TWO YEARS MORE OF THIS IN TEXAS

At least two years more must elapse before the way is opened in Texas to eliminate the bootlegger and liquor-financed crime.

Prohibition comes to an end, nationally, on Tuesday. But the Texas state constitution prohibits sale of intoxicating liquor, and to Texas conditions will be unchanged.

The coming of repeal, in other states, adds a number of old problems and creates a number of new ones; but on no one does it place a greater responsibility than on the average, every-day citizen who likes his highball, cocktail or glass of wine.

There is no question whatever that it was public resentment over the activities of the bootlegger and his allies that was chiefly responsible for the vote for repeal. There were other factors, of course. But the citizenry as a whole made up its mind that a law which subsidized such an insolent and lawless criminal class was a law that did not belong on the books any longer; and for that reason, more than any other, prohibition was voted out.

If legal liquor puts bootleggers out of business in one state, the easily may move to another where state laws prohibit legal sale of liquors. They are not wanted in Texas, nor needed to supply the demand for liquors. Whiskey can be had in Austin, cheaply and easily, and the enforcement officers of the state know the fact. They also know a conviction in district court, under the very vigorous Dean law, is nearly impossible. It follows the only possible enforcement is in destruction of liquor stores and small firms imposed in minor courts, which, after all, are but a sort of license to do business.

Texas would have repealed the amendment to its constitution prohibiting sale of liquor last summer, had the legislature submitted the measure. Now a bitter, and possibly a prolonged battle impends, with the professional prohibitionists stirring up every possible source of revenue and strength. Sooner or later, the Dean law will be erased from the statute books—already it has been nullified. Ultimately there will be a direct vote on repeal of the state amendment, and it is likely the measure will follow the famous 18th of the national constitution into discard. The course of Texas will depend, immeasurably, on success of liquor control experiments undertaken in other states where there will be no ban against sale of liquors after Dec. 5.

As the other states approach a new era, in which it will be possible to put the bootlegger out of business. But if this desirable end is to be gained, most of the work will have to be done by Mr. Average Citizen. He can do it very simply. All he has to do is make no purchases of liquor which are not legal. In some states, the tax levy will give the bootlegger an opportunity to undersell the market. In others, restriction on place and time of sale will provide a demand for his wares. It is no secret the bootlegger is going to try to hang on. He won't quit cold.

If we need a new slogan to carry into the repeal era, we might try this: It Pays to Be Legal.

Text: Acts 24:10-23

PAUL IN CAESAREA
BY WM. E. GILROY, D. D.

Paul was in Caesarea, a city on the Mediterranean coast not far from Jerusalem, when he had been brought there to appear before the Roman governor, Felix, following his arrest in Jerusalem to which he had returned for the last time from his missionary journey.

It might be remembered that Paul had returned from his third missionary journey and the affectionate farewell, at Miletus, to the church in Asia, assuring them that he was going to Jerusalem with the conviction that his afflictions were awaiting him there, but with the determination that nothing should deter him from the fulfillment of his duty as a faithful soldier of a Christ.

Paul's missionary journeys were full of perils and hardships. Some of the Jews, who had also come to Jerusalem from the region where Paul had been carrying on his missionary activities, had found in the temple and had raised a riot against him, charging that he had assailed their teaching and defiling the temple.

But when Paul spoke of the Jews who had probably been killed by the mob, he was rescued by a Roman captain, who, on Paul's declaration of Roman citizenship, gave him permission to speak to the people.

On this occasion that Paul defended himself and the fine account of his life contained in Acts 22. But when Paul spoke of the Jews to the Gentiles, he broke out with renewed vigor and saved Paul the captain brought into the city.

Paul later was freed from his imprisonment and the chief priests and elders were commanded to appear before Paul, while Paul was brought before them. Here he made a further statement, this time between the Jews and the Pharisees.

The Roman captain, fearing that Paul would be pulled to pieces between them, commanded the soldiers to take him by force and bring him back into the castle.

Meanwhile a band of Paul's followers slipped under oath declaring they would neither eat nor drink until they had killed him, but the Roman captain, hearing of this plot, provided a company of soldiers and horsemen to escort Paul safely to Caesarea for appearance before Felix, the Roman governor.

