

Addition of this money to the purchasing power of farmers will bring tremendous benefit to business and industry. That fact already has been demon-strated in the south.

Purchasing power is being seeded to the grass-roots through the wheat, corn-hog, tobacco and other adjustment programs. Stimulus to business is the first result of distribution. I think important gains have been made. These programs are not merely a distribution of

funds to farmers to aid them in

making necessary adjustments. We are seeking to achieve that balance between agriculture, in-dustry and business that is so It is sometimes surprising to

hear city people criticize the agricultural adjustment administration on the ground that we are simply giving dole to the farmers. Often such criticism comes from those who are dependent upon some protected or subsidized enterprise. Most frequently we hear that these is no such thing as a surplus of farm products so long as people are

hungry.

These people do not share our oncept of an agricultural sur-plus. I have frequently pointed out the crue! paradox of burst-ing grain elevators and long bread-lines. We have insisted that it is not fair to keep the farmer on the pan to produce at starvation prices.

To be more specific, the plowing under of 10,000,000 acres of cotton did not deprive the consumer of any clothing. There is still an over abundance of cotton which may be had if our system permits a consumer to buy. The emergency pig-slaughtering campaign did not destroy food. All the edible products were turned into relief channels. Surplus acres breed nothing but confusion, poverty

A great deal will be accomp-lished for the farmer, if our current efforts establish in all minds that an agricultural surplus is that excessive quantity of a commodity which so de-pressed the price that it pre-vents the farmer from purchas-ing the things he needs. monwealths:
