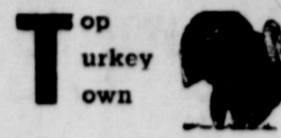

It's no doubt about it now. Eastland is going to come up with a good club this year, and Cisco can be mighty proud they beat them.

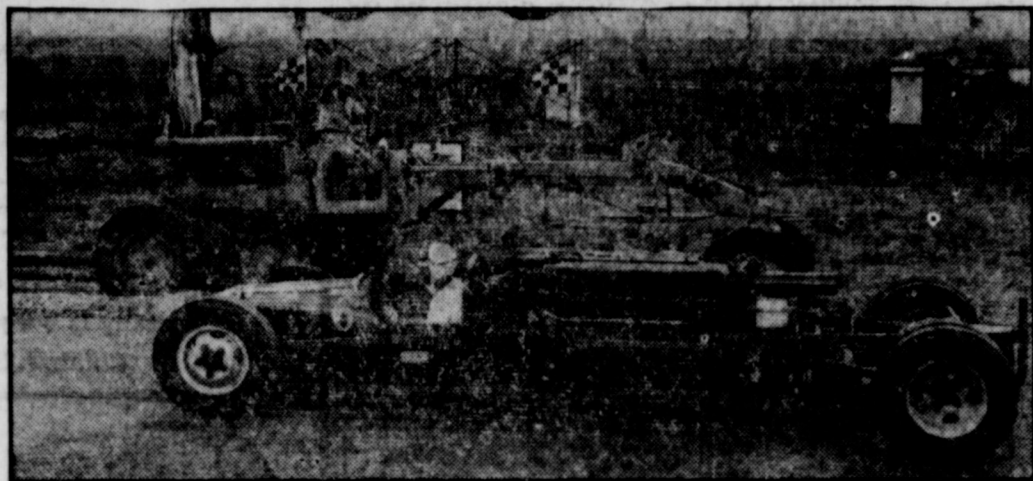

Another Stephens county try is the No. 2 Joe Beaty, being put down by Leo Vesenmeir Jr. It also is approximately 14 miles northwest of Breckenridge in the W. M. Bales Survey. Proposed depth is 2800 feet.

In Palo Pinto county Midwestern State Oil Co. of Fort Worth is drilling the No. 1 A. L. Hobbs as a wildcat 3-4 of a mile northwest of Grafrod in Section 1716, TE&L Survey. Proposed depth to 2500 feet to the Strawn sand.

"Eastland is fortunate in that it has had no trouble with juvenile arsonists," Fire Chief Billy Johnson told Eastland Rotarians Monday at their regular luncheon meeting held in the roof garden of the Connellee Hotel.

Johnson said many towns faced a serious problem, with 50 percent of all arson being done by juveniles.

The fire chief was introduced by Norris Wilson, program chairman. Johnson said that so far this year, only \$340 has been marked up as fire loss in Eastland. "Most of our fires are actually outside the city limits."

Highway Patrol Has Need for New Men Now

Applications for appointment as Texas highway patrolmen will be accepted from the present time until Oct. 15, according to an announcement by Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas department of public safety.

Examinations for the men qualifying will be given state-wide during the latter part of October and those scoring the highest will enter the recruit training school next January.

Garrison said that appointments will be made to fill the additional positions authorized by the last Texas legislature and to fill existing vacancies caused by promotions and resignations.

Salary of patrolmen is \$315 monthly, plus longevity. They are also paid during training. Other benefits include annual leave and benefits of the state retirement system and federal social security.

General requirements for appointment to the state highway patrol include: 21 to 35 years of age, inclusive; minimum height of five feet, eight inches; weight in proportion to height; excellent physical condition; and high school education or equivalent.

In addition, applicants must be citizens of the United States and residents of Texas for at least a year immediately prior to filing of the application. They are also subject to a rigid character investigation.

Application blanks or further details may be obtained by writing to W. J. Elliott, chief, Texas highway patrol, at Austin or by contacting the captain in command of the nearest patrol district.

Inspection Date Is Sept. 15 for Motor Vehicles

The Texas public safety commission has set Sept. 15, 1956 to April 15, 1957, as the period during which automobiles and other motor vehicles must be inspected under provisions of the state's motor vehicle inspection law.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., of the Texas department of public safety, said in announcing the commission's action that motorists should avail themselves of the opportunity to have their autos inspected as soon after Sept. 15 as possible in order to avoid the inconvenience and delay which is usually associated with the end of the seven-months period by the "log jam" of car owners who wait until just before the deadline to have their vehicles safety checked.

