Justice of Peace Wells Dalton ruled death was due to poisoning.

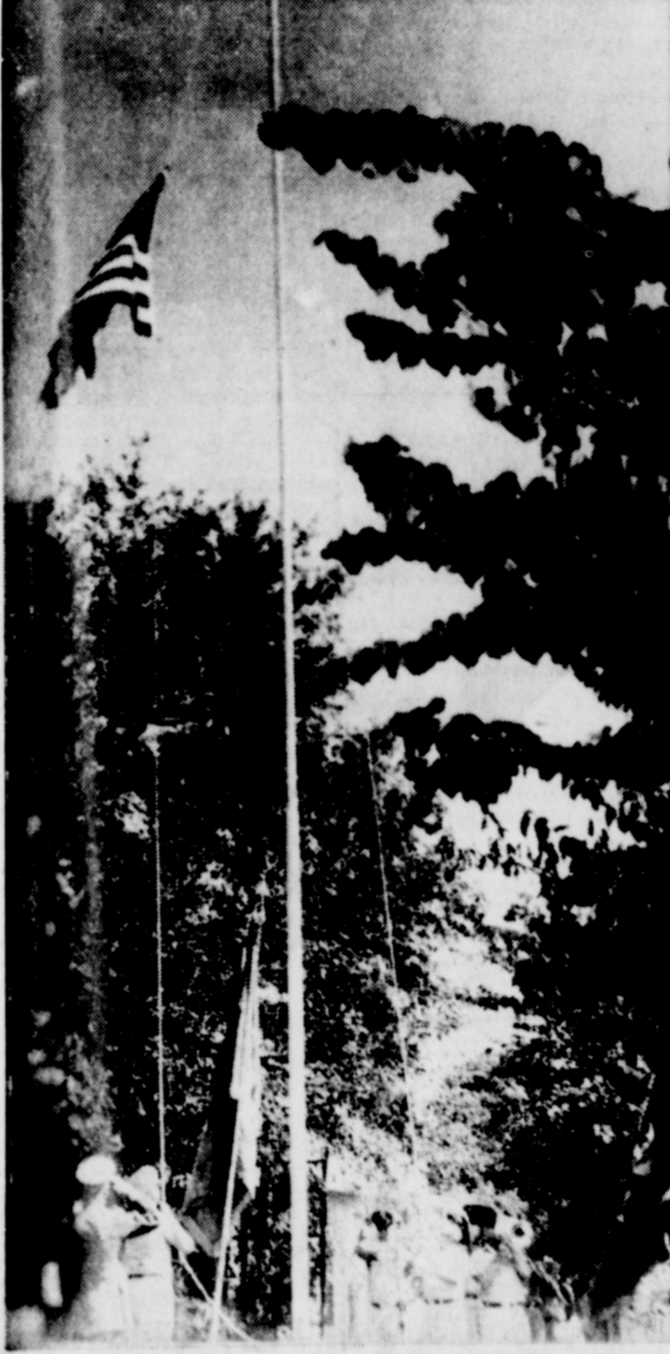

Patriotism Unfurls With Valley Forge Flag Tuesday

"Militant for Peace" was the attitude as Eastlanders, area neighbors and dignitaries celebrated Flag Day in Eastland Tuesday.

Threat of 'isms' Topic For General's Talk Here

Calling "knowledge the best tool to fight the many 'isms' that exist today," Gen. Guy S. Meloy Jr. outlined the history, goals and significance of the Freedoms Foundation of Valley Forge, during his Flag Day speech in Eastland Tuesday.

"The prevalent idea today that the threat of communism is dissipating is pure poppycock," the general said.

"It's what I like to call the 'communist tranquilizer,'" he said.

Formed in 1949 the Freedoms Foundation's goal to awaken people to the knowledge that pure patriotism must begin at the grass roots, and that we must all be on guard against foreign enemies, in the form of the isms' Gen. Meloy said.

Here are pertinent excerpts from the general's Eastland talk:

THE WORLD COMMUNITY IN WHICH WE LIVE
Wave a magic wand and compress 3 billion world into a small town of 1,000 people—a one-town world.

In this imaginary town — the world reduced in exact proportion to a community of 1,000 — there would be 60 Americans. The remainder of the world would be represented by 940 persons.

The 60 Americans would receive half the income of the entire town, with the other 940 dividing up the other half, dividing up the other half.

About 330 in the town would be classified as Christians, and 670 would not be so classified. Fewer than 100 would be Protestants and some 230 would be Roman Catholics.

At least 80 townspeople would be practicing Communists and 370 others would be under Communist domination.

