Members of the C-C were mailed a ballot containing the names of 18 members recommended by a nominating committee.

During the past year Hubert C. Westfall has served as president of the chamber of commerce, Jack Germany has been first vice president, M. H. Perry second vice president and H. J. Tanner, manager. Members of the board of directors will elect new officers at their next meeting.

Pipkin, Howard Open Offices in Petroleum Bldg.

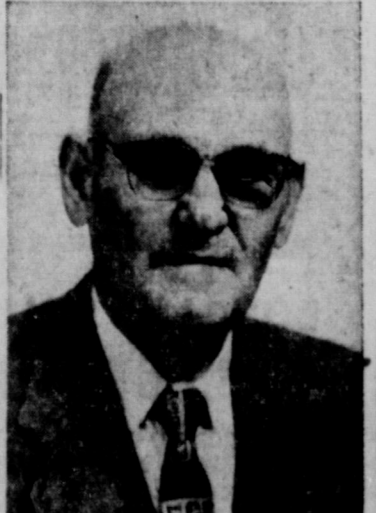
Two former Pipkin Grocery Co. executives have opened offices in the Petroleum Building in Eastland.

Livestock Association's Barbecue Is Wednesday

Court Makes Four County Appointments

Eastland county commissioners Monday named two new election judges, appointed a new county veterans service officer and a new assistant service officer, paid bills and again debated the merits of purchasing a microfilm machine for the county clerk's office.

Henry Collins was appointed as Carbon election judge and A. G. Koenig is new election judge for the Ranger City Hall box. Koenig and Collins both will fill out unexpired terms.

A. H. Powell was appointed veterans service officer to fill out the unexpired term of Lee Dockery, who died last week. Powell will serve in Ranger, but will be in charge of all other service officers in the county. J. B. Sitton of Cisco was appointed as assistant veterans service officer, and will be in charge at Cisco. He replaces Paul Brashear who recently resigned.

There are two other assistant service officers. They are James Wright of Eastland and John Nunnally of Rising Star. An overall appropriation of \$200 a month is paid the officers; with the assistants receiving \$45.00 a month and a

Powell \$65.00.

County Clerk Johnson Smith again came before the commission to request the purchase of a \$500 microfilm machine. Commissioners again asked that Smith wait and see if the constitutional amendment which would allow the Court to re-allocate their funds, passes or not. The county general fund has been getting lower and lower in the past few years while some other funds actually have more money than they need. Under law, no transfer of money can be made, and a re-allocation of funds can be made only by a constitutional amendment.

Smith wants the microfilm machine to bring his permanent birth records up to date.

DOGIES MAKE CROSS PLAINS EASY VICTIM

Eastland's Junior High School Dogies bit the Cross Plains Juniors 27-7 Tuesday night for their second victory.

The Dogies were paced by Halfback Clifton Slate who scored all four touchdowns for Eastland. James Lewis, quarterback, ran over three of four extra point tries.

Eastland scored in the first quarter when Slate ran nine yards for a touchdown. The extra point try was no good.

In the second period Slate broke into the open and raced 60 yards, getting some good blocking, to go over for the score. This time Lewis ran over the extra point.

Slate broke loose on another 60 yard gallop early in the third quarter. The Dogie speedster outran the Cross Plains defenders after breaking into the open. Lewis ran the extra point over to make it 20-0.

The final Dogie score came late in the third quarter. This time Slate did it again, racing 57 yards practically untouched. Lewis added the extra point.

Cross Plains scored in the final period as plays was running out. Every man on the Eastland team saw action.

The Dogies ate up more than 300 yards in their impressive victory, staying to the ground for the most part.

Eastland County Historical Committee Volunteers Needed

Two-thirds of the counties in Texas have named county historical survey committees, George W. Hill, executive director of the Texas State Historical Survey committee disclosed today, but Eastland county is not among the number.

Hill said, "If you are interested in the preservation of our historical heritage and willing to serve on the county historical survey committee in Eastland county, contact County Judge John S. Hart or write directly to me at 242 First Federal Building in Austin."

The executive director asserted that there "is an urgent need for setting up the committee for this county. A statewide meeting is scheduled for Austin Oct. 27 to discuss the state program and each county committee should send a representative to this meeting. This Texas state program for the preservation of our historical heritage is designed to give leadership and service to all areas of Texas."

"Every county in Texas was asked to have a county historical survey committee.

Each county historical survey committee will be asked to nominate an organization member of the Texas Historical Foundation after the committee has been approved for organization membership.

"The county judge of each county in Texas with the concurrence of the four county commissioners and the county clerk of his county is asked to appoint the county historical survey committee.

The county historical survey committee should be composed of not less than seven members with an interest in historical heritage work. Each recognized group and activity in the county with a primary interest in the historic heritage should be represented on the committee and as far as possible those with a secondary interest should be represented.

"Purposes: To provide geographic, statewide representation in the organization membership of the Texas Historical Foundation. To provide a service on the county level similar to that provided by the Texas State Historical Survey Committee and Texas Historical Foundation on the state level (coordination and leadership in historical and heritage matters).

"To make a study of what the county is doing in the historic heritage realm and what it needs to do (a set of suggested procedures will be prepared for this purpose by the Texas State Historical Survey Committee and Texas Historical Foundation).

"To help implement the general program of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee and Texas Historical Foundation as study abroad for one year as Rotary 'ambassadors of good will.'"