George W. Busby, chief of the DPS motor vehicle inspection division, stated that the more than 4200 licensed inspection stations in the state would have sufficient supplies of stickers on hand by the starting date and would be equipped to check vehicles without delay.

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Slight Increase Noted; Rendered Roll Sets Record

Approval of a total tax rendition of \$20,949,790 was made Monday by Eastland county commissioners.

The rendition is slightly higher than last year's, despite several tax cuts. New renditions were credited with pushing the figure above last year's \$20,948,280.

A breakdown shows that Eastland countians are due to pay \$306,564.48 in state, county and school taxes. State taxes will total \$69,926.57, county taxes are listed at \$167,598.33 and school taxes at 69,039.58.

A spokesman for the Tax Assessor - Collector's office said that the county this year had its biggest rendered roll and the smallest unrendered roll in the county's history. Total increase in actual taxes due is approximately \$12.

Annual county budget hearing will be held Sept. 24, at the regular meeting of the Court.

In other business, the Court approved regular monthly bills. All members were present except J. B. (Tip) Arther, who is on his vacation. R. L. (Bob) Carter, newly elected commissioner from Rising Star who will take office Jan. 1, also met with the Court.

Investigation In Baby Case Is Continuing

Eastland county law enforcement officers are continuing their investigation of Ranger's premature baby which was found in a trash can in the rear of the Western Auto store and J. C. Penney company on Friday, Aug. 31, it was reported this week.

Rumors, which still persist and continue to trickle in to the officers, are being checked out and to date not one has proven to be a lead which could be called authentic.

The officers again made the plea that these rumors, without any foundation of fact be kept down, as the time and effort required to trace them down only retards the investigation.

No tangible results are ready for publication, at this time, it was said — if and when any concrete evidence is "safely wrapped up" it will be released for publication, according to the officers.

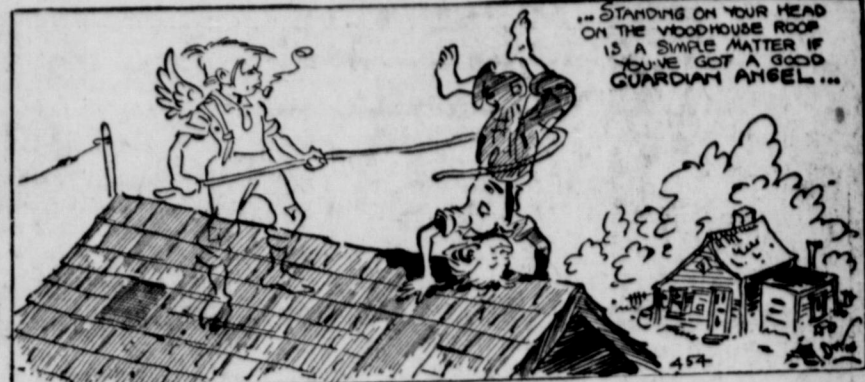

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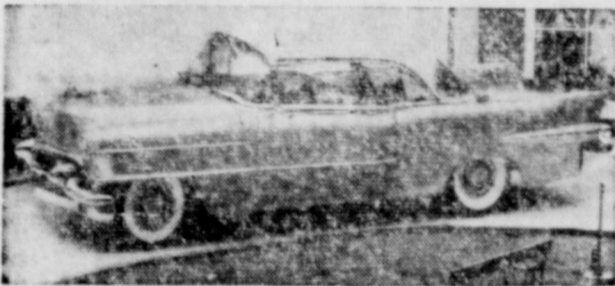

Dear Virgil:
I really enjoy reading your column. It gives me news and information about what is happening in Eastland. Eastland is a place that has a soft place in my heart and is the scene of many of my most pleasant memories. I am always interested in what goes on there and your column tells me more than the rest of the paper.

The fact that you always say just what you think makes your column even more interesting. I am a firm believer in a newspaper saying just what it thinks. It will be a black day in our land when that right disappears.

Your reasons for being a Democrat particularly interests me. I am sure that you are aware that statistics by themselves can be made to mean almost anything. You need to look behind them to get the full story. I am surprised that a newspaperman would fail to look at all of the facts behind his statistics.

One of the big facts that you overlooked is that the last two years of Truman's administration was spent fighting the Korean war. I know that Harry called it a "police action," but anyone who was there would call it a war. The

prosperity of the Truman era was based on war. Ike has stopped the war and has gone through the readjustment period with flying colors.

