Oil and Gas Producers Petition For Foreign Imports Reduction

WASHINGTON (Special) — Nineteen Associations of oil and gas producers have petitioned Dr. Arthur S. Flemming, director of the Office of Defense Mobilization, to recommend to President Eisenhower that imports of foreign oil be immediately reduced to their 1954 relationship to domestic production.

The petition was filed with Flemming by Russell B. Brown, general counsel of the Independent Petroleum Association of America, on behalf of the 19 associations. The action was an outgrowth of a meeting of the associations in Washington July 27.

The petition pointed out that congress, in adopting section 7 of the Trade Agreements Extension Act of 1955, determined that the national security is impaired whenever imports of crude oil and petroleum products are in excess of their 1954 relationship to domestic crude oil production.

The language of section 7 makes it clear, the petition stated, that the President "may employ any method deemed necessary and appropriate to adjust petroleum imports to the legislative standard set by congress."

"The significant and increasing excesses in imports over the legislative standard now make necessary formal action under the law," the petition said.

The evidence is conclusive, the petition said, that efforts to obtain compliance with section 7 through voluntary action on the part of the importing companies "have not resulted in a limitation of petroleum imports within the legislative standard established by congress."

Specifically, Flemming was requested to:

1. Advise President Eisenhower that crude oil and petroleum products are being imported into the United States in such quantity as to impair the national security.

2. Recommend that the President take whatever action he deems necessary to adjust total petroleum imports to their 1954 relationship to domestic production.

In addition to IPAA, which headquarters in Tulsa, Okla., petitioners included Bradford District Pennsylvania Oil Producers association, East Texas Oil association, Independent Oil Producers agency of California, Independent

Oil Producers and Land Owners association, Tri-State, Evansville, Indiana, Kansas Independent Oil & Gas association, Kentucky Oil & Gas association, Louisiana Independent Producers & Royalty Owners association, National Stripper Well association, New York State Oil Producers association, North Texas Oil & Gas association, Ohio Oil & Gas association, Oil Producers Agency of California, Oklahoma Independent Petroleum association, Panhandle Producers & Royalty Owners association, San Joaquin Valley Oil Producers association, Southwest Pennsylvania Producers association, Texas Independent Producers & Royalty Owners association, and the West Central Texas Oil and Gas association.

Brashear Loses Post As Veterans Officer

Arther Says He Will Seek Suit To Regain Funds

"I plan to ask that the Commissioners Court start legal proceedings to regain the money paid Paul Brashear as veterans service officer at the next meeting of the Court," J. B. (Tip) Arther, commissioner of Precinct 1, told a Telegram reporter Monday following a meeting of the Court in which commissioners voted to take Brashear's name off the county payroll.

Arther made the statement during a lull in the commission meeting, saying he didn't take the action at Monday's meeting because most of the Court's time would be taken up with paying routine bills.

Brashear, who recently was re-elected as state representative, has held both the state post and the county office during the past two years. The post of veterans service officer pays \$45 a month.

That would mean that the suit would involve 19 months' pay, or \$855.

Arther said he planned to check with County Attorney Joe Nuesle to find out "if he will handle the suit for us."

Brashear is one of four veterans service officers in Eastland County. Most counties have just one officer and many counties do not have any. Eastland County, however, has divided their appropriation of \$200 a month so that there are service officers in Cisco, Rising Star, Ranger and Eastland. Lee Dockery of Ranger is the official county service officer. He draws \$65 a month. The other three men are actually his deputies. Brashear, James Wright of Rising Star each are paid \$45 a month. Their duty is to help veterans in any way possible.

Sheriff To... Buy Cooler

The question of the jail air conditioner came up again Monday.

Sheriff J. B. Williams called on County Commissioners to see what all the disturbance is about. He told the Court that he was under the impression that they had agreed to buy the air conditioner and that was why it was purchased.

Commissioners explained that they agreed to buy the unit only if it could be legally paid for out of the permanent improvement fund. The attorney general ruled no, but by that time the air conditioner was installed.

Settling looking puzzled, the Sheriff said, "Well those folks need an air conditioner, so I'll just buy the thing myself."

