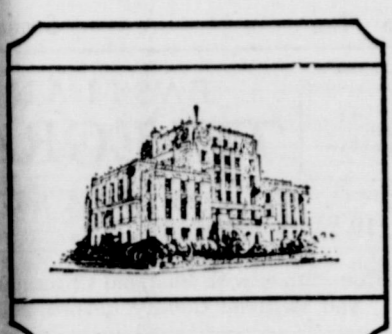

## Cisco Burglary Solved With Arsenal Discovery

A virtual arsenal of weapons in Mineral was solved a major burglary and a series in at least four county Sheriff L. E. reports.

Charges of burglary to have been filed in Eastland, Palo Alto and Coleman naming two former College male students.

Recovered includes a 30-30 Centennial, two shotguns, a rifle and pistol, four pistols, four knives with scabbards, flashlight, taken in a

break-in at Collins Hardware in Cisco on May 1, this year.

Still missing from the Collins burglary are one pistol, a flashlight, two knives and at least 15 boxes of shotgun shells, the sheriff said.

One of the men, about 20, is presently in the Palo Pinto jail, and the other is on active duty with the Marine Corps in California. Home-towns listed for the two are Leaders and Clifton.

Cooperative efforts on the part of sheriff's departments, city police departments and Texas Rangers resulted in the arrests, made in Mineral this week. The cache of arms was found in the basement of an apartment house there, where the two reportedly were staying.

The sheriff said that the jailed man's statement indicated that the Cisco burglary was the first of their crime spree.

**BACK-TO-SCHOOL SHOPPING**

Merchants in Eastland are anticipating that the annual "back-to-school" shopping will swing into full bloom Monday as preparations are being made for the fall season.

Total school population is expected to be up some, although census figures indicate otherwise. A total of 260 high schoolers pre-registered and 512 in grades one through eight are expected, for a total of 772 (the census total), but at the close of school last year, there were 819 students.

The first day of school — Sept. 1 — will be a "full day" contrary to what might be expected, because of ADA requirements it is reported. There will be a Labor Day (Sept. 5) holiday — just around the corner.

A larger freshman class, about 80, helps boost high school enrollment to 260. Generally classes begin with about 246 to 255, it was said.

Faculty positions are generally filled with the exception of a high school librarian and a fifth-grade teacher, with the resignation of Mrs. Bill Garner, who will move to Tulsa, due to the transfer of Mr. Garner, who is with the Soil Conservation Service.

## 1.10 Inch Rain Is Recorded

Slightly over an inch of rain fell in Eastland about midnight Wednesday with 1.10 inch recorded by Official Weather Observer M. W. Greiger on East Conner St.

Reports of more than an inch, and less than inch, were all given for areas south and north of town.

Showers continued Saturday amid thunderhead conditions. The rain was accompanied by a severe thunderstorm which was sparked by lightning. There were no reports of damage, but the electric power was off for a few seconds shortly after midnight.

Total rainfall for August last year was 1.33 and the average is some 3.83 inches, so heavy showers now would probably be the exception rather than the rule. Hopes might be bright for September — 4.06 inches fell during that month last year, while the average is 5.79 inches.

## Question Draws Mixed Feelings From Young People of This Area

"Yes, yes, she don't love me," the Beatles of England may have to sing in regard to some of their used-to-be fans after Beatle John Lennon's reported remark that the singing group is more popular than Jesus.

A survey of opinion among young people of Cisco, Eastland and Ranger showed that several were offended by the remark and renounced the Beatles via File 13 while others still cling to and defend their singing idols.

### IN CISCO

John said he likes their music and does not think less of them for Lennon's comment. Debbie said Lennon's remark should not reflect on the others. She likes them, "because they are different and have their own style."

### IN RANGER

Ellen Cozart, Ranger Junior College freshman, says the lads should be banned from entertaining in the United States.

"I used to like some of their songs, but after their statement about Jesus, I do not like them at all," she said.

