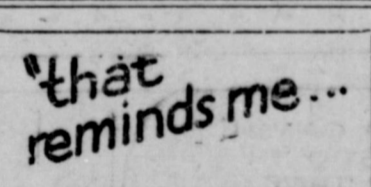

Last of 1934 in Retrospect Promises Little for 1935

Hitting the high spots of a busy week at the end of a busy year... The National Committee on the Cause and Cure of War prepares a series of articles by ten prominent American women on "Why Wars Must Cease," and Irene du Pont, whose powder company cleared \$250,000,000 during the World War, warns U. S. senators that we'll "have a hell of a time" if we don't prepare for war in time of peace.

Senator Millard E. Tydings, Maryland Democrat, visits Manila and warns the Filipino constitutional convention that the islanders will be undertaking grave and risky responsibilities when they get their freedom. 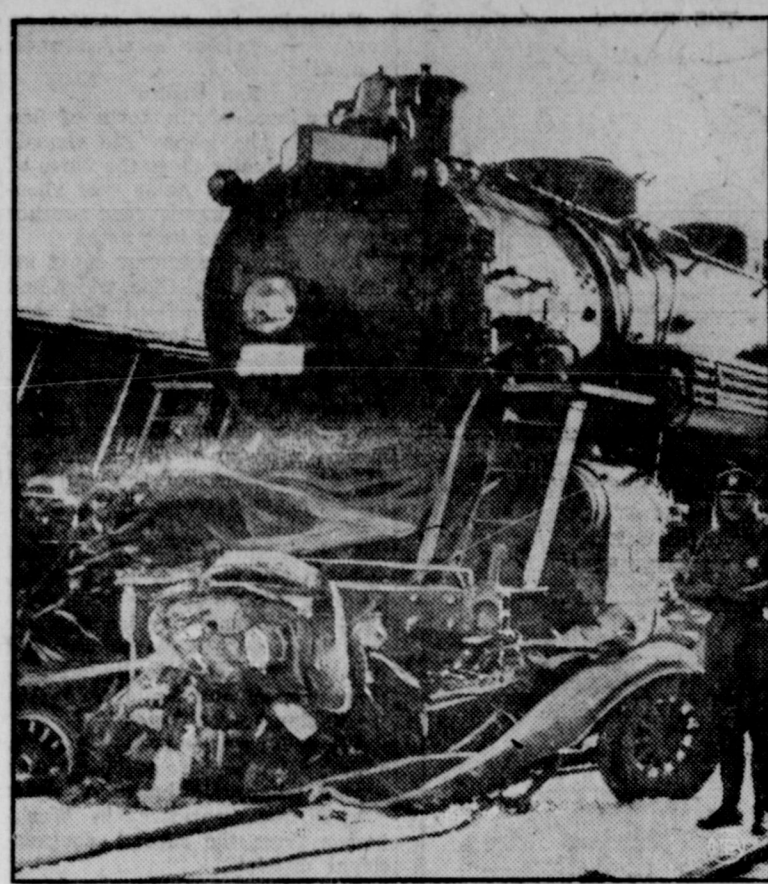

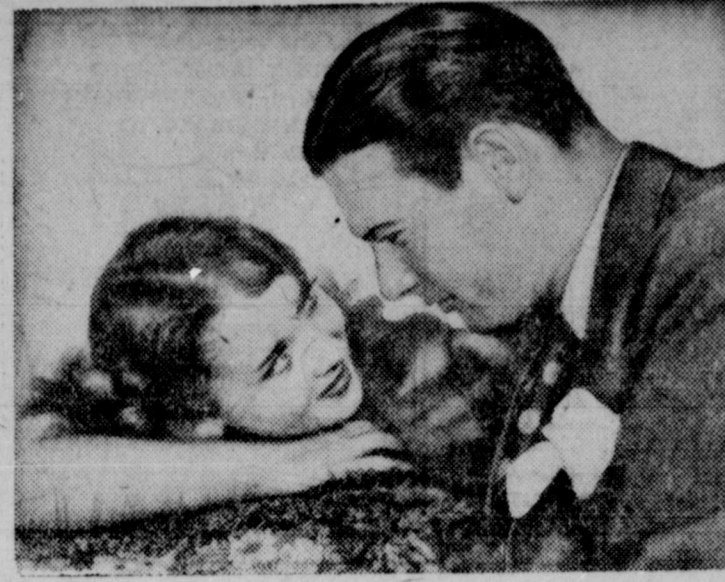
