100 MILES OF NETS SET

MENOMINEE, Mich. — More than 100 miles of nets are set annually in Green Bay for the spawning run of the silvery herring late in November. About 150 Wisconsin and Michigan boats were active in the herring harvest this season. Salt fish packers operate when the spawning run glut the market and reduces the price to around \$20 to \$25 a ton. Fishermen operating on Green Bay annually catch from 1,125 to 1,500 tons of herring in the fall for salting. The year's total take for the fresh fish trade is estimated at twice that amount.

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