Our lesson Paul has come before the governor and has been allowed to speak for himself. It is a dignified statement of Paul's own convictions and purposes, and Felix was so well impressed that he decided to postpone further consideration of the case until he could have more exact knowledge.

Paul's Felix was anticipating a disposition of the case that would turn to his own advantage; when Paul was again called upon by Felix, who sat on the bench with his wife Drusilla, the Roman governor discovered the quality of the prisoner with whom he had to do.

To have the dramatic story of the governor trembled at this minister of Christ stood before him and reasoned "of temperance, righteousness and judgment to come." It was on this occasion that Felix gave the excuse for his challenge of conscience, "I will try for this time; when a convenient season, I will try for thee."

That a contrast between the detestation and conviction of the Christian tentmaker, and the kness and indecision of the man of affairs! Truly, as I said elsewhere, "God hath chosen the weak things of this world to confound the mighty."

"Sweetheart of Sigma Chi" to Be At Lyric Theatre

A college story saturated with love, life and laughter; a college story brimming with music, but not a musical; a college story that for the first time in motion picture history does not concern itself with football, baseball, basketball, cross-country or track meet contests—but features, for the first time on the talking screen an

eight-oared shell race, enacted by 32 youths of brain and brawn, as its smashing climax.

That, in brief, describes "Sweetheart of Sigma Chi." Monogram's most recent production which opens Monday at the Lyric theatre. Although somewhat submerged by the production's entertainment features, the plot is cohesive and holds interest throughout. Briefly it concerns Vivian, flirtatious co-ed, known at Rawley university as "the sweetheart of Sigma Chi." Admired by all members of this

fraternity Vivian centers her attentions upon Bob North. Shy, he evades her at first, but is eventually enslaved. Believing himself jilted in favor of a rival, he slumps in his crew work and is sent to the J. V. boat. Urged by his friend, Harry, he finally bucks up, helps win the race for Rawley and permanently captures the affections of the girl he loves.

Mary Carlisle as Vivian and Buster Crabbe, who played Bob North, managed to extract every ounce of charm and humor out of their roles. The pleasing impression they made was augmented by the excellent work of the supporting principals including Charles Starrett and Florence Lake—featured members of the cast—and Carly Starr, Edwin Tammlyn, Burr McIntosh, Purnell Pratt, Franklin Parker, Tommy Dugan, Grady Sutton and Major Goodsell. The musical embellishments presented by Ted Fio-Rito and his orchestra and staff of vocal favorites, added much to the entertainment value of the production.

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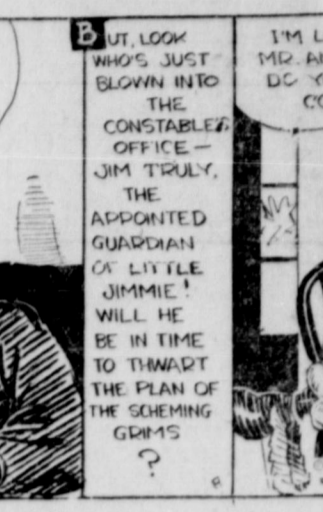
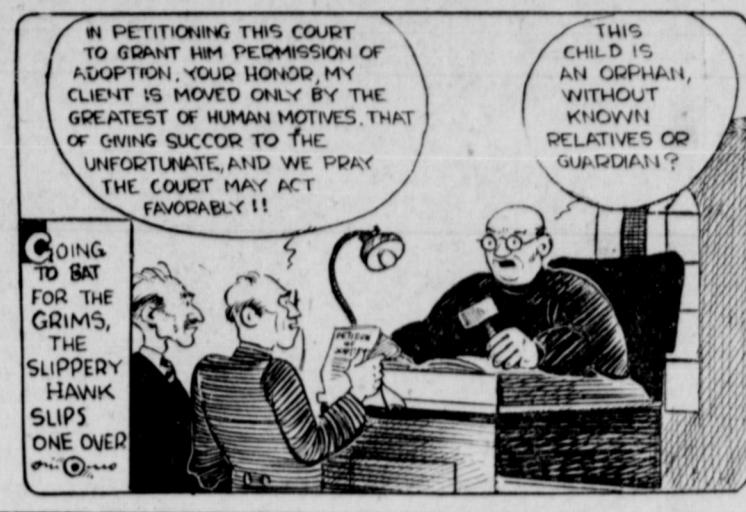
