palo Pinto and Shackelford. Through August of this year, Golemon said that federal education monies will amount to \$240,000 in Eastland county exclusive of that being used in the two junior colleges.

The eight schools in the county joined, he said, in a common unit and are participating in several programs, including the NCY (Neighborhood Youth Corps); Titles One and Two of Public Law 89.0;

and Cisco will have a Head Start program.

Title One has amounted to some \$124,000 at \$194 per eligible student. (Eastland gained about \$20,000 extra for this program), and Title Two provides books, library materials, and audio visual materials.

The schools have averaged 155 students employed on the NYC program with each earning \$1.25 an hour for ten hours a week.

The county will probably go into Title Three of the law next year, he said.

Tip Arther, an associate in the county school office, was program chairman and introduced the guest speaker.

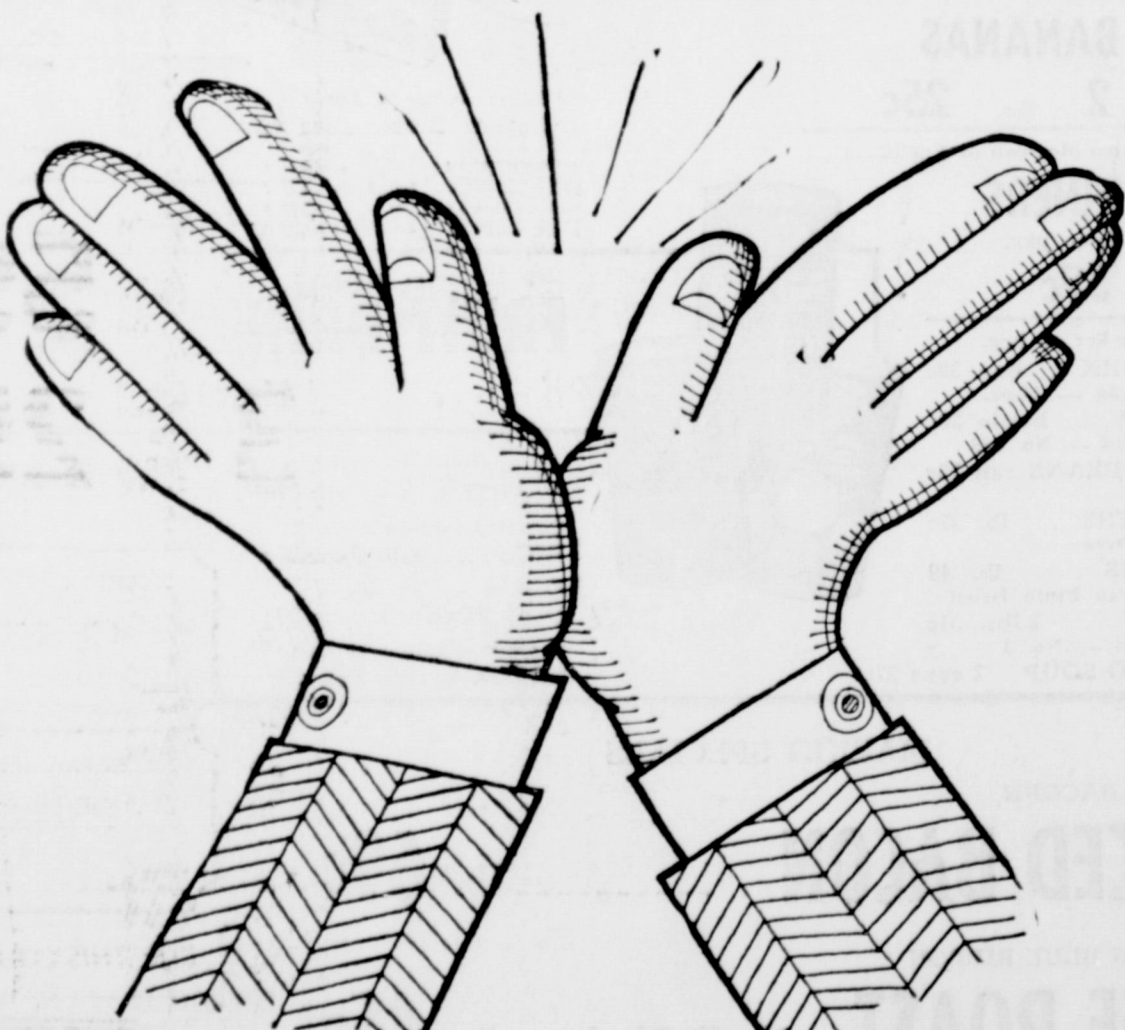

# GAME, FISHING REGULATIONS TO BE DISCUSSED AT COUNTY MEET

Next Thursday at 8 p.m. in the Eastland County courthouse, personnel of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will hold a public hearing to discuss hunting and fishing regulations for next fall in Eastland County, according to an announcement from J. Weldon Watson, executive director of the department.

Eastland County is one of 184 counties placed by law under the department for direct wildlife harvest arrangements. The department has regulatory responsibility for setting seasons, bag limits and means and methods for taking game

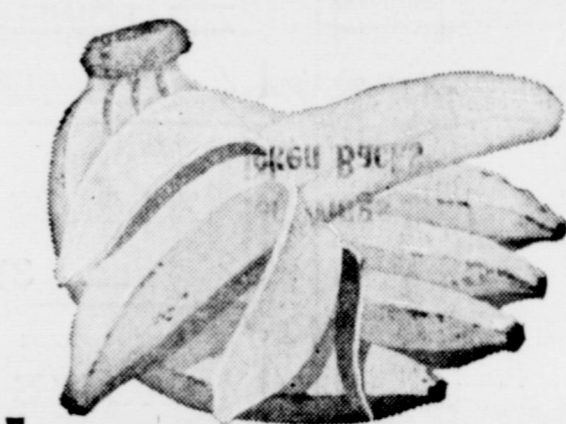
