



New annual FISHING and BOAT Recreation Permits must be obtained by SEPTEMBER 1' 1966, by persons using the waters of Lake Leon for Fishing and or Boating.


It is the responsibility of such users to obtain these permits before launching their boat or fishing.

The cost of annual boat recreation permits is \$5.00 and they can only be obtained from the Lake Warden whose office is located near the dam. This is because he must make an inspection of the boat and the safety provisions.

Fishing permits cost \$5.00 for an annual permit and 50c per day for daily permits. These may be obtained from most sporting goods stores and from commerical places on the lake.

The Board of Directors has instructed the Lake Warden to Rigidly enforce all regulations pertaining to lake use and to issue violation tickets and file charges in Justice Courts against persons failing or refusing to comply with regulations.