"It's the way they sing that is important, not what they say," maintains Dave George, high school freshman, who has all the Beatle records.

### MINISTER'S VIEW

Pastor J. W. Keenan of the Redeemer Lutheran Church in Cisco is not alarmed by the statement and the "fleeting" Beatles.

"Throughout history, Jesus has overcome many groups of nuts," Pastor Keenan said. "The Beatles should not be banned, for when anything is banned, people will attempt to indulge in it for sheer curiosity."

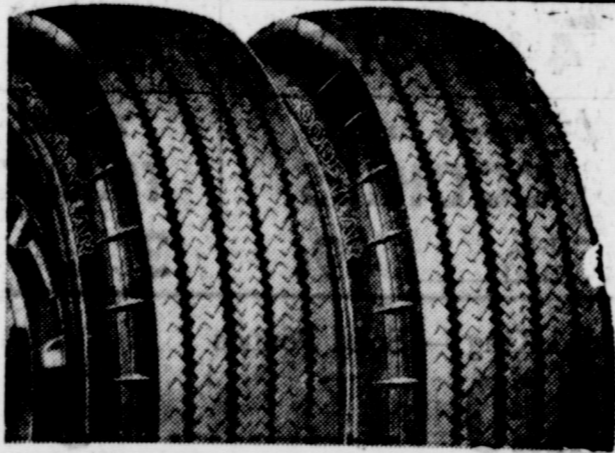

# No Rattlers In New Zealand Native Relates To Rotarians

Neither snakes nor other creatures that might cause harm to man by biting or scratching inhabit New Zealand, Garry Snowsill told the Rotary Club about his homeland at the club's Thursday meeting.  
 Mr. Snowsill, 22, is visiting the United States in a summer vacation program sponsored by the international Lions clubs. He has been the guest of the local Lions club for the past month. He told the Rotarians that Rotary was as popular in New Zealand as it seems to be here.

While taking pictures of an oil well pump near Cisco, the New Zealand lad was surprised to be warned of rattlesnakes. He told Rotarians that not even mosquitoes are found in the land down under (New Zealand is 1,400 miles across sea southeast of Australia).  
 Noting the pats of butter (margarine) on the luncheon tables Thursday, Snowsill said that in his homeland, which produces much of the world's dairy products, a chunk of pure butter is set on a table and diners "saw" corn on the cob through it.  
 With few natural enemies, deer are abundant in New Zealand. There are so many deer that bounty is paid for killing them. Their carcasses may be left behind to rot. Schooling in NZ is similar to that here, Snowsill said, except for the different names attached to certain levels.  
 Elementary school is called "primary" in NZ and includes grades up to high school level, which is denoted as "college." The next higher level of education is the "university." Mr. Snowsill majored in wool at a NZ university.  
 Sheep and goats outnumber people two to one. The people population two and a half million while the sheep and goats enrollment is five and a half million. Grass is lush in the country, approximately

# Take A Walk Is Advice Given By Medical Doctor

Your doctor says "Take a walk."  
 Take a long walk, every day, if you can find the time. Any sort of walking is good, but a brisk walk is better.  
 Walking or hiking is an excellent exercise that involves many of the muscles of the body. One of its big advantages is that walking is universally available as an exercise nearly every day of the year. The strain of the activity depends on the pace and distance.  
 Walking can have mental health values, as well as aid physical health, if we learn to enjoy the exercise and the open air, says a pamphlet from the American Medical Association. Pleasant physical activity can help to relieve emotional tension. Exercise is most likely to be enjoyable when the activity is done with ease and skill.  
 Like any form of exercise walking requires a period of gradual conditioning before all-out effort. If you're out of training, start slowly with short hikes and gradually build up the time and distance.  
 The feet take quite a beating in walking. Be sure that shoes fit properly, are well spots inside wearing two broken in, and have no rough pair of socks helps. The feet function best when the toes point straight ahead in walking. Walking with toes turned in or out distributes the body's weight unequally on the feet.

