Absentee Voting For June 4 Election Light

Absentee voting in the June 4 Democratic Primary run-off election ends Tuesday, May 31, and judging from the vote so far turnout will be light.

A total of 4,472 persons voted in the May 7 Primary, but estimates are that less than half that many will vote on June 4, in this county.

Only two races appear the ballot — Attorney General: Crawford Martin of Hill County and Franklin Spears of Bexar County; and State Representative, 63rd district: John Musselman Jr. of Shackelford County and Burke Musgrove of Stephens County.

Eastlander Saul Pullman lead Eastland County in the representative's race in the primary with 1,947 votes but failed to make the runoff in the five county race. Musgrove polled 1,156 and Musselman 778 here May 7. Other counties in the district are Callahan, Stephens, Shackelford and Palo Pinto.

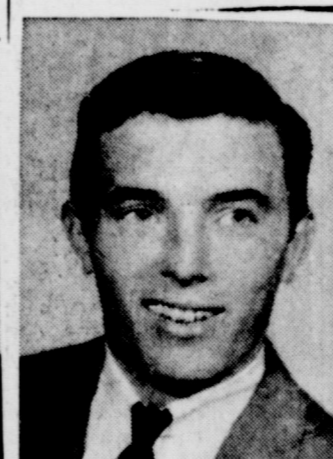

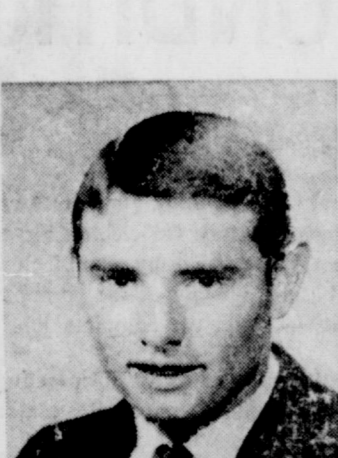

There are 46 quail eggs left to hatch in the incubator, along with 23 guinea eggs. The guinea eggs are expected to hatch beginning next Thursday, Mrs. Justice said.

After placed in the incubator, the quail eggs had to be turned twice a day and three days before they began to hatch, water was sprinkled on them twice a day to provide plenty of moisture.

The eggs were obtained from Johnnie Rogers, a vocational agriculture teacher in Carbon.

When they are old enough to be taken out of the incubator they will be placed in a chicken brooder, Mrs. Justice said.

An interesting point stressed by Mrs. Justice was the fact that as baby quails hatch, they relay messages to the unhatched that "the time is here."
