Fifteen Hundred Present For New Plant Opening

"We are here to give our thanks, not to receive yours," Herndon J. Norris of Hollywood, Calif., president of the Hollywood - Maxwell Corset Co. told a cheering crowd of almost 1500 people here Thursday night at the open house of the company's huge new factory building.

Norris, who minutes before had been made an honorary citizen of Texas, told the group that Hollywood - Maxwell is as pleased with Eastland as Eastland — which showed its obvious liking of the firm which employs more than 250 people here — was with the company.

The Texan title was awarded Norris by Gov. Allan Shivers, who wired Fred Brown, owner of the Crazy Hotel in Mineral Wells and a former resident of Eastland, notifying him that he would like to make the Hollywood industrialist an honorary Texan.

Norris, his wife, and J. H. Dawson, vice president, and his wife, were honored guests earlier Thursday at a banquet held in the roof garden of the Connellee Hotel. More than 150 persons were present for the banquet, at which Hubert Westfall, president of the chamber of commerce, introduced Brown as master of ceremonies.

Big Texas hats were awarded officials of the company at the banquet, and then the 150 joined the hundreds of other well-wishers at the plant for the open house festivities.

Greeted by the Eastland High School band, the crowd was feted to Cokes, coffee and doughnuts. What was expected to be a "come and go" group turned out to be a "come and stay" crowd. They lingered to inspect the building and to applaud with sincerity each speaker.

Brown first introduced Mr. and Mrs. Norris, and then Norris spoke briefly, pointing out that although he had helped organize Hollywood - Maxwell, he had had an active part as officer in the firm since 1946 — "the year we first opened a plant in Eastland." He declared that Eastland could be used as a measuring stick for the success of the company since that time. "As our operations in Eastland have grown, so has our company grown," he told the crowd.

Norris told the group that the people of Eastland had made this city a successful location for Hollywood - Maxwell. He pointed out that the company opened another Texas location at the same time they opened up the first plant here in the Masonic building. That plant, he pointed out, no longer exists, but the Eastland location grew into three factories, now to be combined into one large operation.

Locals Lack Scoring Punch In First Half, Go Wild In Second

Eastland's Mavericks fought down bad breaks and a 7-6 half-time deficit here Friday night to roar back for a convincing 26-7 pasting of the unbeaten DeLeon BearKats in the season opener at Maverick Stadium.

The Mavs, after pushing DeLeon all over the field in the first two periods, made one mistake with six minutes to go in the second period, and it cost them the only DeLeon score of the game. A sell-out crowd witnessed the upset victory over the locals Class AA opponents. There was little doubt who was the best team at halftime — Eastland had a 12-5 advantage in first downs and a 155-44 rushing lead—but it was also an obvious fact that the best team trailed by a one point margin.

With beautiful blocking in the forward wall, Eastland sprung Halfback Jimmy Martin 100 yds for two touchdown scampers and moved Quarterback Harvey Lewis up through the middle of the Bear-Kat line for two others in turning in the victory. Bill Upchurch converted successfully twice.

Neither team could score in the first quarter, although each found itself deep in their opponents end of the field. DeLeon had the first opportunity, when Wayne Lamb intercepted one of Lewis' passes on the Maverick 30. In three plays the visitors had it to the Mav 18, but then Brownlee was jarred loose from the ball and Upchurch pounced on it on the Eastland 15.

From there the Mavs drove 69 yards to DeLeon's 16, but this time Eastland fumbled and Don Cass jumped on the ball for the Kats.

Eastland scored early in the second quarter, however, to climax a 60-yard drive. Lewis took it the final two yards, but Upchurch's try for placement was no good.

DeLeon took the lead late in the period. Eastland chose to run the ball on fourth down with five yards needed for a first down. Lewis was thrown for a five yard loss, however, and DeLeon took over on Eastland's 45 with six minutes left to play. Eastland couldn't stop the Kats then. Paced by Lamb and Brownlee, the visitors pushed the ball across the goal line in 13 plays, with Lamb ramming the final two yards. Brownlee then converted.

The Mavs scored the first time they got the ball in the third quarter. Martin raced 20 yards wide around his own right end to end the 60 yard drive, which took just eight plays. This time Upchurch split the uprights and the score stood 13-7.

DeLeon was forced to punt again on the next series of plays, and Eastland, finding its scoring punch, put it across again to ice the affair. This time it took nine plays to move 49 yards, with Lewis

stealing over from the one after Martin had made back-to-back runs of 13 and 12 yards. Upchurch converted, but a penalty rubbed out the point. J. C. Jarrett then tried to convert from 20 yards out, but his kick was wide.

Again DeLeon couldn't move, and again Eastland scored in a hurry. Duard Turner jumped on a Kat fumble on the DeLeon 45 to set up the tally. Upchurch raced 30 of the 45 yards to the 15. Pullman bulled his way to the 13 and then Martin raced to the two, but fumbled. Pullman jumped on top of the pigskin, however, and then Martin went over on the next play. Upchurch again converted.

Coach Carrol Shelton emptied his bench on the Kats then, and his second unit made a good show-

ing against the strong DeLeon II. The reserves played ball control, allowing DeLeon only one offensive play while they were in the game. The visitors fumbled on that

A 91st District court grand jury has recommended that an overhead fan be installed in the grand jury room of the courthouse and that lighting be modernized.

During the jury's three day session, they returned a total of eight true bills, two no bills and passed one case.

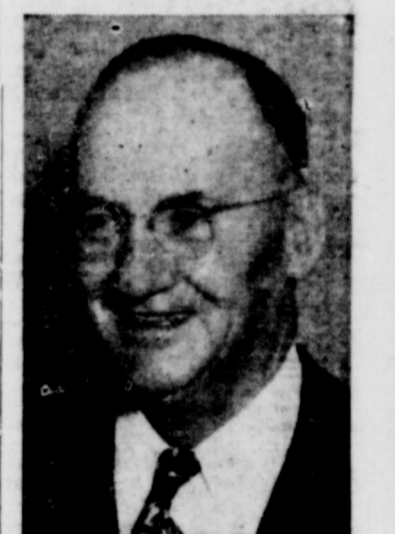
