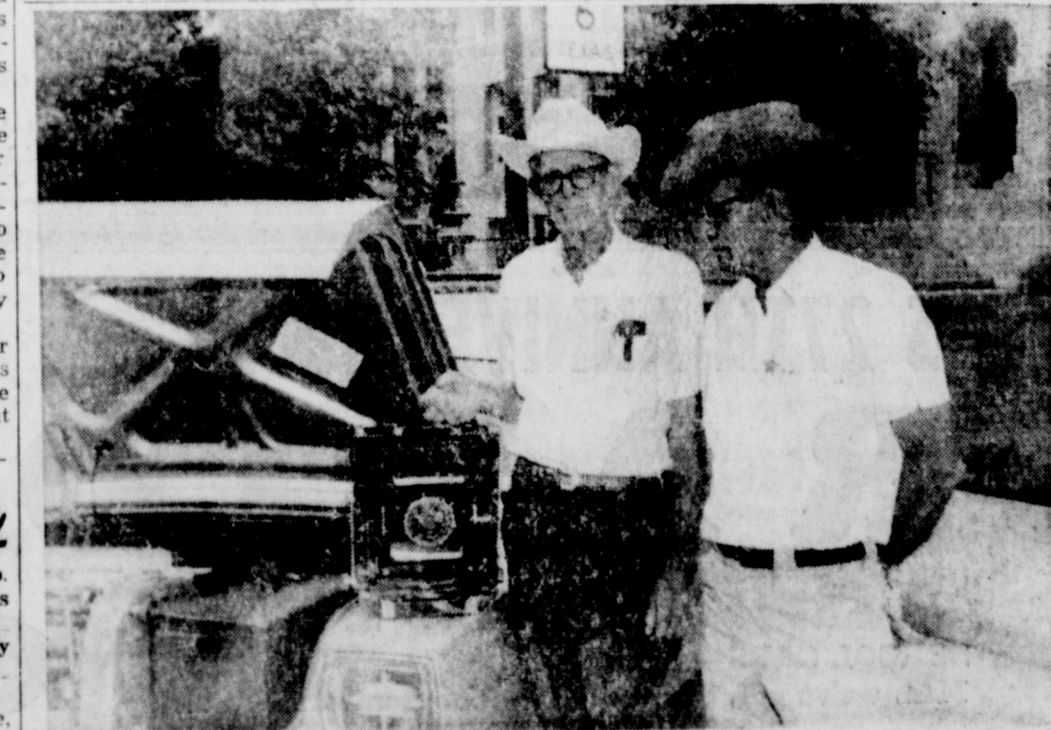

## Sheriff's Dept. Credited in Investigating Bogus \$20s

Between \$20,000 and \$30,000 of counterfeit \$20 bills were printed in Eastland County last weekend, a U.S. Treasury Department agent reports, and the County Sheriff's Department is credited by the Department with conducting investigations resulting in identifications and later arrests. "When it's all put together, we've got a pretty good case," the agent said in Eastland Friday. The counterfeiting project began when two Illinois men clicked into the Quarles Lodge at Lake Leon last Thursday. The printing operation was believed to have been under way over the weekend, and the pair checked out of the motel Tuesday, leaving a great deal of their equipment, and paying their tab with what turned out to be one of their products — a "not-too-poorly printed \$20 bill." The Quarles contacted Sheriff L. E. Sublett and his department immediately began the investigation, turning up unused offset plates, partially burned bill-printed sheets of 50-pound bond paper, and other assorted paraphernalia, associated with offset printing. Officers were guessing at weeks end that the pair may have "moved out" hurriedly after having seen official autos cruise the lake area Monday. ## County Economy Boosted By New Cisco Leather Plant

The economy of Eastland County took a brighter outlook Friday with the announcement that Kirkpatrick Leather Goods, Inc., was opening a manufacturing plant in Cisco that might eventually employ up to 200 persons. The new factory was announced by Joe Kirkpatrick of Gainesville, a leather goods manufacturer with nationwide sales since 1950. The company has purchased the 50x100 two-story brick building at 418 Avenue D in Cisco from the estate of the late J. H. Reynolds as well as vacant land back of the building to allow for expansion.