White people would total 303, with 697 nonwhite. The 60 Americans would have an average life expectancy of 70 years; the other 940, less than 40 years average.

The 60 Americans would have 15 times as many possessions per person as all the rest of the people. The Americans would produce 16 percent of the town's total food supply. Although they'd eat 72 percent above the maximum food requirements, they would either eat most of what they grew, or store it for their own further use, at enormous cost.

Inasmuch as most of the 940 non-Americans in the town would be hungry, the disparity in the food supply might understandably lead to some ill feeling among the townspeople.

The Americans also would enjoy a disproportionate share of electric power, coal, fuel, steel and general equipment. The lowest income group among the 60 Americans would be much better off than the average of the rest of the town.

Half of the 1,000 people would never have heard of Jesus Christ and what he taught. On the other hand, more than half would be hearing about Karl Marx, Lenin, Stalin, and Khrushchev.

THE GROWTH OF COMMUNISM
100 years ago communism was a mere scratch on the face of international affairs.

At that time, Karl Marx was in a dingy London apartment,

busy mixing the ideological acids of his evil philosophy. In 1903, Lenin had 17 followers. In 1917, this beady-eyed Russian seized power over 40,000 party members and 150 million Russians.

Today, the Communists have conquered one billion people — 1-3 of the world's population and of the land area.

Communists have conquered more people in two generations than Christians did in 2,000 years. Communism has grown faster than any movement in the entire history of mankind.

Free men have been lost at the rate of 6,000 per hour, or 144,000 per day, or 52 million each year for the past 15 years.

In world today, five children are in school studying Godless Communism for every one in school who is learning about Jesus Christ.

Mr. Biles owned and operated the Biles Gas Pump Service Southeast of town.

The deceased was married to Georgia O. Boen May 16, 1936, in Cisco.

Funeral services were held in the Arrington-Hammer Funeral Chapel. Interment was in Elm Cemetery. Officiating were the Rev. Bud May and the Rev. A. J. Thomas, pastor of Mangum Baptist Church.

Survivors include his wife; two daughters, Mrs. Delbert Justice of Eastland and Mrs. J. L. Farr of Abilene; his mother, Mrs. C. P. Biles of Carbon; a sister, Mrs. E. E. Donaldson of Carbon; and four grandchildren.

Telephone Company Declares War On Anonymous Nuisance Callers

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company declared all-out war on anonymous telephone callers.

"When the telephone becomes a source of annoyance or terror to even one customer, it is matter of serious concern to us," said Charles Wilson, manager for the company.

"We are assuming responsibility for combating this problem, and we will use every available, legitimate means to do so."

Wilson said telephone employees are being given special training in how to counsel and aid customers who receive annoying and harassing telephone calls. And in cases involving threats to property or bodily harm, the company's security experts will respond immediately to assist customers and law enforcement agencies.

"Although line identification is by no means the only way, or even the most effective way, of solving most annoyance call complaints, we now have available several techniques for identifying the telephone number from which offending calls are made," Wilson said.

"Experience gained in a number of cities has proved most valuable," he added. "We are confident of our ability to assist customers in coping with this problem."

"Our experience has shown us that certain types of annoying and harassing calls generally follow very definite patterns."

The problem of annoyance calls is not great in terms of total numbers, but statistics mean little to the victim. He may have been through one of the most harrowing experiences in his life.

To help discourage annoyance calling, Wilson suggests the following steps:

1. Hang up if the caller doesn't say anything, or at the first obscene word. Also, hang up if the caller doesn't identify himself to your satisfaction. Don't keep talking. This only encourages him to persist.

2. Call the telephone business office if annoyance calls persist, or if you receive a threatening call. The company will cooperate fully in dealing with the problem.

Wilson added that when a number of calls are received, it will be helpful to the company if the victim keeps a log of the dates and times of the calls. He said, too, that the victim should try to listen for unusual voice inflections, background noises or other clues which might help an investigator.

Mighty Wind, Heavy Rain Blast Eastland County Early Monday

Sunday evening and Monday morning, wind and rain blasted Eastland County as they did other portions of North Central Texas.

Early Monday, a mighty wind shoved the Cisco Thompson Pipe Line Co. toolhouse approximately 100 yards west of its location on west Highway 80. The metal building halted at the Truck Harbor cafe. Winds, which were gauged 40 m.p.h. at Eastland,

also felled several trees or broke limbs in the vicinity. The west part of Cisco was without electricity for approximately two hours after lightning struck a transformer about 5:30 a.m. Monday.

