BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON.—The Senate's big biennial slush fund show will soon be opening its 1934 season.

The boys will be passing a resolution by Senator Borah to create a committee to check the expenses and methods of senatorial campaigns, hoping to catch another slush-funder such as Bill Vare of Pennsylvania, who was deprived of his seat after the 1926 election because his primary campaign cost nearly a million dollars—nearly half as much as his chief opponent's.

Pennsylvania probably again will be the committee's first port of call. Senator David A. Reed, friend and counsel of the Mellons, has been attacked by Gov. Gifford Pinchot, his relatively progressive opponent, for alleged huge expenditures in the Republican primary campaign.

Mrs. Cornelia Pinchot, the governor's gifted, red-headed wife, has been secretly approaching friendly progressive senators here, urging them to bust out on the Senate floor with charges of a big Reed slush fund.

Of course, no Senate committee could organize before May 15, date of the Pennsylvania primaries. Cornelia merely wanted to get out some anti-Reed propaganda and scare the Republican reactionaries whom she believes are flooding the state with Reed money.

partment expenditures. (The sub-committee accuses Fulois of violating the law requiring competitive bidding, as to proposed purchase of \$7,500,000 worth of airplanes, and commends Assistant Secretary of War Harry Woodring for spoiling the Fulois plan of non-competitive, negotiated contracts.)

Originally it regarded Fulois as a hero, victimized by the general staff, and expected to pin responsibility on the G. S. or Woodring. But study of the records shows Fulois testified that his first formal information of allocation of \$7,500,000 in PWA funds for army aircraft was in a letter from the army chief of finance Nov. 29.

Whereas on Oct. 27, Fulois had sent a memo to the assistant chief of staff which he called "a revised set-up of airplanes that should be purchased with the \$7,500,000 allocated Public Works funds," and told exactly where the planes were to be built and constructed.

THE fellows who engineered the process of the stock market regulation bill through the House—Tom Corcoran of RFC and Ben Cohen of PWA—insist that Congressman Carl Mapes, Michigan Republican, is "the best New Dealer of them all."

Mapes is a 60-year-old veteran of 20 years' service who was regarded as quite conservative until he bumped against the huge Wall Street lobby and even waged open battle against his own party leader, Bert Snell.

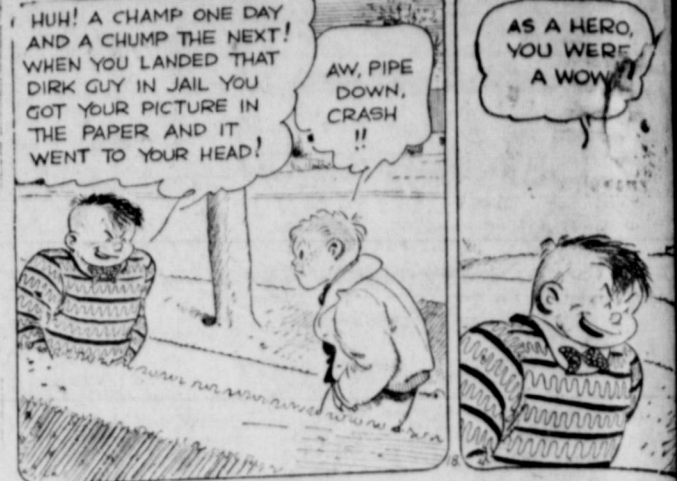
