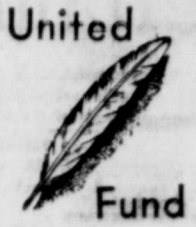

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Kincaid Turkey Story Told by Star-Telegram

(Editor's Note: The following story appeared recently in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram's farm magazine.)

Despite the drought that has seared most of Texas in recent years, by going into specialized farming a young couple in Eastland County have made enough money to buy a farm and remodel their farm home.

Both Don Kincaid and his wife, Pat, are quick to point out that they couldn't have done it alone. But with financing from some of the major feed companies and advice from their parents they have made a big success in turkey farming operations that started out with a modest \$750 investment in 1951.

In 1950 he moved to Texas from New Mexico where he had raised sheep.

He had hardly seen a turkey.

but the profit his father made on his first bunch that year was enough to convince Don that turkeys would make him more money than sheep, and he sold all his ewes.

He was attending Cisco Junior College when he entered partnership with his father and brother, Robert. In the winter of 1951-52, Don's first year in the business, they sold eggs from 1,500 Beltsville White turkey hens and marketed some 2,500 poults.

Don had a one-fourth interest in the partnership that continued the following year while he went to school at Abilene Christian College. He had to hire a full time hand to take care of his part of the rapidly expanding operations.

After he and Pat married in June of 1953, they moved to the ranch and drove to Abilene three days a week until their graduation in 1954. She was attending Hardin-Simmons University, majoring in music and speech. Don got his degree in psychology and English, but he took as many agricultural courses as he could squeeze into his tight schedule.

In September of 1954 he moved to the farm where they now live, east of Cisco. After dividing the turkeys, he moved 1,000 hens and toms to his place. Turkey numbers owned by the partnership had jumped to 10,000. In the meantime profits had put Don through college and paid for his 80-acre farm. In the winter of 1954-55, he started 6,000 birds on his own place. They included 1,000 broad breasted bronze which were sold on the 1955 Thanksgiving market. He also sold live, dressed, fresh dressed and frozen birds on the retail market.

He figured he made \$1.92 for each broad breasted bronze bird and \$1.60 on each Beltsville White he sold during the year, excluding labor costs. "By watching the corners on feed costs, my profits were up considerably over the previous year," he said.

He kept about 1,500 Beltsville Whites for laying hens. In addition to his egg business this year, he plans to send more than 6,000 turkeys to market.

Kincaid said he has no special formula, but he believes extra care pays off in satisfied customers. He gathers his hatching eggs at least six times a day.

The egg record is affected somewhat by the weather because he keeps the hens outside.

He starts using lights approximately one month before he wants the hens to come into production. An automatic time clock turns them on at 3 a.m. each day and turns them off at sun-up.

He has one tom for every ten hens, but he keeps some of the toms in a separate pen at all times so the average ratio running with the hens is about 1 to 15.

He credits much of his success to the feed manufacturers who backed him, and to the Central Texas Turkey Growers Association. He has served as president of the latter organization. He believes it is a worthwhile group for fenced growers because speakers bring them up to date on new developments at their regular meetings.

Kincaid said the main cost of raising turkeys is in the feed, and all of the major companies have some kind of financing plan which will aid the producer in this and some other costs.

"A farmer can't start on a very

large scale without adequate facilities," he said, "but financing help makes possible one of the best opportunities for young men to get started in the farming business these days.

The formula proved so successful for Don that last year he joined his brothers, Bob and Aubrey, and his father in a new partnership. They thought one of the easiest ways to increase profits was to reduce feed costs so they bought a feed store, and a short time later installed a hatchery unit.

Although Don is primarily interested in turkey raising, he also is active otherwise. He is secretary of the West Texas Ranchers Association and a director of the Eastland County Farm Bureau.

In 1955 he was selected as the "Cisco Kid," a title which was bestowed on the basis of community leadership at the first Cisco Fiesta.

At a time when more and more farm boys are moving to the city, it is encouraging to see young farmers with ability staying in agriculture. Don, Pat and their young daughters, Deneice and Delaine, make a nice farm family.

Handy Jim's FIX-UP TIPS For the Home

Game Room-Guest Room

AN UNUSUAL wall installation provides game room facilities along with a guest closet and a combination desk and vanity. Modern and attractive, the various units may be used separately or in combination.

As shown in the left of the illustration, the game room-guest closet gives little clue as to its real purpose. A functional door, about 8 inches thick, has storage behind sliding panels of Masonite Ridgeline, and the closet interior is outfitted with "Peg-Board" panels and fixtures.