Rain measured 3.30 inches at Cisco and Eastland recorded 3.70; Ranger, 3.00; Moran 1.00; Putnam, .60; Nimrod, .50; Scranton, 1.00; De Leon, 1.80.

Area lakes and stock tanks were in excellent condition. Lake Leon was approaching spillway level, and Lake Cisco had approximately 12 inches of new water.

The Abilene Weather Bureau forecast clear to partly cloudy skies through Wednesday in a 40-mile radius of Abilene. Expected low temperature for tonight is 70. A high of 90 was predicted for Wednesday.

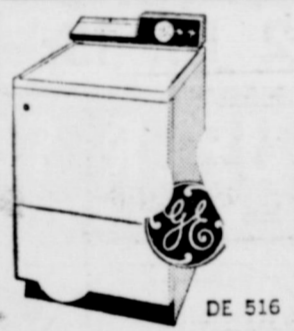

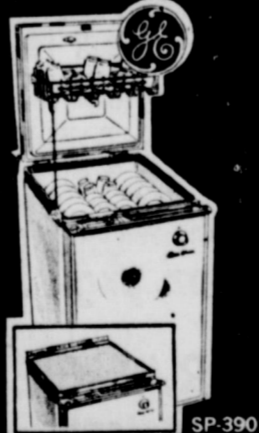

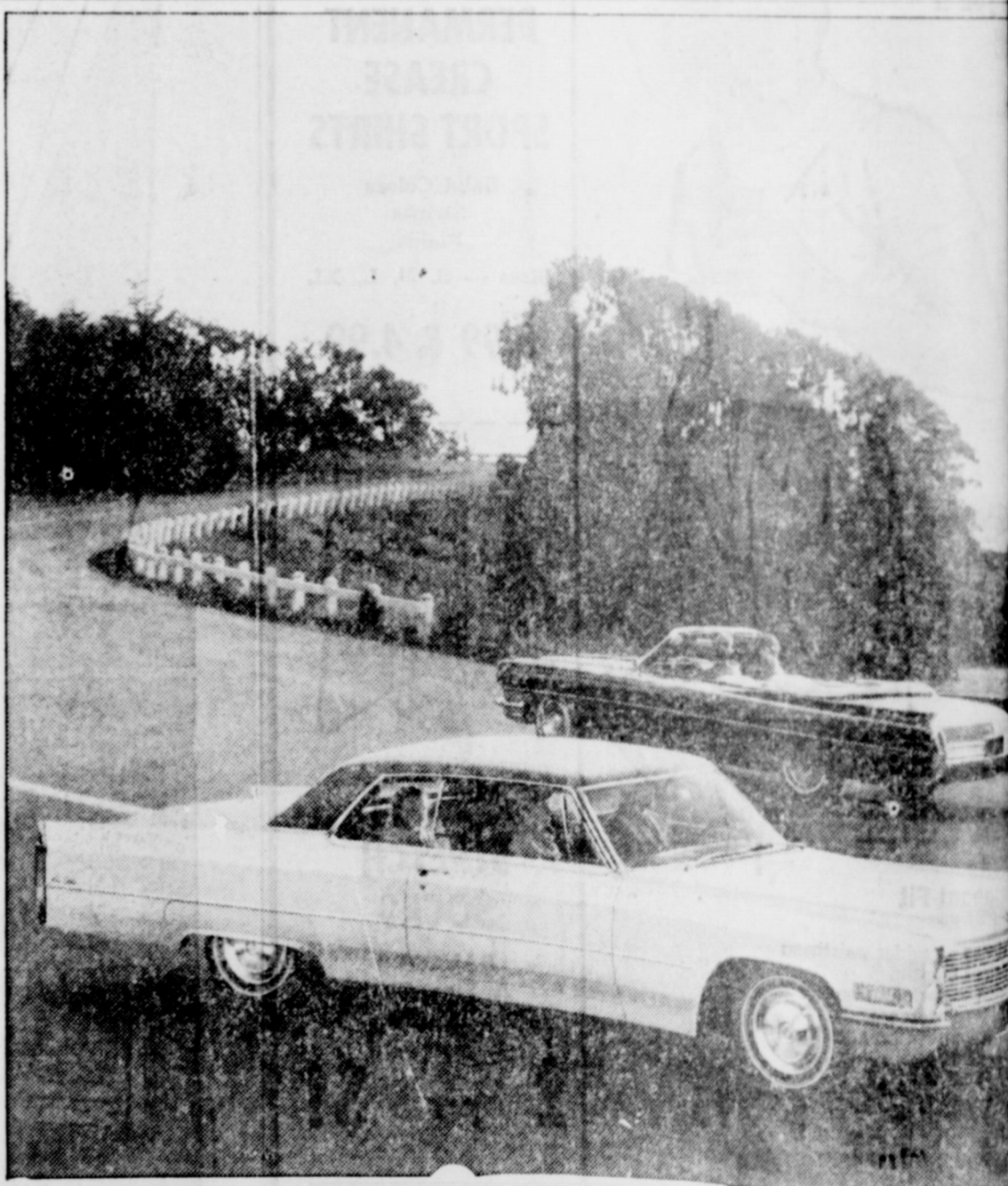

Tucker, executive director of Texas Alcohol Narcotics Education, Inc., Dallas, will speak at the Olden Methodist Church, beginning at 9 a.m., Sunday, June 19; also, he will speak at Eastland's First Methodist Church at 10:50 a.m. Sunday, June 19, according to Rev. J. Lester Davenport, pastor of both churches.

After serving pastorates in New Mexico and West Texas for 21 years, Rev. Tucker became the first president, and later executive secretary, of the New Mexico Temperance League. In 1952 he was elected the executive head of T.A.N.E.

The speaker holds certificates of special training from the University of Denver, Yale University, and the Institute of Scientific Studies for the Prevention of Alcoholism at Loma Linda, Calif. In 1961 Rev. Tucker studied the alcohol problem in Europe and was a delegate to the World Christian Temperance Foundation which met in Oslo, Norway. Among other places of responsibility, Rev. Tucker is a member of the Executive Committee and Board of Directors of the American Council on Alcohol Problems, which has headquarters in Washington, D. C.