Gaines pointed out that Eastland Rotarians have an opportunity to help pick out a student for foreign study this year. Jerry Wilcort of Abilene is now studying in Johannesburg, South Africa. The district governor reminded Rotarians that they must change with the times. He declared that times have changed "since you and I were boys. Boys today can't go swimming in the old swimming hole, and it's up to us to see that they have something to do."

Pointing to the farmer, he told Rotarians that it was their job to help the farmer find new ways to sell his products. He said that little ideas could grow into big industries and use more and more of the farmers' products. That, he declared, is the answer to our farm problem, a give - away program is not. Before the meeting, Gaines held a breakfast meeting with Rotary committee chairmen and club officers. Attending the breakfast were Dr. M. A. Treadwell, Tom Wilson, Bernard Hanna, Frank Sayre, Earl Stephens, Earl Bender, Wayne Hudson and Taylor Smith. Wilson, club president, introduced the speaker, and Don Pierson expressed the club's appreciation for his visit, following the governor's talk.

Get Industry, Rotarians Told

Rotarians in small towns such as Eastland must bring industry to their cities to "produce jobs so that our youths may stay at home," Sydney A. Gaines of Wichita Falls, governor of District 579, Rotary International, declared when he addressed Eastland Rotarians here Monday.

Asserting that "... our greatest asset is youth," Gaines said, "Every one of the 9100 Rotary clubs in the free world has a tremendous responsibility to fulfill in serving the youth of its own community. We must not attempt to meet that responsibility with horse and buggy methods."

The Rotary district governor used "The Ships of Rotary" as the theme of his address. Stressing the need of increasing understanding and good will between the United States and other countries of the world, he pointed out that Rotary International has spent more than two million dollars in recent years in its program of student fellowships. 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Country Echoes

Hello everybody! I had planned to get a letter to you from San Antonio last week but there was never a spare moment to sit down and get any of the National Home Demonstration Council highlights to you.

First, let me tell you my song entry did not win in the national song contest. The winner was Mrs. Thomas Bullock from Kentucky.

Attendance totalled 2,071 registered, 850 came from over Texas.

Guest speakers were Dean Imogene Bentley, NTSC, Vesper speaker, Hon. Allan Shivers, governor of Texas and Hon. Omar Burleson, congressman from 17th District. Mrs. Oveta Culp Hobby and C. M. Ferguson, federal director of extension were the other convention speakers.

Mrs. Elizabeth Beck, lone delegate and president of the Hawaiian council brought leis, baby orchids and tiny jars of Hawaiian jam for the banquet favors.

Three delegates came from Porto Rico. Wisconsin delegates and the Maine delegation left snow and freezing weather behind as they made the trip to Texas.

Louisiana brought the largest delegation — 102 — and got a traffic ticket for speeding on the San Antonio outskirts. Rhode Island—the smallest state had the smallest delegation within the states—four.

It took a small Texas lad to interpret the language for the Porto Rican girls. Maine delegation came the longest distance — 2375 miles in two bus loads. Kansas had 97 attending. Oklahoma had 99 attending. There were 40 states, Alaska, Hawaii, and Porto Rico represented.

The Texas Home Demonstration Association annual meeting was held immediately following the closing of the national meeting September 26.

Election of the officers was a part of the program. President elected was Mrs. R. C. Wood, Fort Lavaca; vice - president at large, Mrs. Carl Herfurth, of Garland; Mrs. Wilmer Smith, secretary, from Wilson; and Mrs. Melton McGehee of Wayside, treasurer. Twelve district vice-presidents were also installed.

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END OF THE ROAD—A quick way to dispose of troublesome cars is provided by this huge hydraulic press at the German Lindemann factory at Dusseldorf. Built for a British steelworks, the 250-ton press can change auto bodies into neat, small bundles in a matter of minutes. The cars are dumped in the press, top, and after a flick of the switch, emerge in the form of a two-by-three-foot scrap block, bottom. The machine is reportedly the biggest "scrap parceling press" in the world.

Weather Cycles Are Poppycock

Predictions of rainfall cannot be made on the basis of weather cycles of "wet and dry years."

Recent studies of 31 locations in the High and Rolling Plains of Texas show that cycles play little or no part in annual rainfall figures dating as far back as 89 years.

Dr. R. J. Holdreth and Gerald W. Thomas of the Texas agricultural experiment station, who made the studies, state that an optimist can find traces of cycles at some locations, but no statistical significance of cycles is revealed in the records.

"Average or normal rainfall seldom occurs," they said. "The records indicate that farmers and ranchers in the High and Rolling Plains should figure that more years — 52 to 69 percent — will be below average in rainfall than years above average."

Prolonged droughts have occurred on the High and Rolling Plains at least two or three times during the period weather records are available. The famous drought of the 1930's, which led to the dust bowl period, shows up in records at most locations. Another bad drought period occurred around 19-17. At most locations the recent drought began in 1951 and is the longest and most severe on record. Records go back to 1866 at Abilene.

In most cases, it is not the first year of low rainfall that is disastrous, but the two, three or four years in a row of low rainfall. During the dust bowl period Ama-

rico had eight consecutive years of below average rainfall.

The study and publication of the results — "Farming and Ranching Risk as Influenced by Rainfall" — is the first of a planned series to include several other areas of Texas, the Edwards Plateau, Trans - Pecos and Rio Grande Plain, where drought also has affected farm and ranch income.