Young Outlines Problems of Home Numbering

"The program of street marking and proper numbering of buildings and homes in Eastland, has long been a dream of the City Commission," Jimmy Young, city manager, said Tuesday.

"Years ago, the project was undertaken, beginning at the Northeast corner of the square for a local post, Seaman Street and Main Street were each used as guiding streets, numbering the blocks from those nerve centers.

"In 1955 this map was brought up to date by the Sanford Insurance Co., and is in use as a city map at the City Hall. With very few exceptions, the house number on this map has been used in this campaign now underway.

"Going west, on Commerce, then turning south, we find block two and three before arriving at Plummer. This causes the 200 and 300 numbers in one block. This is the result of Olive Street coming through from Seaman to Green. The beginning of another hundred in the middle of the block, is used by many large cities, where the same problem exists.

"This same condition exists between West Main and West Patterson caused by White St. Also going south on Seaman, we have block one and two between Seaman and Passet, caused by Roswood Street having a dead end.

"During the past 30 or 35 years, houses have been numbered according as residents thought their number should be. Many of them were incorrect.

"This present campaign is to correct these errors. The present program is not one to change numbers but rather to correct them.

"The cooperation by all of you has been most gratifying, and we trust this will clarify any misunderstandings."

Ruling, Via Odessa, Given By Sheppard

Eastland County commissioners Monday agreed, without a roll call vote, to relieve Paul Brashear of his duties as veterans service officer in Cisco.

The unexpected action came after J. B. (Tip) Arther, commissioner of Precinct 1, pointed out that the attorney general had ruled that "... a member of the Texas Legislature is not eligible to serve as county service officer during the time that he is elected and serving as a member of the Texas Legislature regardless of whether the Legislature is actually in session."

Brashear is completing his first two year term as state representative from the 76th District, and recently won the right to have his name on the general election ballot as the Democratic candidate, which for all practical reasons assures him of another term in office.

Arther, in presenting a letter from John Reeves, assistant attorney general, said that he realized that the letter was "a part of Omar Burkett's campaign," but he felt the court should abide by the law "no matter who points out that we are wrong." Burkett was defeated by Brashear in the recent Democratic primary.

The letter was addressed to John H. (Buddy) Rogers of Ector County (Odessa). It follows:

"Section 40 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas prohibits a person from holding at the same time more than one civil office of emolument with certain exceptions not applicable to your question.

"A member of the Legislature holds a civil office of emolument, Texas Constitution Article III, Sections 1, 2, 3, 4 and 24. The office of County Service Officer is a civil office of emolument, Art. 5798a2, U.C.S. Atty. Gen. opinion V-269, O-6489.

"You are advised therefore, that a member of the Texas Legislature is not eligible to serve as county service officer during the time that he is elected and serving as a member of the Texas Legislature regardless of whether the Legislature is actually in session."

"I'd like to raise my children in Eastland," Rev. Robert McGinnis of Fort Worth, who is conducting the summer revival this week at the First Baptist Church, told Eastland Rotarians Monday at their regular noon day lunch held in the roof garden of the Connelley Hotel.

"Eastland is a fine town because of you men," Rev. McGinnis asserted, declaring that the city would remain fine only so long as "you men don't sell out your convictions."

The noted Baptist minister, taking a look at Soviet Russia, said that Christians are forced to be against communism. "Communism is anti-Christian," he said, "and we have no choice but to oppose it."

Earl Bender, chairman of the attendance committee, reported that the club last week had its first perfect attendance meeting ever held in the month of August.

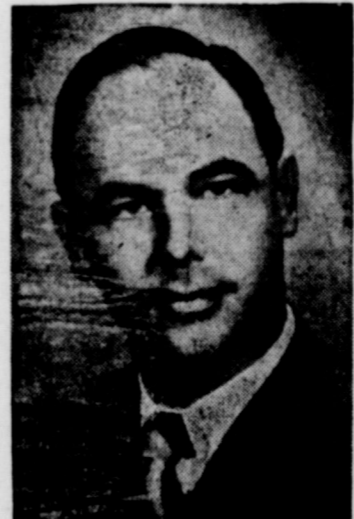