Mr. Kirkpatrick reported that the firm would begin work on the building early this week and that machinery and materials would be moving in by July 1. Initially, the plant will employ 10 men and others will be added as they can be trained. The factory will turn out a line of leather products, including hand bags, watch bands, wallets, belts, crafts for use in schools, and other items.

Mr. Kirkpatrick reported that instead of selling through jobbers as they have been doing they would open a sales department to market their own products. A native of Bonham, Mr. Kirkpatrick is 44 years of age and plans to move his wife and 15-year old daughter to Cisco as soon as housing is available. He is a veteran of World War II. They are Baptists.

Vice president of the company is Paul Marion, a native of Gainesville, who expects to move his wife and two children to Cisco within a month. He is 26 years of age, is a veteran of military service, and the family attends the Baptist church. "Our move to Cisco was prompted by indications that economic conditions are more favorable for our type of manufacturing," Mr. Kirkpatrick told interviewers. We are pleased with the outlook in this area and are looking forward to becoming a part of the community." The building purchased by the Kirkpatrick Company had been occupied for the past two years by the Cisco Recreation Club, operated by O. C. Jeffcoat. The club is moving next door to the building formerly occupied by Curry's Grocery. Mr. Jeffcoat reported that they have purchased the building from the Dabney Estate of Eastland.

Do not permit your child to purchase fireworks through the mail or from illicit dealers. Fireworks from these sources are often inferior and even more dangerous than regular types. If your child has obtained fireworks, gunpowder or sparklers, confiscate these immediately and help him to understand they are dangerous and probably illegal.

Assist authorities in locating illegal fireworks. Check closely on the activities of your children during the holiday period, especially if they have shown an interest in matches, ammunition, powder or rockets. Do not buy or use fireworks yourself. Take your family to public display where they can enjoy fireworks in safety. The Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness, Inc., which helped pioneer the laws against fireworks, advocates

**WEST TEXAS COFC WILL HOLD  
OIL MEETING AT LONE CEDAR**

Some 30 top people in the oil and gas industry, plus authorities in petrochemicals, are expected to attend a "brain-storming" meeting of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce at Lone Cedar Country Club Monday according to Mrs. Beth Collins, club manager. Frank Sayre of Eastland is director of West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

John Ben Shepperd of Odessa, president of the West Texas Chamber, called the Lake Leon meeting as one of a series of nine idea and planning sessions being held in June to give the WTCC fresh insight into the vast area's growth potentials. The chamber will then incorporate the suggestions, ideas and plans from the meetings into its new program of work.

"Any West Texan knows how much the petroleum industry has meant to this area through the years," Shepperd said, "but an almost unlimited opportunity now lies before us when you consider the products made possible by applying chemistry to the petroleum resources we already have. The West Texas Chamber will be out front, helping promote development of petrochemical industry, encouraging the building of new plants, new products, new methods and the creation of a proper environment for expansion of this all-important industry. In our Lake Leon meeting, we are asking authorities in the petroleum and chemical fields to give us their ideas and suggestions so the West Texas Chamber can do an increasingly better job in these areas. We will use this knowledge to help build a better West Texas," Shepperd said.

Invited to participate in the Lake Leon session are the top people in the oil and gas industry, and authorities in petrochemicals. The list includes all company executives and specialists, independent oil operators, oil editors, attorneys, executives from the oil and gas associations, representatives from producers and royalty owners groups, pipeline authorities, chemical plant managers, refinery experts and others.

Participants at the meeting will discuss the problems of the petroleum and chemicals industry in the next session of the Legislature and how the WTCC can help solve these problems; problems of the industry in Congress and the chamber's role; how the WTCC can help in expansion of the petrochemical industry; how to get workers trained for these vital industries; pollution problems; the relationship between the petroleum industry and tourist development; and how to promote manufacturing in the petrochemical field.