Some phases of T.A.N.E.'s program include: A modern printing division; a Legislative Information Service; Local Option counsel, guidance and materials; annual Seminars and Workshops; as well as scientific, positive visual aids and programs for churches, schools and colleges.

Under Rev. Tucker's leadership, T.A.N.E. has come to be known as one of the best organized temperance state programs in the nation. Parts of its program and many of its materials are used by several groups in other states and some foreign countries.

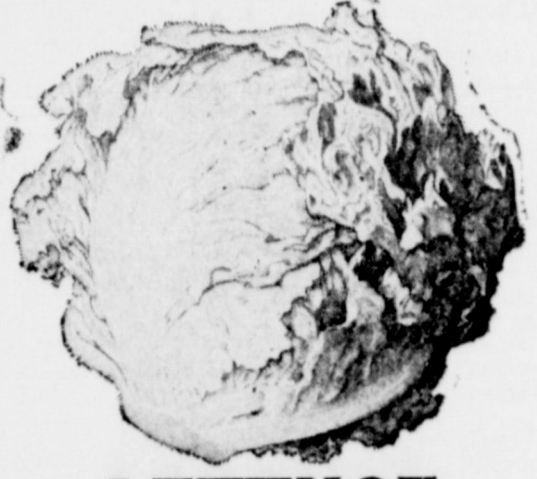

The Fort Griffin Fandangle is a gentle satire of life at the famous western fort of Fort Griffin, Tex., and the lively and lusty town of Griffin which sprung up nearby. The fort was situated on a hilltop for protection from bands of marauding Indians. The town nestled between the bottom of the hill and the Clear Fork of the Brazos River and during the 70's and 80's was the scene of the wildest westerns. Doc Holliday lived in Griffin before he went to Tombstone. Big Nose Kate spent a night in jail for trying to burn down a hotel. Lottie Deno, the gracious lady of the gambling table, saw her lover shot to death there. Wyatt Earp, who came to visit Doc Holliday, stayed only a few days remarking that "Griffin is too wild for me."

The Fandangle portrays the soldiers and offers glimpses of the wilder side of life, but it also shows the other side — the buffalo hunters who spent weeks hunting and skinning; the lonely cowboy who drove his herd up the Western Trail to Abilene, Kan.; the mother who feared Indians, disease, loneliness; the young man "gone to Texas"; the children; the old folks; the Indians in their kingdom and in their realization that all was lost. The spectator is transported into yesteryear. He is there with history as it happened.