It is true that corporate profits have increased 34.1 percent. On the surface this figure looks big, but this figure is total corporate profits. It ignores the millions of dollars that corporations have invested in the new plans and new machinery which make new jobs and bring more goods for all of us to enjoy at a price that we can afford. The rate of return to the investors who furnished the money for this expansion has risen much less than the 12.5 percent that the average income of wage earners have risen. There are over 1,000,000 more people working now than at the end of Truman's administration. Corporation profits have put more people to work making more than ever before.

Another thing you overlooked was inflation. We had runaway inflation from the end of World War II until Ike took over. There isn't any three year period in Harry's administration in which the living costs didn't eat up all of the increase in wages. A dollar now will come nearer buying what it would three years ago than in anytime during Harry's reign. The 12.5 percent increase under Ike means more in real purchasing power than the 34.1 percent increase under Harry's inflation.

Farm income historically goes way up during times of war. It has also dropped drastically after every war we ever had. About 40 percent after world wars one and two, both under Democrat administrations.

The farmer is in mighty bad shape, and I know that many of them are in desperate straits. However, there isn't anything any politician in either party can promise them that will do near as much good as about five more inches of rain a year during the growing season. If any politician could guarantee that, I know that the farmers and ranchers of West Texas would move heaven and earth to get him elected.

I know that it is politically popular to cuss profits when somebody else makes them. But, how long do you think it will take Onis Dick to fire you if the Eastland Telegram fails to make a

profit? Many of the things we enjoy today are very complicated and require a large investment in plants and machinery to get them made. These large investments require large corporations to handle them. America was made great by profits. The lure of profits and the fear of failure have caused many men in America to work and produce the things that make our life worth while. The pulling down of the big size of the small produces no incentive for a man to work and produce. Look at the mess France is in. The industry there is geared to the most inefficient members. Prices are high, inflation is rampant and things are truly a mess. I am glad to see large and small corporations both make a profit. I am glad for my neighbor's good fortune, for I hope some of it will rub off on me. I feel that the darkest day in America's history will be the day that General Motors fails to make a profit. For when that day arrives, most of the small businesses and many other large manufacturers will be under also. I can't imagine a worse situation.

I guess that you have figured out by now that I believe in the Republican party. I would like to tell you why. When I was in the service many of my buddies from the North used to kid me about Texas being a one party state. They pointed out that both parties ignore Texas rights and wishes. The Democrats because they know they will get the vote no matter how hard they kick us in the teeth. The Republicans because they never got much vote from us. In other words, as long as Texas is a one party state, we are going to get the small end of the stick. New York, Pennsylvania, Illinois and other states that can go either way get all of the attention. Texas is the largest state in the nation, it has the fifth largest population and it is nearly last in the esteem of both political parties. It will remain so as long as we cling to the Democrat party.

I am sure that the district attorney in Eastland county will give you the best of his ability because he knows that he needs to displease only 11 people and he is out of office. If he had won by an overwhelming majority, he might feel like relaxing.

We can get good service for Texas out of both political parties, if we have a two party state. The only way we can do this is for thinking individuals to vote for the Republican party.

I doubt seriously if this will make you change your tune, but I feel that a look at the other side of the coin is necessary. I am not angry, but I am deeply concerned about the future of America. Profit is a big word in that picture and a very vital one. Let's be thankful that corporations are making a good profit, because then they can grow and produce more jobs and more goods. It is an old axiom of economics that excessive profits breed ruinous competition. If any corporation is getting too much out of a good thing there is always someone who will jump in and take away the excess by producing the same thing at a smaller price. Examples of this are numerous. One is the miniature golf craze.

I sincerely hope that the Eastland Telegram is making a nice profit. I would like to see business so good that another newspaper would think that Eastland is a good place to get rich and that both of you would then make a profit.

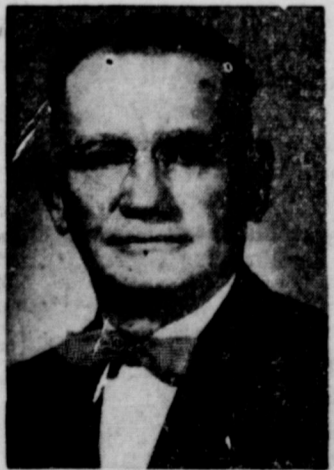

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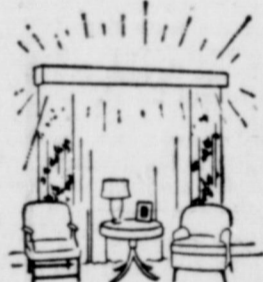

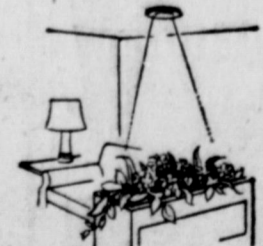