# USDA Is Opposed To Federal Pecan Marketing Plan

DALLAS — The U. S. Department of Agriculture has recommended against establishment of a proposed federal pecan marketing agreement and order.  
 USDA Consumer and Marketing Service said this recommendation, or tentative decision, is based on a public hearing which showed a wide divergence of opinion among pecan growers, accumulators, shellers and processors — both on the need for the proposed marketing order and on its provisions.  
 The hearing opened in Albany, Ga., June 23, where two days of testimony were taken. It continued in Jackson, Miss. June 27, and in Dallas, Texas, June 30 and July 1, 1966.  
 After the hearing closed, interested persons were given until July 22 to file briefs. Officials said all evidence in the recorded testimony and exhibits was carefully considered in arriving at the findings and conclusions on which the recommended decision is based.  
 Text of the recommended decision will be published in the August 12 Federal Register, and interested persons will have until September 9 to file exceptions. Exceptions should be submitted to the hearing clerk, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Room 112-A, Washington, D. C., 20250, where they will be available for public inspection.  
 Copies of the recommended decision may be obtained from the Fruit and Vegetable Division, Consumer and Marketing Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington D. C. 20250.

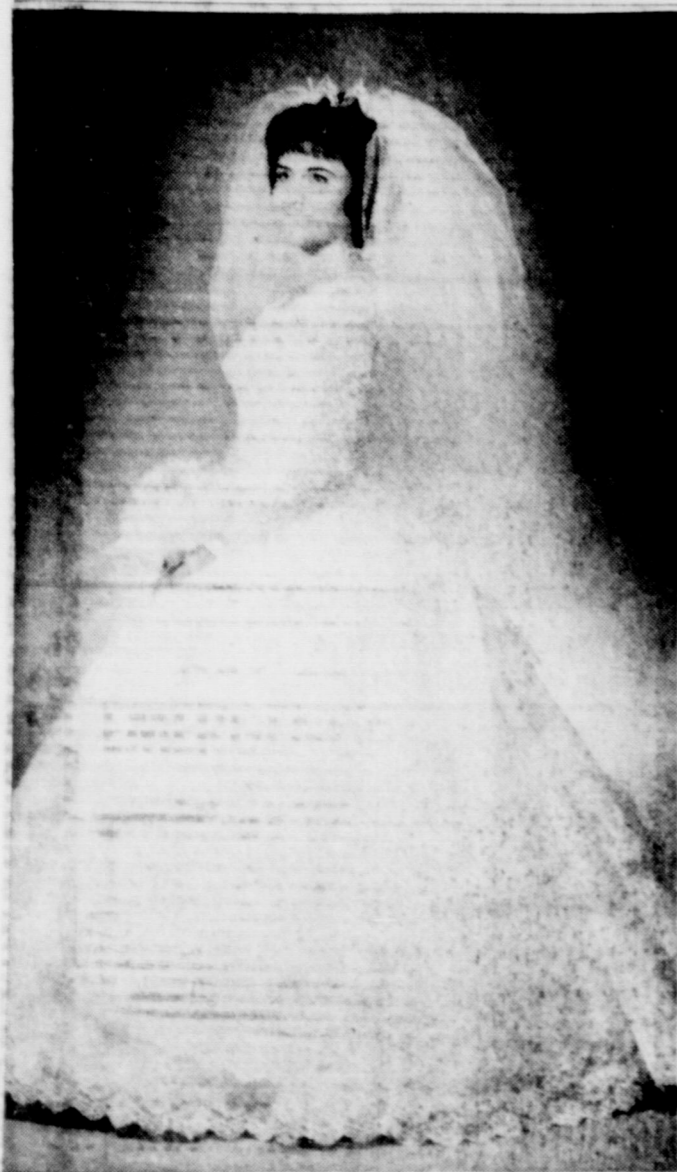