The Fandangle has been performed in Albany since 1938. Until 1965 it was staged on the high school football field. Robert Nail, Albany playwright, is the author and director. Alice Reynolds is music director. She also designed most of the sets and may of the costumes. Miss Reynolds and Nail are responsible for much of the music

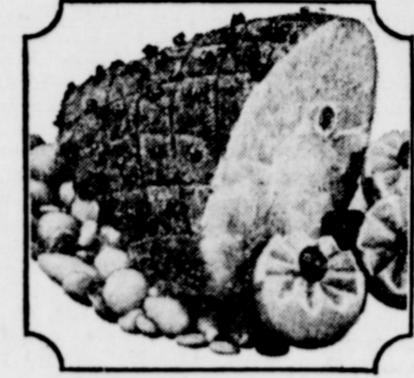

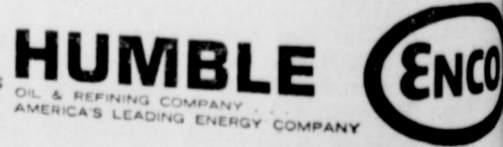

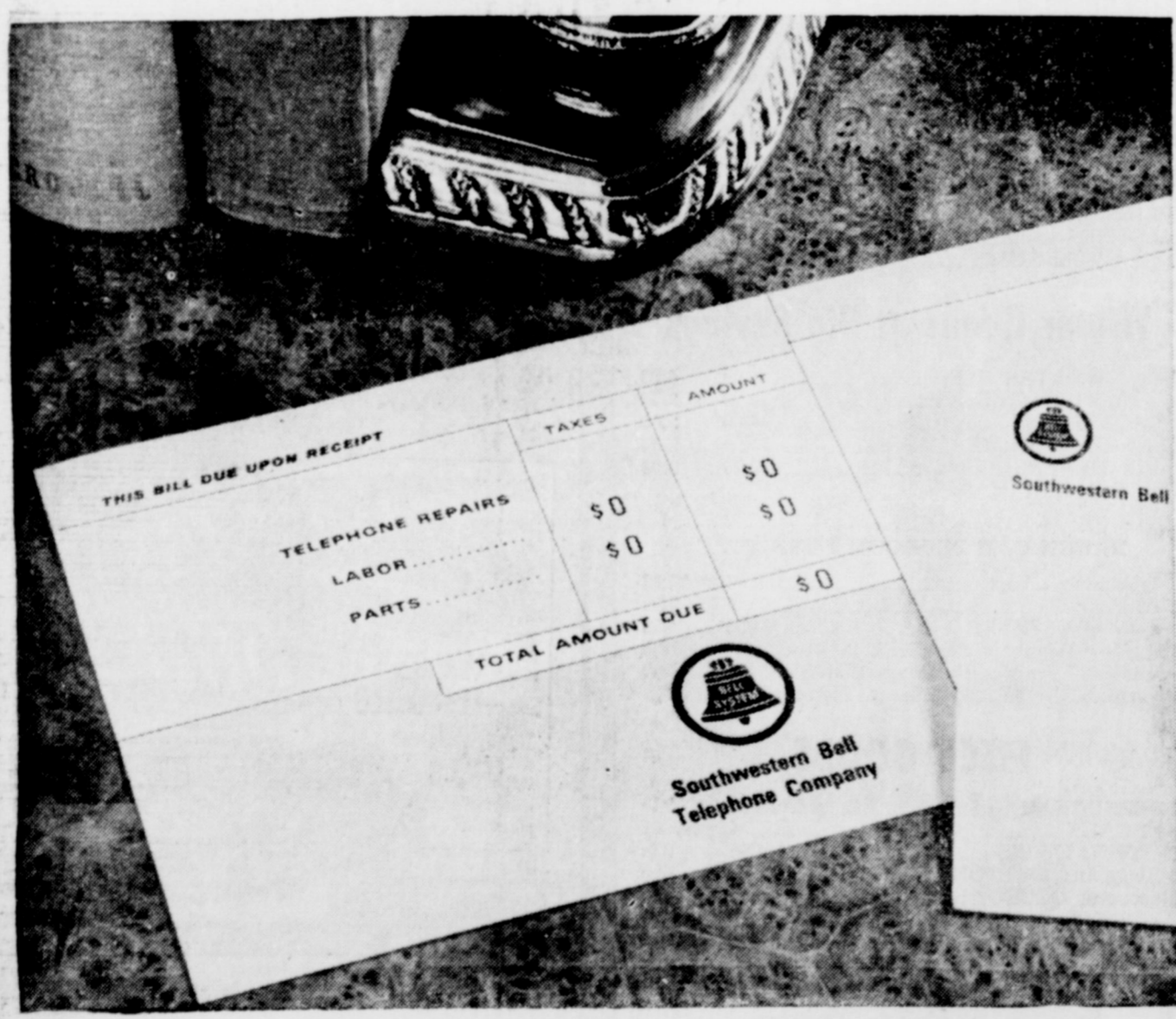
