Mays Take 42-2 Victory Under Wraps

Reserves Give Clyde Cold Weather Lesson

Eastland's flu-ridden Eastland Mavericks played under wraps here Friday night but ground out a 42-2 victory over a determined Clyde Bulldog team before a blanket-wrapped crowd of some 1000.

The Mavericks did something they hadn't been able to in nine years when they knocked off Clyde. They won the District 10-A championship. Not since 1947.

Hollis swept wide around right end and was trapped by End Harold Fleming behind the goal line, giving Clyde their lone two points.

The Mavericks got their final tally when Humphrey again passed to Hollis, this time for six yards. The drive netted 40 yards in all and Center Neil Pogue converted to make the final score 42-2.

Next week Eastland will try to gain revenge for the Sept. 28 defeat at the hands of the Cross Plains Buffs. The Buffaloes won that one 7-6 and Eastland is out for revenge in this bi-district tilt.

Each Vote Cast In Special Election Cost Taxpayers \$1

It cost a little more than \$1 a vote in Eastland County to hold the special constitutional amendment election Tuesday. That's what a reporter found when he tallied up the expense accounts filed by election judges and compared it to the total vote.

Eight hundred and ninety-nine Eastland Counties went to the polls in the special election, and costs of holding the voting totaled \$908.

Considering the fact that the county has to pay for the election, plus the fact that the voting could have just as easily been done when the general election was held, it is obvious that the legislative blunder which caused the special election was unexcusable.

But almost as unexcusable is the fact that while the county had only 899 citizens who thought the election was worth exercising their right and duty to vote, there were 25 voting places in the county plus absentee voting. In other words, if all of the voting had been done equally, only 36 per-

sons would have voted in any precinct.

But the voting wasn't done equally. Some precincts, such as Ranger Precinct 3, had a fairly heavy vote. There 118 citizens voted. Total expenses were \$43.25. Break that down and you will find each vote cost about 38 cents. Compare that to the Pleasant Hill Box. Five voted there and expenses were \$26.75, or \$5.35 a vote. And at Okra, where eight voted, expenses were \$35, or \$4.37 a vote.

Of course this being a special election it is understandable that the vote was light and therefore more costly.

But let's go back to the August Democratic primary, where the voting was heavy. Then at Pleasant Hill it cost \$29 to count 20 votes. At Alameda it cost \$35 to count 17 votes. At Staff the cost was \$30 for 20 votes, at Romney \$35

You can see that the cost of the election was pushed up because the county simply has too many voting precincts. The 25 precincts the county has were selected many a year ago. Then Farmer Brown couldn't back his car out of his garage, load up mama and be in a nearby town in 10 minutes. The voting places were needed then.

But what about today? At the last Democratic County convention, delegates voted to recommend to the commissioners court that some of the smaller precincts be abolished. When the action came before the Court, however, commissioners—faced with several representatives from the smaller precincts—looked at the thing vote wise and unanimously said that they would not do away with any voting precinct unless voters of that precinct requested them to.

Not picking on any particular precinct, let's give some examples. Why couldn't voters in Olden drive four miles to Eastland to vote? And Olden can't be considered one of the smallest precincts. The cost of holding the election here would not increase a red cent, but all of the money would be saved in Olden. The same thing will work with Seranton voting at Cisco, Desdemona at Gorman, Long Branch at Carbon, Okra at Rising Star, Alameda at Ranger and so on down the line.

In fairness to the smaller precincts, let's look at their side of the question. Most of them have seen their schools incorporated with those in the larger towns and have little left to hold their communities together. Some have older voters who would have trouble getting to the polls.

But, weighing the good with the bad, it seems that Eastland County simply has more places to vote than it does voters. Maybe if the smaller precincts won't give up it would be wise for Eastland citizens to plan to petition the Court to do away with the two voting boxes here and vote in Olden.

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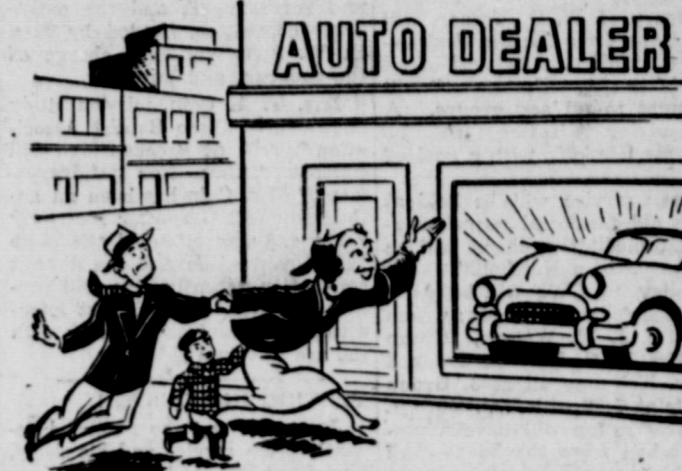
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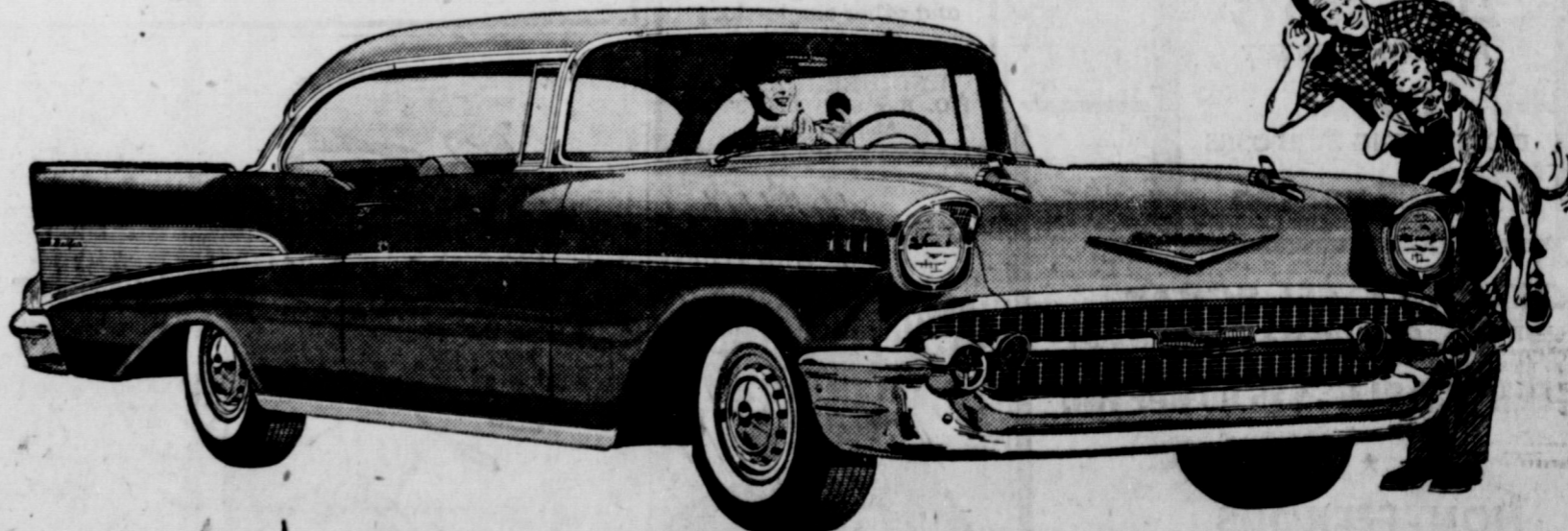
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
