END OF THE ROAD-A quick way to dispose of troublesome cars is provided by this huge hydraulic press at the German Lindemann factory at Dusseldorf. Built for a British steelworks, the 230-ton press can change auto bodies into neat, small bundles in a matter of minutes. 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Weather Cycles Are Poppycock

Predictions of rainfall cannot be made on the basis of weather cycles of "wet and dry years." Recent studies of 31 locations in the High and Rolling Plains of Texas show that cycles play little or no part in annual rainfall figures dating as far back as 89

Drs. R. J. Hildreth and Gerald W. Thomas of the Texas agricultural experiment station, who made the studies, state that an optimist can find traces of cycles at some locations, but no statistical significance of cycles is revealed in the records.

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
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