Behind the central closed swinging doors, made of a new hardboard known as Panelply, are space for a TV set and books. At the right is the combination desk and vanity, including nicknack shelves.

Each of the three units can be built in the average home workshop. The principal materials are lumber and Masonite hardboards, the versatile do-it-yourself materials that come in a variety of finishes and sizes. They are available at lumber yards.

 Guards: Wayne Lambert, Bobby Garrett, Sam Day, Clarence Manck.
 Centers: Bob Womack, Earl Conner Jr., Carroll Allison and Carl Foster.
 Backs: Ed T. Cox, Jimmy McAdams, John Garrison, Tommy Samuels, Homer Mitchell, Maurice Stalter, Estes Burgamy, Bull Johnson, Bob Blair, John Hicks, Jimmy Mathews, Jr., Rex Clark and Darrell Tully.
 The 1947 football team, regional champions, was selected as the greatest football team produced by EHS.
 Eastland started playing football in 1917 and has won only two district titles, 1944 and 1947. The first night football game ever played was between the Eastland Mavericks and DeLeon in 1923.
 Eastland's most glorious athletic victory was picked as the first football victory over the Cisco Lobos in 1935. Bedlam broke out in downtown Eastland as the town went wild celebrating the long sought victory over their arch enemy, the Lobos.
 Eastland's football coaches have been: Baggett, Parker, B. I. Green, Bunt Adams, Dave Pena, Hoot Gibson, Red Petty, Johnny Kitchen, E. B. Grady, Chief Warden, John Little, Wendell Siebert, Ed Hooker and Carroll Shelton.
 Ed T. Cox still holds the record for having kicked the longest field goal in the history of Texas high school football, 53 yards against Breckenridge in 1924.
 Eastland has produced more outstanding golfers than any other type of athlete. Greatest golfers picked by the committee were: J. T. Hammit, Bob Sikes, Sam Conner, Tim Barnett, Geo. Meredith, Dug Jones, Earl Conner Jr., S. J. Barnett and Darrell Tully.
 Tommy Piekens, Lefty Hunt, Reagan Coleman, Bucky Harris and Charles Griffin were named as the greatest baseball players. The latter four became professional players.
 Earl Conner Jr., mile runner; Buzz Daniels, hurdler; and Shag Hansen, were the only state champions produced by Eastland in track. Buzz Daniels still holds the state championship for high hurdles at the college distance.
 The Brown twins, Delmer and Elmer, were great track stars while in Eastland High and won national recognition while performing for North Texas State. They were dash men.
 No record was available on Eastland's great basketball players, however, it was noted that Rosie Stalter was probably the greatest basketball player. He was a star and captain of the University of Texas championship team in the 20's.
 It is noteworthy that a father and son were selected on the all time football team. Father, Jimmy Mathews was selected as a tackle and his son Jimmy Mathews Jr., was selected as a backfield man.
 Eastland High has had many county and district champions in tennis, both men and women. No record is available, however. The Key brothers, Howard, Scott, Bill and Allen, were the most prominent in tennis in the 1920's and 30's. In 1929 Josephine Martin and Virginia Norton won the state doubles championship.

Baked Salad Makes Unusual Luncheon Treat
 The question of what to serve when entertaining at luncheon is often best answered with a tempting salad — substantial without being "heavy", attractive to look at, and easy to serve with just hot rolls, dessert and beverage.
 This baked salad, which takes good and unusual advantage of the nutty flavor and festive appeal of avocados, is an ideal choice for such occasions on these into-winter days. Simple to prepare, the halved avocados are brushed with lemon juice, heaped with chicken salad and baked with a topping of corn flakes mixed with melted butter. After a brief baking, serve at once garnished with ripe olives.
Baked Avocados With Chicken Salad
 3 ripe avocados
 1 tablespoon lemon juice
 2 cups cooked diced chicken
 1 cup finely cut celery
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1/8 teaspoon pepper
 1/2 cup mayonnaise
 1 1/2 cups corn flakes
 2 teaspoons melted butter
 Cut each avocado in half lengthwise, remove seed and peel. Brush with lemon juice. Combine chicken, celery, salt, pepper and mayonnaise. Fill avocado shells with mixture. Crush corn flakes slightly and mix with melted butter. Sprinkle over chicken salad. Place shells in lightly greased baking pan. Bake in slow oven (325 degrees F.) about 15 minutes or until heated through. Serve at once.
 Yield: 6 servings.
