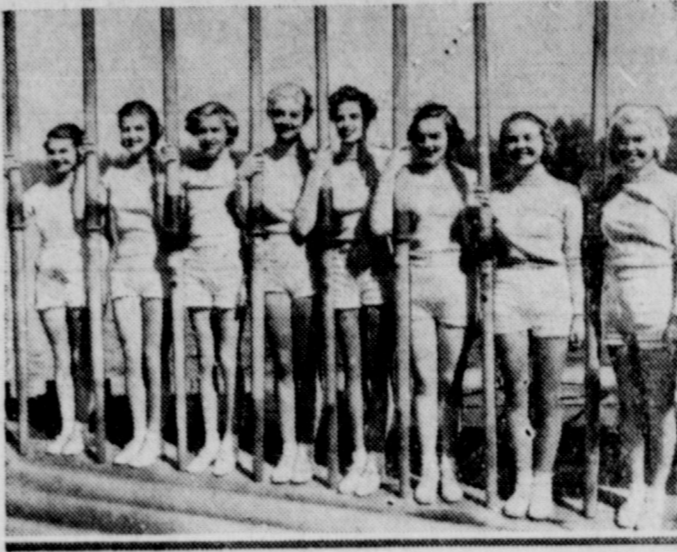

OLD VIRGINIA REJECTS THE CHILD LABOR AMENDMENT

Old Virginia lawmakers rejected the child labor amendment. George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, Patrick Henry and many others listed as immortals were given to the American world by the Old Dominion commonwealth. The Texas senate refused to ratify the child labor amendment.

President Emeritus A. Lawrence Lowell of Harvard University, one of the greatest educators of his period of activity, is said to have been responsible for the failure of the Massachusetts legislature to ratify the amendment. Addressing the National Committee for the Protection of the Child the aged scholar and publicist placed this in the record "We all want to stop the exploitation of children in factories, mines and industries of that nature I, for one, certainly do; but we do not want interference with the home or the health and improving occupations of youth. Some people have no objections to conferring such a power on the national government, trusting that it will not be used. Some of us feel that to do so would be a mistake that we might hereafter greatly regret." It was the contention of Dr. Lowell that the proposed amendment which stated "that congress shall have power to limit, regulate and prohibit the labor of persons under 18 years of age would allow military training for all boys if congress should also ordain. Where power is granted there is always a tendency to use it."

Well, at last Virginia and Massachusetts have "crossed hands across the bloody chasm of years." Their lawmakers appear to be committed to the ancient dogma of the rights of the state to control its own domestic affairs. Where do we go from here?

BANK ROBBERS GIVING OKLAHOMA WIDE BERTH

In recent years bank robberies were numerous in Oklahoma. Noted outlaws of the hills and mountain sectors of Bill Murray's state were ever in evidence. Then Uncle Sam turned loose his secret service forces and the attorney general of the United States placed his vigorous prosecutors on the job. Well, Oklahoma reports only two bank robberies since the beginning of the present year. Texas had two just as the month of February was going out and the March lion coming in. A Lancaster bank was shaken down one day and 48 hours later the bank at Mesquite was raided. There are many hideouts of the outlaws of the Southwest under the skies of Texas. Now the sheriff of Dallas county has asked that two rangers be placed on the trail of the pirates of the motor vehicle and machine gun ferriers. There are large rewards hanging in the air for the pusuti and the capture of these outlaws of the Southwest—but the lawmakers advise to bring them alive and "not dead."

ANOTHER TARIFF CONFERENCE IN THE OFFING

Gaston Doumergue is the prime minister of France. He has been made tariff dictator for France by the legislative department of his government. President Roosevelt has asked the congress to clothe him with authority to dicker with foreign nations along tariff lines—in other words to make trade pacts which would insure a freer and a better market for American farm staples and the products of mills and mines and factories. Really, economic history is in the making of the wide world over.

Preparing And Filing Income Tax Returns

For Married Persons. Now suppose we lay down the general rule applicable to married persons and heads of families. (It has been previously noted that a single person, under conditions outlined, may come under the status of the "head of a family.")

Every husband and wife living together who for the year 1933 had an aggregate gross income of \$5,000 or more, or an aggregate net income of \$2,500 or more, are required to file an income tax return. Widowers, widows, divorcees and married persons separated by mutual consent, are classed as single persons.

Husbands and wives living together may make separate returns of the income of each or they may make a joint return of the aggregate income of both. If separate returns are made, one may not report income which belongs to the other but must report only the income which belongs to him or her. If a joint return is made, such a return is treated as a taxable unit and the income disclosed is subject to taxation.

In addition to the personal exemption of \$2,500 for married persons living together, each such taxpayer is entitled to a credit of \$400 for each dependent. In order to be entitled to the \$400 credit, the taxpayer must furnish the dependent his or her "chief support."

Before going into a discussion of the method of computing the amount of tax, let me take this occasion to impress upon you the extreme importance of carefully reading the instructions printed on your income tax blanks. Errors are costly to the taxpayer and the Government in both time and money, and by strictly following the printed instructions they can be largely eliminated. I cannot emphasize too strongly the necessity for reading these instructions very carefully before making our return.

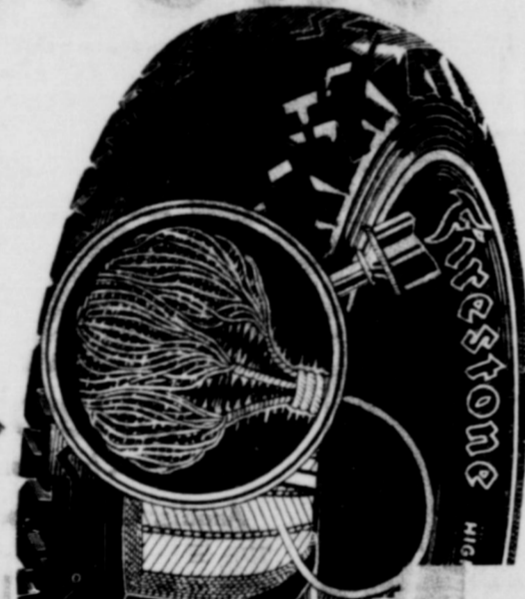
